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1. Humanitarian context analysis.. Humanitarian context: Describe the current humanitarian situation in the specific locations where this project will be implemented

According to the protection trends paper No.5 as of July 2015, the conflict has created a major protection crisis and forced more than 2.2 million people from their homes, According to UNOCHA situation report as of 16 th June 2015, after 18 months of hostilities in South Sudan, the political situation remains fragile and the humanitarian out look in grim, 4.6million people are severly food insecure and lives of more than a quarter of a million children are at risk of rapidly worsening nutrition. This situation has forced women to resort to negative coping strategies including survival sex. Markets are not functioning, further exposing women, girls and boys to risk of being targeted for SGBV. Inside POC sites women and girls also face increased rates of domestic violence and un wanted pregnancies, some of the SGBV survival lack information on the availability of services worsened by limited services in placeConflict in Northern Jonglei State continues to devastate lives of people inhabiting this area and those from adjacent states (Unity and Upper Nile). The conflict has driven the communities from Panyikang in Upper Nile, Leer and Koch in Unity State to seek refuge in areas dimmed safe in neighboring Counties (Fangak and Pigi) in Northern Jonglei. The intensification of the the community fabric and disorted social support networks that previously provided protection and security to the community especially for women, men, girls and boys. According to Keew IRNA report as of 16th to 18th June 2015, the IDPs mainly women and children experience sexual violence, forced recruitment, sexual exploitation and abduction of both boys and girls while leaving their homes in Unity State.

Assessment conducted by actors in Fangak County (Barboi report February 24th -25th 2015) indicated that 23990 unverified population of the the IDPs that came from New Fangak town, Atar, Canal and Kaldak were unaccompanied and separated children under the temporary care arranged families. Many girls and boys are

Assessment conducted by actors in Fangak County (barbol report February 24th -25th 2015) indicated that 23990 univerned population of the the IDP's that came from New Fangak town, Atar, Canal and Kaldak were unaccompanied and separated children under the temporary care arranged families. Many girls and boys are in the company of the women and most of them are reported to be separated from their families. According to Kurwai IRNA (January 5th-6th 2015) the multiple displacements has mainly affected women, girls and boys has increased the need for psychosocial support for women, girls, boys and men.

Since the onset of the crisis on 15th December 2013 fighting in Juba which later escalated to the other states, the on-going conflict has caused massive displacement of women, men, girls and boys, according to the UNOCHA situation report no. 69 as of 8th January 2015 it has been reported that, 1.5 million are internally displaced in side South Sudan since 2013 and the conflict has significantly targeted Civilian population through the use of direct violence, coercion and deliberate deprivation which has greatly impacted on the lives of people resulting into trauma distress. The security situation in Unity, Jongle, and Upper Nile has resulted into continuous arrivals of IDPS in the in Pigi –Kurwai and New Fangak in the areas of Phom, Lele, Kolapach, Wuntur, Pakan and Barbuoy payam. This has subsequently led to increased number of IDPs in this area,inadequate services and limited protection for men, women, boys and girls. Women and girls come

Indicates references to assessments such as Multi-cluster/sector Initial Rapid Assessments (MIRA) together to have discussions on GBV concerns, locally available services and how to provide PFA in line with guiding principles and According to the UNOCHA South Sudan situation crisis report No. 58 as of 16th of October 2014, the UN special representative on sexual violence in conflict at the conclusion of her visit in South Sudan she highlighted that, sexual violence against women and girls perpetrated by all conflicting parties was amongst the worst she had seen during 30 years of working with these issues, she signed for a joint communiqué with the government on the steps to be taken to prevent and address sexual violence including ensuring survivor have access to medical, psychosocial and legal assistance and addressing impunity for these crimes. According to the protection trends as of May 2015, displacement continued to cause major family separation and the number of newly identified unaccompanied and separated children grew steadily as did the rate of family reunification, hence the need for strengthening the capacity of community based protection team to provide continuous support to un accompanied and separated children.

