<b>Project Summary :</b>	The Somali Child Protection Working Group has reported, in the past years, high rates of incidents affecting boys and girls displaced by a combination of conflict and natural disasters, including drought. Under the proposed project, the consortium coordinated by CISP will focus on: case management for boy and girl survivors of GBV; case management for unaccompanied/separated minors; engagement with communities to build community driven child protection mechanisms. In order to reach key areas affected by drought, CISP will partner with local NGOs as follows: Sean Deveruxe Human Rights Organization (SEDHURO) in Dollow, Comprehensive Community Based Rehabilitation (CCBRS) in Hargeisa, Hiran Women Action on Advocacy for Peace & Human Rights (HIWA) in Beletweyn, Tadamun Social Society (Tass) in Garowe. The project duration is foreseen for 6 months.

**BACKGROUND****1. Humanitarian context analysis**

The Somali Child Protection Working Group has reported, in the past years, the high rates of conflict/natural disaster oriented incidents affecting boys and girls. Grave violations include forced separation from the family and GBV. The current drought conditions result in displacement and increased stress on communities and families, exacerbating existing vulnerabilities and protection risk exposure. CISP will also work closely with UNICEF on capacity building of child protection actors for monitoring of violations of child rights; reuniting of families; psychosocial support and development of skill for children associated with armed groups. The leading agency will support the project by providing technical support to the IDTR. A strong partnership with LNGOs will be established; Socio-Economic Development and Human Rights Organization (SEDHURO), CBRS, TASS and HIWA will partner in implementing this project. Some of these LNGOs are partnering with CISP to implement protection programs focused on GBV.

**2. Needs assessment**

High levels of displacement lack of social support systems and family breakdown mean children are at high risk of separation from their families which puts them at risk of trafficking, sexual exploitation. Separated and unaccompanied (UASC) girls are often "hidden" as a result of being absorbed into community structures often taking on the burden of domestic labour and child care. In March and April 2016 the Somalia Rapid Needs Assessment (SIRNA) tool was rolled out in the drought affected states of Puntland and Somaliland, following the request of the ICCG and UNOCHA. The assessment was implemented with the support of NGOs, UN agencies and government departments. The initial protection findings included a substantial number of households having reported child separation since the beginning of the drought both in Puntland (between 8 and 14% of households) and in Somaliland (6% and 8%.) As part of previous programs funded by UNICEF to support UASC, 858 children were registered and assisted. The current droughts in the target areas requires action to prevent family separation and respond when separation does occur through the provision of comprehensive IDTR and case management services for UASC.

**3. Description Of Beneficiaries**

The categories of beneficiaries will be as follows: displaced women and men involved in community based activities aiming at building mechanisms to prevent separation and child abuse; separated and unaccompanied boys and girls benefiting from case management services; boy and girl survivors of GBV benefiting from specific case management services (including clinical management of rape); clinical personnel benefiting from training and capacity building events. The selection of the beneficiaries will involve community formal and informal authorities; the beneficiaries of the service provision (boys and girls displaced as a result of the drought) will be referred by the community members sensitized in identifying, assisting and referring separated and unaccompanied minors and/or child survivors of GBV. The medical personnel benefiting from the trainings and capacity building events have already been selected.

**4. Grant Request Justification**

The Protection Cluster has allocated specific amounts to each sub cluster. Within the Child Protection Sub-cluster, chaired by UNICEF and Co-Chaired by CISP, it was suggested to form a consortium to: guarantee a coordinated and impactful intervention; guarantee good geographical coverage; guarantee effective grant management. All partners are recommended by UNICEF and have previous satisfactory collaboration with CISP. As the lead, CISP is responsible for the quality implementation of the intervention, including financial and narrative reporting. The members of the consortium are therefore mandated by the CP sub cluster to implement the drought response plan designed by the mentioned sub cluster within the comprehensive protection cluster response plan. The CP component of the PC response plan focuses on scaling up existing interventions to prevent child separation resulting from drought and implementing family reunification programs for unaccompanied and separated children from drought affected communities. The CP sub cluster response plan focuses as well on scaling up interventions to prevent/respond to forms of GBV affecting boys and girls displaced by drought.

**5. Complementarity**

The proposed intervention will create synergies with existing programs funded by UNICEF and focusing on prevention of GBV and child abuse. The service provision foreseen in the present proposal will therefore act as a reference for the referral pathways aiming at connecting services to survivors in the communities.

**LOGICAL FRAMEWORK**

**Overall project objective**

Enhancing mitigation efforts for the protection of separated children and increase capacity for family reunification or contact, including the Establishment of Family Tracing and Reunification (FTR) focal points/agencies in drought affected areas to collect information on and report cases of family separation and missing children.

