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NARRATIVE

Situation Update (please describe critical changes, if any, in the situation that affect the project (1-2 paragraphs)

- 1. The implementation of component 1 of the project has been completed during the reporting period with the delivery of the discharge package to the Port-Loko district beneficiaries (180 individuals).
- 2. Insufficient coordination at Government level is resulting in delays in the implementation of the project. Almost every activity has to be approved by a Project board meeting before implementation (3 PB meeting and four inter-ministerial meeting in 2 months). The MSWGCA has shown reluctance to share the list with the project. As a result, the project is establishing a list at fresh with cost implications that were not budgeted for.
- **3.** The Government has requested for the monthly stipend to be merged with the grants to constitute a bigger package. This is a change in the programme theory of change.

- 1. 100% delivery of component 1 of the project (discharge package to 500 beneficiaries)
- 2. Establishment of a comprehensive list of survivors and destitute families to serve for cash transfer
- 3. Agreement reached with the PPERWs to use the payment platform to deliver the cash to survivors.

Delays or Deviations (if any, briefly describe the delays or changes in focus, approach or targets, and provide a short justification for the change (1-2 paragraphs))

<u>List development and management:</u> the project assumption was that there is a list of survivors established and maintained by the Government. It turned out that the project has to establish: data collection, verification and consolidation. This activity has cost implications that were not considered in the budget. In addition MSWGCA in charge of survivors is not very cooperative in this regards. As a result, the project is spending a lot of time to establish the list and squeezing the budget to cater for its cost. This is resulting in delays in implementing the activities especially the cash transfers