Due to continueous insecurity the IDPs have settled in Pigi_Kurwai, Phom, Kolapach, Wuntur, Lele and Pakan in Fangak which is relatively safe for those who are fleeing from their homes, the availbale services especially health are too limited to adequately cater for the needs of the inceasing new IDP population in the area. Nile Hope's previous interventions in this area which included establishment of a functional GBV referral pathway, construction of a women center, training of health care providers on clinical management of rape, formation of community based protection mechanisms, registrationand tracing of families of unaccompanied and separated children have been thwarted by the insurity and fighting. Nile hope will use funds from the project to target IDPs in Fangak County and Kurwai Payam in Pigi County. These new IDPs will be additional to the IDPs who received response during intervention in the first allocations. Multi sectorial response that is premised on provison of coordinated health services, NFI; Psychosocial support and registration of the unaccompanied and separated children will be a priority

3. Description Of Beneficiaries

Nile Hope will work with the IDPs and host community in Pigi County, Kurwai Payam and Fangak County, Barboi Payam, taking inconsideration gender sensitivity we are targeting 1700 IDPs and community members (850 women, 150 men, 450 girls and 250 boys 150 men, 350girls, 350 boys,850 women) 2,000 indirect beneficiaries will be reached and these will include the elderly and people living with disability. Fangak and Pigi is a vast area where communities have moved away from the main towns to the villages where it is safe for them. Fangak, is divided into two sections new Fangak and Old Fangak, The existing women and girls groups in Fangak and Pigi will be mobilized on a weekly basis to intervine to discuss on concerns affecting women and girls and come up with away forward on how to address the issues raised, the mentioned groups will take the lead of all the activities taking place the women centers. Nile Hope has been working in New Fangak areas and due to the capacity building to the community members to carry out Psychosocial First Aid and awareness raising on the availability of services, we have selected 1700 community However more women and girls are targeted in this pro since there are the most vulnerable with in the community due to their age, sex and status. The existing women and girls groups in Fangak and Pigi will be mobilized on a weekly basis to intervine to discuss on concerns affecting women and girls and come up with away forward on how to address the issues raised.

4. Grant Request Justification

Nile hope is an active protection actor in both Child Protection and GBV in Jonglei, Upper Nile, and Unity State. We have past and ongoing projects in Akobo, Pochalla, Pigi, Fangak, Nasir, Ulang and Leer Counties. We have implemented activities with other actors and worked hand in hand with the government and local government to help save lives and alleviate suffering of vulnerable communities especially women, men, boys and girls. We have conducted Child Protection and GBV advocacy, GBV data collection, management and response. We have technical expertise, administrativel

y; have a good understanding working in a complex context and good relationships with the community members for example the community leaders (women leaders, chiefs, elders, youth leaders and teachers.

Nile Hope has carried out interventions in this area and though we managed to create referral pathway, construct a women center, train health care providers on clinical management of rape, form community based protection mechanisms, registered and traced families of unaccompanied and separated children, insecurity as thwarted these efforts as fighting continues to intensify and displace more people every day, reducing existing progress and efforts to almost zero. Protection projects are mainly on service delivery, Nile Hope have a dedicated staff to respond to emergencies that can be called to action at short notice to ensure Women centers will continue to support them to improve their competencies and ability to deliver through CHF resources management. Nile Hope has the requisite system, policies, and procedures in place, we have a strategy document that has enabled responsive, relevant and timely programming. The strategy have seince made emergency friendlier and responsive to enable to address the emergency needs of the affected communities. Nile Hope continues to participate in key policy, program, and coordination forums, including in development of the country specific mechanisms and guidelines/ standards such as the Gender Based Violence Information Management System, Child Protection Information Management System, GBV Strategy, GBV Standard Operating Procedures. We are active members of the Protection Cluster at the National, State and County level. We rely solely on pool funds like CHF for emergency interventions. Nile Hope, manage to get funding for this year from UNICEF to cover Nasir, Pochalla and Akobo. We still have a gap in Pigi/Canal and Fangak/(New Fangak) Counties

The CHF funding SA R2 will enable us to respond to child Protection and GBV in emergency related gaps that have heavily affected both women and children. Follow up and PSS of the already registered children and registration, of unaccompanied and separated children, tracing and reunification will be continued with the

The existing women centers will be accessed by women during psychosocial activities, engage in focus group discussion on GBV concerns and provision of psychosocial support. and this will help to promote confidentiality since they will have space where they can freely express their concerns with out fear, With the regular discussions on GBV concerns and sharing of experience women and gilrs will be able to gain skills on coping mechanisms

Nile hope is an active protection actor in both Child Protection and GBV working groups in Jonglei, Upper Nile, and Unity State. We have past and ongoing projects in Akobo, Pochalla, Pigi, Fangak, Nasir, Ulang and Leer Counties. Nile Hope has implemented activities with other actors and worked hand in hand with the government and local government to save lives and alleviate suffering of vulnerable communities especially women, men, boys and girls. Nile Hope conducted Child Protection and GBV advocacies, GBV data collection, prevention, management and response. The organization has technical expertise, scaled administrative; better understanding working in complex context infrastructures in additional to having strong field presences as well as good relation with the community.

