For day to day monitoring of water trucking, solid waste collection and sludge disposal UNICEF developed daily monitoring forms which are being used by the truck drivers and entered a partnered and partnered ment with Solidarites International to conduct day to day monitoring, supervision and certification of the services to ensure payments for the contractors are done based on the actual services and avoid any interruption of services for the IDPs .

The project will be reporting Mid Term Progress and final narrative and financial reports through the GMS system as per the requirements of CHF after the report compiled by the project staff reviewed and cleared at different levels within UNICEF WASH section and Deputy Representative office.