**Contribution to Cluster/Sector Objectives :** The project will contribute to the cluster sector objectives by establishing mechanisms for prevention and response of separation of children and child abuse (with focus on GBV). The outcome will be achieved through engaging community key actors in capacity building moments on: the rights of children, how to prevent separation, how to support reunification. The achievement will also be guaranteed by providing direct services.

**Output 1.1**

**Description**

Prevention and response to child abuse, including GBV and reunification of separated and unaccompanied girls and boys (including orphans) and prevention of family separation expanded and strengthened.

**Assumptions & Risks**

The assumption is that forced displacement has increased the vulnerabilities of boys and girls. The risk is that communities don't perceive child separation and child abuse as priorities to tackle in this phase. The mitigation mechanism is represented by an extended presence (with related key entry points) of the consortium within the target communities.

**Activities**

**Activity 1.1.1**

**Standard Activity : GBV referral centres**

Training of Case Workers and CPWG on IDTR, case management for GBV, clinical management of rape. (5 men, 25 women).

**Activity 1.1.2**

**Standard Activity : GBV referral centres**

Provision and access to essential services for child survivors of GBV. (72 men, 288 women, 336 boys, 504 girls).

**Activity 1.1.3**

**Standard Activity : GBV awareness campaign**

IDP committee members trained on prevention & identification of separation and unaccompanied children, and on referral of child survivors of GBV. The training will be based on UNICEF's manual on community prevention and identification of unaccompanied and separated children. The manual was developed with the support of Intersos and it is already endorsed and rolled out. The training will address 10 key community members for a total of 2 days. (874 men, 1310 women).

**Activity 1.1.4**

**Standard Activity : Capacity building**

Monthly meetings of stakeholders engaged in CP in emergency. These meetings will bring together national and local authorities, beneficiaries, humanitarian actors, to: monitor the impact of the intervention and decide on eventual corrective measures; coordinate the intervention with the other programs dealing with child protection. (120 men, 180 women).

**Means of Verification :**

To monitor the project progress against the indicator we will utilize the Child Protection Information Management System (CPIMS), rolled out by the global Child Protection AoR to support case management processes supporting boy and girl survivors of abuse in emergency contexts. The program will focus on child survivors of forms of GBV and on unaccompanied and separated children. Both these categories are captured by the CPIMS. A customized version to support case management processes for unaccompanied and separated children in Somalia is already utilized by the actors engaged in this sector. In addition to the CPIMS, medical data from the clinics will be utilized together with interviews with key informants to assess the clients' satisfaction of the services received. The target includes 30 staff members trained and deployed to provide case management assistance (activity 1.1.2). The total 1230 beneficiaries are disaggregated by gender and age as follows: 77 men, 313 women, 336 boys, 504 girls.

**Means of Verification** : The target beneficiaries are community members and staff directly involved in service provision and prevention of separation/GBV. The consortium partners already utilize formats and tools to assess the number of community members attending public events (dialogues, capacity building events, public declarations). These tools are utilized to assess number of attendees and to evaluate the change of believe of the participants from negative norms around GBV and child abuse to protective norms around women and children's health. The targets include as well the stakeholders involved in the monthly steering committees (activity 1.1.4). The total beneficiaries (2484) are disaggregated by gender and age as follows: 994 men, 1490 women.

**Additional Targets** : Indicator 1.1.1 and indicator 1.1.2 can be further broken down as follows: Activity 1.1.1 Training of Case Workers and CPWG on IDTR, case management for GBV, clinical management of rape and Activity 1.1.2 Provision and access to essential services for child survivors of GBV. The beneficiaries will be the clients accessing quality services: 77 men, 313 women, 336 boys, 504 girls. Activity 1.1.3 IDP committee members trained on prevention & identification of separation and unaccompanied children, and on referral of child survivors of GBV and Activity 1.1.4 Monthly meetings of stakeholders engaged in CP in emergency. These meetings will bring together national and local authorities, beneficiaries, humanitarian actors, to: monitor the impact of the intervention and decide on eventual corrective measures; coordinate the intervention with the other programs dealing with child protection. The beneficiaries will be the community members and stakeholders directly involved in prevention of separation and GBV: 994 men, 1490 women.

## M & R

### Monitoring & Reporting plan

CISP will compile monthly reports on: the number of beneficiaries (disaggregated by gender, age, location and form of abuse) accessing services in all locations; the number of community members engaged in prevention activities (disaggregated by gender, age, location, role in the community); the number of staff (disaggregated by gender, age, location, job description) trained and deployed. For each category the consortium has tools already in place, respectively: the Child Protection Information Management System (CPIMS); the training and public events reporting formats; contractual agreement formats (MoU, contract, performance appraisal). Monthly steering committees will update on the progress of the intervention. The data feeding into the reporting will be collected also through monthly visits of the program managers (or other designated senior staff members) to the project locations. To allow quality coordination, monitoring and reporting from 5 locations, CISP will refer to skilled staff members based in Nairobi and in Mogadishu. The staff members are both nationals and internationals.
