3. BACKGROUND AND NEEDS ANALYSIS (please adjust row size as needed)

(maximum 1500 characters) *	<p>Children in Somalia are at high risk of contracting measles - and other vaccine-preventable diseases - because the routine immunization coverage for measles is estimated as low as 49%. Measles follow-up campaigns for children U5 year has not been conducted in most districts of the target regions for more than three years, leaving more than 500,000 children unprotected from measles in those geographical areas. This has led to build-up of successive cohorts of un-vaccinated children that are a 'public health time-bomb' ready to explode any time soon. The recent explosion of polio outbreak, could be considered a predictor of deadly outbreaks, of measles and other Vaccine Preventable Diseases, that are likely to follow in Somalia.</p> <p>Low vaccination coverage of children with weakened immunity due to high rates of malnutrition is a serious concern for large scale outbreaks of Vaccine Preventable Diseases. Due to the very high measles mortality associated to famine situation, immunization of children in affected population is life-saving, and be implemented as a first priority to avoid un-necessary deaths. Rationale for this intervention include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Very low access to child health services in the target regions - Huge immunity gap among U5 children in target regions - Impending outbreak of measles and other VPD diseases - Avoid high mortality in U5 children in target regions - Existence of cost-effective approach in reaching more than 80% of children with child health servi

(maximum 1500 characters) *	<p>In Somalia, the health care delivery system is inadequate to provide basic health services to the entire population. The inadequacy is even worse in the target regions. The inadequacy of the country's primary health system is reflected in coverage of immunization services among children and women: only 42% of under 1 year are fully vaccinated. Therefore, there is an unmet need of provision of preventive services through active outreach services to vulnerable populations.</p> <p>Child Health Days in the target regions will address the major causes of death and disease in children; and represents the only platform available to deliver a cost effective life-saving package of child health interventions. CHD interventions include: measles, OPV, Vitamin A and De-worming tablets for children under 5 year; and TT for WCBA. CHD takes health care services out of the facility and delivers them directly to the community through teams of thousands of vaccinators and health workers, reducing access barriers and ensuring continuity of care at community level. A recent study, in northern Somalia, conducted by MOH, UNICEF and WHO in collaboration with CDC Atlanta recommended the continuation of CHD as a short term strategy of reaching more children with vaccination services. (Study sent for publication). An economic evaluation of CHD, conducted in association with CDC Atlanta, revealed CHD to have been cost effective with a cost of less than US\$ 1.00 per intervention per beneficiary.</p>

(maximum 1500 characters)	<p>Through its extensive network of community-accepted district polio officers, WHO Somalia does have a continuous presence in each of the districts of target regions. This district level presence is further augmented by a net-work of thousands of voluntary village reporters. Through this structure, WHO has been able to assist the government of Somalia detect cVDPV, WPV and measles outbreak.</p> <p>As of Apr 2013, WHO, in collaboration with CDC Atlanta, has embarked on a creative initiative of community reporting system, in which remunerated community-based reporters will report polio-like disease on weekly basis. All these district and village structures that are supported by WHO Somalia will be utilized in disease detection as well as organization of vaccination campaigns.</p> <p>Currently, WHO Somalia, along with its partners, is assisting the government of Somalia respond to the polio outbreak through organization and implementation of a series of polio campaigns, intensive surveillance of polio-like diseases, and mobilization of the community for vaccine uptake. The polio outbreak has been declared an international emergency.</p> <p>Over the last two decades, WHO Somalia has had a surveillance and campaign organization edge (comparative advantage), in supporting the Somali community, detect and respond to outbreaks of vaccine preventable diseases.</p>
