Activity 2.2: Work with CCPNs and CCs to identify and support non-harmful traditional reconciliation mechanisms or practices in the community, which can support psychosocial reintegration of children who are separated from their parents for a long period. By strengthening a network of community-based structures and services that are responsive to the needs of the most vulnerable children and families, this sub-component of the project aims to establish a nurturing environment for separated and unaccompanied children, supporting their increased self-esteem and psycho-social well-being in the community. The Child Protection Networks and children's clubs along with IIDA staff will carry out community mobilization and sensitization activities to promote the acceptance and to respect fundamental and principal rights of the children.

Activity 2.3:

Activity 3.1: Establish psychosocial support in transitory centres, life-skills and basic literacy classes for children whilst they are waiting for reunification. While children are in temporary care structures they will have access to Orientation Centres facilitated by IIDA, where animateurs will support them to make decisions about their futures, and they will be able to access life skills and ALP classes.

Activity 3.2: Foster Care Arrangements for children whose family can not be traced. For all models of care IIDA will work with child protection agencies, the CCPNs, children and community members to develop national alternative care guidelines. These will include criteria for selection of foster parents, establishing foster parent groups and community-based monitoring systems for children placed in alternative care.

Activity 3.3: Establish community based child protection mechanisms to follow up identify separated and unaccompanied children and provide necessary support to overcome immediate difficulties that may arise.
