DRC is seeking no cost extension to this grant due to unforeseen accessibility challenge in some of the proposed implementation sites; however no changes will be made to the original allocation. This challenge was as a result of flooding due to heavy rains in Abyei region during the month of September, October and November 2013. DRC was forced to scale down implementation of activities in Alel County which was completely cut-off; some of the villages in Alel County are still inaccessible to date. Implementation team managed to reach a few villages in Rumamer County where they mobilize target beneficiaries and carried out planned activities.. During this period the team could not use the team vehicle in some sites, they were forced to walk long distances to reach venues for meetings and trainings. Beneficiary turn-up during these activities was low due bad weather. The 2 month NCE requested would enable DRC to complete implementing proposed activities in Alel County.

In addition to this is Abyei Referendum held in late October significantly inhibited our ability to mobilize duty bearers for the purposes of workshops on conflict sensitivity. Also the recent political crisis in South Sudan, whilst increasing the necessity of such activities, has made implementing them much harder. With the AAA in 'crisis mode' (the Chairman, Deng Alor Koul, was one of the 11 political detainees), and local organizations/civil society addressing the displacement into Abyei (some 2,700 have entered the region since the crisis began); it has not been possible to mobilize the right people for such a workshop to be effective. This will change in the next 2 months as the immediate crisis subsides and workshops become possible.

DRC also experienced delays in finalizing the procurement of services and material for the construction of operation base in Agok due to the political crisis that took place on the 15th December 2013 in Juba. Abyei region recives most of its supplies from Khartoum and neighboring states namely , North Bahr El Ghazal, Warrap and Western Bahr El Ghazal. DRC had planned to procure materials for the construction on operation base locally. As a result of the political crisis Abyei region did not receive its supplies due to security challenges on the roads in the 3 states and closure of border with Khartoum. However with the recent signing of the agreement on cessation of hostilities between the government/SPLM and opposition and the general reduction in incidences of clashes between government and opposition it is expected that the roads will open and Abyei will be supplied. DRC anticipates that it will be able to procure materials and finalize construction of operation base within the requested 2 months NCE period.
