<b>Project Summary :</b>	<p>The project intends to prevent and response to GBV issues through from an integral perspective. HINNA will implement in Banadir regions and Baidao District where they are currently implementing Gender Based violence services in Daynile districts Banadir region in partnership with UNFPA through Ministry of Women and Human Rights Development (MoWHRD).</p> <p>HINNA will implement GBV prevention &amp; response through Multisectoral response activities:1) community engagement, particularly targetting Internally displaced persons (IDPs), host communities, and stakeholders on GBV prevention/mitigation, 2, response (survivor assistance) justice/ legal aid assistance and referral path way.</p> <p>The project location will be Banadir region and Baidao, the direct beneficiaries of the project both in Mogadishu and Baidao will be 4010 beneficiaries, consisting of 620 men, 1,861 women 485 boy and 1,044 girls. The targeted beneficiaries in Baidao will be 1710 and Mogadishu will be 2300 beneficiaries including IDPs/drought affected persons, host Communities, GBV survivors, vulnerable women and girls and GBV service providers in Mogadishu and Baidoa.</p> <p>Conduct 6 technical GBV prevention and mitigation workshops on community sensitization for 390 people in total project communities - each session 65 participants will be attending in Mogadishu.the workshop will entail GBV risks, consequences, mitigation, prevention mechanism, referral network and service available for GBV survivor.</p> <p>Conduct 6 technical GBV prevention and mitigation workshops on community sensitization for 210 people in total project communities - each session 35 participants will be attending in Baidoa.</p> <p>Procurement and distribution of 2000 solar lanterns and 1000 dignity kits for those who are at risk of GBV from vulnerable IDPs in Baidoa and Mogadishu particularly GBV survivors.</p> <p>Train 60 community volunteers on case GBV Prevention and response and early referral in Mogadishu and Baidoa in order to improve referral network.</p> <p>The project will conduct Conduct six (6) days training on clinical management of rape (CMR) for health workers for 40 people, six (6) days training on case management for case workers for 40 people, six (6) days training on Psychosocial Support (PSS) for 40 health workers. **Link with allocation strategy :**

Reaction to address the recent conflict, displacement and violence in Mogadishu and Baidoa are current priorities within the Protection Cluster in South Central Somalia.

The proposed interventions are centrally located within all of the 2016/17 protection cluster objectives. GBV and Protection, Mogadishu will respond to the needs of vulnerable populations including women and girls affected by the recent droughts and conflict in the country and will build on existing HINNA GBV responses that are already in place in Weydow Center, and a new GBV Stop center that planned to be established in Baidoa. These locations are very dispersed and there are few organizations providing GBV or Protection services and health facilities are not equipped to offer clinical care for sexual assault survivors at present. HINNA will utilize internal emergency response capacity to respond to this emerging crisis and will set up a mobile response team to provide GBV case management and Psycho social Support PSS, information, protection monitoring and risk mitigation activities services in two locations Mogadishu and Baidoa. This will be a short term response for a period of six months and provide much needed services in affected locations. A key focus of this intervention will include strengthening health services for survivors and establishing local level GBV coordination and referral systems with other local and international actors. HINNA protection will conduct weekly protection monitoring in consultation with affected populations focusing on human rights violations and targeted violence, discrimination, coping mechanisms, and problems related to access to services, analyze the findings and share protection monitoring reports with clusters and other humanitarian actors to inform advocacy and recommend programming adjustments. In addition, the project team in collaboration with HINNA senior officers will provide mainstreaming training to services providers in these areas as well as this project will provide tailoring training skill to GBV Survivors and vulnerable groups in the project area to improve their living condition.

An assessment on the scope of GBV incidents will be undertaken and shared at national level to explore potential strategies to address this issue.

**BACKGROUND****1. Humanitarian context analysis**

Recurrent conflict and insecurity, drought and massive displacement in the South-Central Zone (SCZ) have resulted in excessive vulnerability of women and girls and marginalized people and at increased risk of gender-based violence (GBV). During the pre famine of 2016-17 Banadir and Bay regions were two of the most affected, with very high levels of displacement and food insecurity. While the humanitarian response has stabilized previously famine affected populations, perpetual external shocks limit the population's access to basic services causing fluctuating levels of vulnerability. As a result women and girls are forced to adopt risky and sometimes harmful coping strategies, including collection and sale of firewood and payment of debt through forced marriage. Pressure for survival intensifies the potential for intimate partner violence. Furthermore, the modalities of aid assistance have sometimes exacerbated vulnerability and risk of exploitation. High levels of GBV and lack of capacity to prevent and respond was noted on a recent individual and joint assessments to Somalia – particularly South –Central regions including Mogadishu and Baidoa and surrounding areas by the National, International and UN agencies on Humanitarian situation.

Based on Humanitarian Needs Overview (HNO) 2017, reported the continuation acute humanitarian needs and basic social indicators remain among the lowest in the world. The number of people in need of humanitarian assistance has reached 5 million, more than 40 per cent of the population. Over 1.1 million people are internally displaced, predominantly in urban centres such as Mogadishu, which hosts more than 400,000 displaced alone who live in over 480 informal and unplanned settlements. This is the largest concentration of IDPs in the country. Out of 55 percent live in two peripheral districts – Daynile and Kahda as the root cause is that of eviction from areas closer to the centre of the city. The majority of those affected are women and children. Protection risks are increasing and the need to centralize protection throughout response activities to the most vulnerable is vital.

