Nonviolent Peaceforce is requesting a three months extension for this project duration from 31 March 2014 to 30 June 2014, in order to complete the activities outlined in the project proposal. This is due to the current violence events that took place in Juba on the 15 December 2013. The events which started as a fire exchange between SPLA forces loyal to President Salva Kiir and forces affiliated to the former vice-president Riek Machar quickly escalated into a countrywide violence. Jonglei and Unity had witnessed severe clashes between government and anti-government forces due to their political, economic and ethnical significance to both parties.

Jonalei

Bor, the state capital of Jonglei state, had witnessed sever fights since the 17 December 2013. The acting state governor, majors and other officials were forced to seek refuge in UNMISS compound after Peter Gadet had taken control of the town. Targeted killings of Dinka civilians in town along the river were reported as well as lootings of civilian's property and burning of houses. According to latest news, Bor has been retaken by government forces, however, the security situation in Bor remains fragile and humanitarian access to Bor had not been established yet. Pibor had also witnessed intensive fights between defected members of division 8 who engaged in fights with other SPLA factions. While in Waat part of the armed Lou Nuer youth aimed at targeting the SPLA Dinka there. Ten SPLA members from the Dinka community and two SPLA soldiers from the Nuer community were killed when they engaged in hostilities on the 19th of December.

Unity

A rebellion broke out in Unity state on the 20th of December 2013 in which forces loyal to South Sudanese President Salva Kiir's government control the northern county of Pariang, and the western counties of Abiemnom and Mayom. On January 10th, the anti-government forces had retreated from Bentiu, the state capital, and government forces were in control of the city. According to recent reports, Bentiu town is currently under the control of the government and the SSLA, however, the government control remains centred in Bentiu town while the rural areas remained under the control of anti-government forces.

Subsequently, the NP teams in Jonglei and Unite states were evacuated to Juba bringing activities and programming to a halt in these areas. Currently, the Waat office is operating with minimal number of staff, while two staffs were sent to assess the situation in Benitu.

- Engagement in timely and effective rumour control and de-escalation of tensions

- Provide protective presence at areas where women are most vulnerable such as boreholes, women's farms, river, near army barracks etc
- 8 community protection trainings were conducted
- Awareness raising with local authorities, SPLA, SSPS and traditional leaders about GBV and the legal responsibility of the state in prevention and punishment of perpetrators
- Accompany GBV survivors to access services and to engage with the police
- Family Tracing and Reunification Training (FTR)
- Provide reintegration support for boys and girls returning to their families
- Community security planning to reduce vulnerabilities to abduction of boys and girls

List outstanding activities:

- Personal security trainings for women and specific women's security meetings in affected areas
- Develop and disseminate referral pathway illustrating services available to GBV survivors
- Facilitate strategy to communicate HRJC agreements to community members
- Establish emergency phone trees response system in vulnerable communities where mobile signal is available
- Formation and support of Women's Peacekeeping Teams, including training on GBV awareness, GBV emergency response and community protection
