## Section: 1 - Expected Results

WFP's Special operation (SO) is a multi-donor funded programme. A budget revision was approved 15 December to adapt the operation in line with the evolving outbreak, to bolster the logistics capacity up to the "last mile," and to extend the operation through end May to cover the period of the current Level 3 designation. The revised total value of the operation (October 2014 – May 2015) is now USD 178.5 million.

In December 2014, the operational needs were reviewed in a budget revision which increased the total costs to USD 178.5 million. As at early January 2015, the SO had received USD 129.6 million. These resources received to date represent 73% of total revised needs of the operation. In order to ensure WFP's agility to respond to the immediate and multiple requests from UNMEER to meet MCA 3 and MCA 4, WFP advanced internal funds and as at early January 2015, USD 2.7 million is yet to be repaid. The total overall shortfall – including the repayment portion – stands at USD 52 million.

#### MCA [3]

Facilitation of transport and storage of cargo is regularly provided - and undertaken upon request, on behalf of NGOs, Governments and UN agencies to and within the most affected countries. Between October and December 2014, the Logistics Cluster, through WFP, has facilitated across Guinea, Liberia, Sierra Leone the transportation of 19,978m³ of cargo on behalf of 43 organisations and the storage of 23,952m³ of cargo on behalf of 32 organisations.

WFP has reinforced storage capacity, procuring, delivering and establishing additional mobile storage units to provide for covered storage space in staging areas and hubs at capitals, and up-country at forward logistics bases. Staging areas and hubs allow prioritizing of equipment, and to kit packages of required items before forwarding on to ETUs, CCCs, and FLBs; dispatch of kits and other items is in response to the requests from partners. To support movement of goods – including the last mile – WFP has reinforced its transport capacity through the leasing of commercial trucks and the procurement and delivery of additional vehicles appropriate for the terrain and task.

In addition to the activities above, WFP has responded to ad-hoc requests across the three countries: for example, WFP recently provided support to WHO regarding the rehabilitation of a hospital in Kambia, Sierra Leone.

As a further example of activities performed beyond the plan, in Sierra Leone, in December as part of the Western Area Surge response, WFP ensured the procurement and dispatch of essential equipment such as ambulances, motorbikes (to be used for surveillance and collection of lab samples) and the hospital beds on behalf of the humanitarian community.

#### MCA [4]

Air service

As of As of 31 Dec, the UNHAS WAC fleet consisted of two fixed-wing aircraft, two helicopters (out of which one is specially equipped for medical evacuations of health and humanitarian personnel with EVD) and one ad-hoc aircraft. The specially equipped helicopter (Bell 205) for medevac of health and humanitarian personnel with EVD, which is based in Conakry/Guinea, was accepted into service on 24 Dec 2014. At the end of Dec 2014, UNHAS conducted the first medevac simulation in Macenta/Guinea in partnership with ALIMA.

## Section: 2 – Deviation from the Original Plan

WFP commits to remaining flexible and being ready to adapt its response operations to accommodate critical need, as the situation evolves in order to respond to priority activities identified by health partners.

#### MCA [3]

The volume of essential items transported by road transport across the three affected countries in November surpassed earlier monthly plans.

Support for building ETUs is provided upon request from health partners; the bed capacity is defined by partners, and may vary. Whilst no funds were specifically allocated to the building of ETUs in Guinea, WFP prioritised the funding provided by the MPTF to Guinea due to urgent requests from the Government; this re-prioritisation of activities in the same category was based on the needs expressed at the time. No requests have so far been received to build ETUs in Sierra Leone, however WFP remains prepared to reallocate funds accordingly should there be a future need.