Nile Hope shall employ and deploy the data base template as the best measure for progress, timelines and results achievement. Whilst monitoring will be progressive, evaluation will be mid-term and final and accountability reports (both financial and narrative) will be generated and shared as appropriate. Nile Hope will solely implement the project with the support of the local authority, other departments and the existing local structures like the community protection teams, women groups, women leaders and community leaders. Nile Hope has an implementation and program oversight/administrative structure to help successfully drive the project. There will be a Gender and Protection Coordinator to lead the project, GBV Specialist to support the department with technical issues and build the capacity of the field staff, supported by a team of staff in the field and including the Programs Coordinator, the Finance Manager, the Grants Manager and the Executive Director. The State Coordinator/s and the Logistics Team will continue to spearhead state-level coordination with the Cluster and partners and follow-up on deliveries of supplies to the respective counties. The MEAL Officer will help to provide progressive M&E tools supplementing the project log frame, track and document useful lessons emanating from the implementation process and will render support to the Cluster monitoring team. The Finance Department will progressively resource the project and ensures accountability through reports while the Programs Coordinator will provide quasi-technical and administrative responsibility responsibility

Nile Hope has been operating in the areas of Pigi and Fangak counties and has got a wider knowledge on the context including the cultural background and how to engage with community members. Nile Hope will use the local staff to implement the project activities and the staff will serve the population regard less of the situation at hand however staff safety is apriority. Nile Hope has been using air transport, boat and vehicle and when it comes to un accessible Payam we use human transport to reach out to the beneficiaries wherever they are settled for example in swampy areas. In regards to the transportation of supplies, Nile Hope will use the log cluster to preposition the dignity kits and also use a boat in Fangak to ensure that supplies get to the final destination and distributed to the beneficiaries.

Protection Mainstreaming

This project will prioritize safety and dignity of beneficiaries mainly women and children through the provision of psychosocial activities at the women centers/ This project will promize safety and uping to beneficiary centered services. In addition this project will provide access to assistance and services without discrimination of sex or age and also ensuring that most vulnerable groups and groups with special needs are reached and assisted with appropriate confidentiality. This project through advocacy, empowerment of targeted groups as well as use of community based committees to enhance population's ability to reclaim their rights. Increased awareness on consequences of GBV and enhanced utilization of available services for women, girls and boys affected by conflict. The rights. The asset awareness of consequences of GDV and enhanced unique to the community and reduce stigma attached to violence. To build resilience in community based support teams will support the GBV and UASC to re-integrate back in the community and reduce stigma attached to violence. To build resilience in communities by enhancing the capacity of service providers to support women, men, girls and boys affected by conflict.

In northern Jonglei areas of Pigi and Fangak where Nile Hope will be implementing is fairly calm with a conducive environment for local staff and other staff from different regions of South Sudan to work with limited challenges. There are a number of IDPs from () some settled in Pigi Kurwai, while others in Fangak counties this has resulted into an increased population with less services in place. The current situation will therefore make accessibility and intervention easier since the staff will be able to reach out to the beneficiaries with services where ever the population moves to and settles

Access

Nile Hope has been operating in the areas of Pigi and Fangak counties and has got a wider knowledge on the context including the cultural background and how to engage with community members. Nile Hope will use the local staff to implement the project activities and the staff will serve the population regard less of the situation at hand however staff safety is apriority. Nile Hope has been using air transport, boat and vehicle and when it comes to un accessible Payam we use human transport to reach out to the beneficiaries wherever they are settled for example in swampy areas. In regards to the transportation of supplies, Nile Hope will charter a flight to preposition the dignity kits and also use a boat in Fangak to ensure that supplies get to the final destination and distributed to the beneficiaries. Reqular monitoring field visits will be conducted by direct program persons in times of inaccessibility our field staff gather the data of implementation through photo sharing, beneficiary interviews and observations and share hard copy of reports.
