3. BACKGROUND AND NEEDS ANALYSIS (please adjust row size as needed)

(A) Describe the project rationale based on identified issues, describe the humanitarian situation in the area, and list groups consulted. (maximum 1500 characters) *	<p>According to a recent rapid assessment conducted by IIDA Child Protection team in Banadir, both boys and girls still face an increased risk of recruitment into armed forces and armed groups, gender-based violence, exploitation and a wide range of other violations including death and injury. They are often separated from their families and caregivers and have difficulty obtaining food and humanitarian assistance. The emotional impact on children affected by these circumstances is profound and those who remain in the care of their caregivers and communities are likely to be more and more vulnerable. Schools are closed while those that are open remain inaccessible in the target area, Banadir regions.</p> <p>The above mentioned situation largely obtains in Zone-K, Sigale and Siliga Amerikanka. There are cases of abduction and coercion of children — some as young as seven years of age — to join armed forces or groups, where they are used as porters, spies, fighters and for sexual purposes. The former government (TFG) had put in place some preventive measures, whereby it signed an action-plan to end recruitment of children and to allow child protection partners to release children from the Somali National Army.</p> <p>There are no known efforts by the new government or AMISOM to combat Gender Based Violence in areas under their control even though laws on the same exist. Clan protection makes prosecution of perpetrators difficult. Although rape is rampant, there are no reports of prosecution. There are limited medical facilities to treat the survivors of GBV and structures to provide psychosocial treatment for those suffering from post GBV trauma are lacking. There is very little sensitization about how to prevent or deal with rape cases. Furthermore, there is a lack of awareness among the local population on the danger of FGM.</p> <p>A rapid assessment conducted by IIDA in July 2011 revealed that there are many GBV cases in the camps in Mogadishu. Such camps include Ex-Control Camp with an estimated population of 1,000 households and Siligga Mareykan with a population of 1,500 households.</p> <p>Child and forced marriage is prevalent throughout Somalia, especially in the assessed camps where parents often marry off their daughters as young as age 12. Similarly, domestic violence targeting women is also a serious problem in the IDP camps, yet there are no specific laws addressing it. However, both Sharia and customary laws address the resolution of family disputes. Sexual violence in the home is reportedly a serious problem, linked to the general gender discrimination.</p> <p>Laws prohibiting rape exist in the government controlled areas but they are not enforced, hence no reports of prosecution of any rape cases to date. Indeed, an accusing finger has often pointed at the police and militia members as the worst culprits, with regard to engagement in rape. Rape is also commonly used as a weapon in inter-clan conflicts. Women and girls in IDP camps are especially vulnerable to sexual violence (including rape), contributing to the spread of HIV/AIDS. UNIE 2008 report revealed that IDP women and girls, particularly those belonging to minority groups were increasingly targets of sexual violence by youth gangs.</p> <p>Monitoring reports gathered from Zone K, Sigaale and Siliga focal points reveals an horrific and shocking statistics of protection cases that are beyond the reach of the project. During the months of April, May and June 2012 alone, the project recorded 75</p>

(maximum 1500 characters) *	<p>IIDA has considerable experience in implementing similar projects in other locations. Similarly, IIDA has good community acceptance which gives us easy access to those communities to mobilize their participation in the project. There exists good rapport between IIDA and the current committees in the three IDP settlements that will be readily available for consultation and for mobilizing local support for the project implementation. Children and youth groups consulted during previous assessments will be involved in the implementation of the project through the existing children and youth clubs who will be promoting safe play activities and awareness creation on the key child protection concerns the project seeks to address. On the ground in Mogadishu, IIDA has got both technical child protection staff and operations support staff who will all be contributing to the implementation of the project. IIDA is a member of the CPWG in Mogadishu and will be actively engaged with other actors in child protection to both share information and learn from what others are doing.</p> <p>IIDA currently runs Release and Reintegration project which provides vocational training within or in close proximity to the project locations so beneficiaries can access these learning centres.</p> <p>The capacities mentioned above will be fully utilized in addressing the felt-needs highlighted in previous assessments, which include safe means for children to earn a livelihood, access to education opportunities, prevention of family separation and reunification of unaccompanied children, addressing the acute shortage of opportunities for children and youths to engage in play and recreation opportunities and more importantly to prevent or minimize the incidence of child recruitment and sexual exploitation</p>
(C) List and describe the activities that your organization is currently implementing to address these needs.(maximum 1500 characters)	<p>IIDA is currently implementing a Release and Reintegration Project which targets ex Al Sabaab, Somalia National Army, Hizbul Islam fighters. The project provides psychosocial support, vocational training, basic WASH and Health services. Setting up this project in Sigaale, Siliga and Zone K will enable possible ex-fighters and ordinary children to benefit from the existing child protection services.</p>

IIDA has considerable GBV experience in implementing protection projects and enjoys community acceptance in the project locations. IIDA will recruit a dedicated and experienced child protection and GBV staff to work with the protection team on the ground. Further capacity development support will be provided through Child Protection Specialist, MEAL Advisors and Finance departments to ensure quality of the programme and compliance with donor requirements.</p> <p>The project plans to engage the local community and camp committees in the selection of the beneficiaries. It will take into consideration the concerns and suggestions of the camp committees. Local responsibility for and ownership of the project is essential to children's long-term well-being. To ensure attainment of the set objectives, the activities will be monitored on an ongoing basis through supervision and periodic review of entries and records. Those responsible for monitoring will be familiarized with the project plans, outputs and milestones. Regular Field visits will be carried out by the Project staff to ensure the proper and timely implementation of all planned project activities. IIDA will hold regular consultation with community leaders, teachers, religious leaders and government representatives before and during the implementation of the project.

IIDA will ensure and engage all the stakeholders in the intervention so as not compromise the sharing of GBV related information as stakeholder will be highly involved in this project. Records of all beneficiaries, including information on their engagement with the project would be maintained, and held confidentially at the IDP's camps and in the community, for documentation and analysis for recommendations. IIDA will provide photos showing the progress of the project and will also submit both interim and final reports to CHF.
