A. Humanitarian Context Analysis

- In approximately 500 words briefly describe the humanitarian situation in the specific region/area where CHF Reserve activities are planned for with reference to assessments and key data, including the number and type of the affected population¹.

The South Sudan national conflict which broke out in mid December 2013 transformed Longechuk and Maiwut Counties into refuge zones for civilians from Malakal and surrounding towns in Upper Nile State has severely strained coping mechanisms of host populations in counties already with Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) and vulnerable groups in the current crises.

In the current emergency situation have increased strains on food requirements from the affected IDPs and hosts within the two counties, hence need for this three month emergency appeal for external intervention.

In addition to addressing emergency requirements, this three month proposal seeks to strengthen local coping mechanisms by distributing emergency agricultural and fishing inputs to the affected communities.

This program will enhance farming techniques by responding to needs for emergency tools and seeds. Increased farmland will be availed in collaboration with local authorities.

The targeted affected people are follows: Total: 10,000 (Men: 1,000, Women: 6,000, Other group: 3,000 Both Host and IDPs communities, aged, displaced) Maiwut: 4360 (Females 3080, Men, 520, IDPs and aged, 760. Longechuk: 5640(Females 2920, Men, 480, IDPs and aged, 3000). LDA will distribute seeds and tools to the above mentioned affected population for timely planting of cereal seeds and varied fast-growing vegetable seeds such as onion, carrots, kales and pumpkins; weeding at the right time, harvesting and keep records of targeted households, while the IDPs and hosts camping close to the Jekow river at Pagak Payam will be provided with fishing gear to enable them obtain ready food, both for sale and domestic consumption.

Latest situation preliminary report of February 2014 from Longechuk and Maiwut counties shows that prices of food increased unreasonably following the onset of fighting by approximately 30%. Maiwut and Longechuk have very small markets for food exchange. As now out of the current crisis on the two counties, it is important that donors and LDA will intervene with the proposed activities and prevent further food prices increase after the harvest expected in June 2014.

The CHF funding will strengthen coping mechanisms for populations affected by the current violent crisis in South Sudan, triggering turmoil, with families dispersal and uncertainty which has also transformed Maiwut and Longechuk counties into refuge zones for civilians escaping from the havoc in Malakal and the surrounding towns within Upper Nile State, in addition to IDPs and the vulnerable already shielded there. This has placed severe strain on the coping mechanisms of host populations. The 3 months conflict has claimed many lives leaving many displaced.

This funding will enable affected households return to their farmlands, distributing farm tools, higher yielding fast-growing seeds, and assist them preserve their harvests. Targeted groups are includes host community, IDPs, returnees and the aged.

The funds will assist beneficiaries to re-build their livelihood resilience. LDA targets host, IDPs and returnees community through its livelihood activities focusing on vulnerable and marginalized groups, households with malnourished children and female-headed households. In this, LDA will apply the "do-no-harm" approach, ensure mutual benefits to the concerned, and employ participatory and community driven approaches and decision making platforms to enhance project sustainability at the grass root level during distribution of agricultural inputs.

Maiwut and Longechuk have very small markets, for food transaction. The organization will assist farmers construct storage facilities to reduce overdependence on middlemen, form local cooperative societies to buy excess yields and affordably to deficient households. In consultation with FAO, LDA will obtain seeds and farm tools from core pipeline in prepositioning emergency agricultural inputs.

i) Contribution to Cluster Objectives

The project will supply quality seeds and supply better tools to farmers, thus prepositioning tools in Pagak and Mathiang towns in Maiwut and Longechuk Counties respectively, supporting core pipeline in prepositioning emergency agricultural inputs, fisheries supplies to the affected populations of the counties, which are often inaccessible after the beginning of rains. By developing a

local a seed bank, the project will promote community seed based security for access to quality seeds.

Food and Nutrition security of targeted affected populations with all agricultural inputs improved. This will maximize nutritional impacts among vulnerable/food insecure populations, like orphaned, the old and the disabled.

LDA enhance farmers' post-harvest preservation handling, with each homestead having storage facilities for surplus. Increase of farmland will be done in collaboration with local authorities and opinion leaders. LDA will advise farmers on timely planting, usage of animal manure and plant varied vegetables such as carrots, kales and pumpkins; weeding at the right time, harvesting and keep records of targeted households.

LDA will work with farmers to form local cooperative societies to buy from farmers their excess yields and sell food to deficient households at affordable prices in the markets. All these will contribute to building community capacity for food production.

The objective of this CHF project is to increase food availability through household production and post-harvest handling, while the objectives of Crises Response Plans (CRP) project are:

Providing emergency response livelihood inputs (seeds, tools, and fishing gears) to facilitate production and consumption. This will also maximize nutritional impacts among the vulnerable/food insecure populations,

LDA Crises Response Plans (CRP) objective is to sustain livelihoods of community members; especially those affected by emergency of this current crises in Maiwut and Longechuk. They will be provided by seeds and tools, fishing gear, assist them building capacity for food production, post-harvest handling, preservation & livelihood diversification.

- Coordinate with FAO to support core pipeline activities in prepositioning emergency agricultural inputs
- Delivered of 70 MT of assorted seeds and 30 MT tools to the project sites
- Develop and maintain a distribution format for all inputs distributed
- Closely monitor and supervise activities under this CHF proposal to ensure proper delivery of inputs to the vulnerable and needy households
- Ensure preparation and timely submission of mandated reports to the CHF

iv). Cross Cutting Issues

LDA will encourage equitable participation of women, men and youth by ensuring that the full range is included. Collaboration will be other FSL and other development partners engaged in food security initiatives. To mainstream gender, 60% of the targeted beneficiaries will be women. These will be mainly female-headed households, widows and child-headed households. They will be targeted for activities in the main cereal crop production and fisheries areas. Families of People living with HIV- AIDS will also be supported with intervention on the improvement of vegetable production systems. Awareness will be raised about the spread of HIV diseases. Farmers will also be encouraged to practice, land use intensification by minimizing land tillage, introducing crop rotation and using organic cover crops.

- Close monitoring and supervision of activities under CHF will be done to ensure proper delivery to the vulnerable and needy households;
- LDA will administer post distribution/post harvest questionnaires and submit the competed questionnaires to CHF for analysis to determine the impact of the inputs distributed.
- It will ensure preparation and timely submission of mandated reports.