According to UNFPA Situation report issued on 1st May 2017, Gender-based violence (GBV) remains rampant in Somalia, with a total of about 32000 cases from September 2016 to March 2017. Mostly affecting women and girls and increasing their vulnerability thus:

- Lower economic status of women: Livelihoods diminishes due to the loss of livestock by nomadic populations in the drought. Limited employment for young people and men and women both in the host communities and IDPs is exposing them to risk of violence. The male youths are becoming aggressive, out of frustration and equally violating girls, with an emerging trend of gang rapes.
- Workload on women and girls: considering that food security is also dependent on clean water and firewood, this is placing extra burden of women and girls who are primarily tasked with the collection of water and firewood, exposing them to more risks;.

HINNA proposes to provide vulnerable groups, particularly women and girl in the communities and survivors of GBV with early humanitarian support to reduce vulnerability, by scaling up emergency response in Baidoa district and other humanitarian priority areas such as Mogadishu.

## **2. Needs assessment**

Based on UNFPA situation report issued on 1st May 2017, Gender-based violence (GBV) remains rampant in Somalia, mostly affecting women and girls and increasing their vulnerability. In the past three months, reported cases have been on the rise particularly rape, sexual assault and physical violence mainly due to the high influx of displaced people. The lack of protective sheltered, safe water and sanitation facilities as well as other basic needs in the displacement settlements further increase the exposure of the most vulnerable to protection risks. According to the Gender-Based Violence Information Management System (GBVIMS) incidence reports of September 2016 to March 2017, about 3,200 incidents were recorded in the drought-affected regions.

According to HINNA rapid need assessment conducted in April 23th 2017 in Mogadishu, the lack of rule of law, pervasive Protection violations, including forced evictions, gender-based violence and exploitation, remain widespread and continue to affect the most vulnerable groups, especially women and girls, people with disabilities, the elderly and minority groups. Furthermore, the absence of GBV mainstreaming has increased the vulnerability of the target population even further at risk; the cases of Gender Based Violence occurs mostly in the night time due to lack of light and the absence of security forces looking the security of the Internal Displaced settlements. To respond these, HINNA will scale up its GBV activities and continue to train Community Safety & Awareness mobilizers in approaches to proper survivor centered care, and raising awareness in communities about available confidential services and referral networks, advocating Gender Based Violence mainstreaming in all sectors including Wash, Health, Education, food security, shelter and Nutrition.

Baidoa, a district situated approximately 250 Kilometers West of Mogadishu, a capital of Bay region controlled by the Southwest State Government. In addition, the estimated population size reported is 120,114. Out of 49% are female, while 51% are male. 99% of settlement in habitants is IDPs mainly arrived from such as Bakol, Lower Shabelle, Gedo, Lower Jubba and Middle Jubba and other parts of Bay region. Moreover, the total number of IDPs the district has received is 168 IDP settlements as well as the assessment report has revealed the existence of protection issues including the incidents of Gender Based Violence (GBV) mostly in IDP settlements. However, in assessment report no response services targeting women and girls survivors of violence currently exist within Baidoa.

Based on HINNA survey assessment conducted on May 13th - 15th, 2017, the vulnerabilities of women and girl returnees and conflict-affected communities in Baidoa district, the general population remains challenged by widespread poverty, low levels of education – including men, women, boys and girls – and minimal or nonexistent basic services. Violence against women and girls remains a daily occurrence and is “recognized as One of the most serious gender-related problems affecting the whole country – particularly IDPs settlements of South & Central regions including Bay, Bakol, Lower Shabelle and Banadir, with low awareness of the extremely high rates of violence, low reporting rates and effective absence of treatment facilities. On a regular basis, women are beaten by their husbands, girls are forced into marriage in their early teens and sexual violence is reported to be prevalent where bride price is high.

Beyond the limited clinical management of rape (CMR) services, there is no case management or psychosocial support available for survivors of GBV in the district. Urgent funding is needed to provide these services to the people of Baidoa district.

## **3. Description Of Beneficiaries**

This project will target both female and male including men, women, boys and girls in Mogadishu and Baidoa district. The direct beneficiaries will be women and girls who are at risk of Gender Based violence (GBV), 270 Women, 220 Girls and about 150 men and 150 boys in the targeted communities. Indirect Beneficiaries are 9000 (5000 Women, 2000 Girls, 1000 Men, and 1000 Boys) to be reached.

## **4. Grant Request Justification**

Based on the project activities below, this project will strengthen the provision of women with access to legal representation and opportunities to pursue justice against perpetrators of violence through the formal/informal legal system. Promote gender equality within the community and widen access to education for girls, women empowerment through livelihood skills, end forced early marriage and premature pregnancy – the leading cause of death of girls between 15 to 19 years of age. Bring greater attention to violence that is perpetrated by a partner or spouse. These will also contribute to the improvement of the situation of project beneficiaries (Men, Women, Boys and girls) who have been experiencing the incidents of GBV in the project areas.

## **5. Complementarity**

HINNA is currently implementing the following activities in Daynile district:  
 1. Ongoing Prevention and response of Gender Based Violence in HINNA Daynile Family centre with support of UNFPA through Ministry of Women and Human Rights Development (MoWHRD) .  
 HINNA has selected some of the locations for this allocation for integration where possible. Thus, this proposal will complement the ongoing interventions in the target Internal Displaced locations to increase activity and to effectively address the gaps of Gender Based Violence in particular, specifically in the locations not targeted by ongoing interventions to ensure Multi-Sectoral response. HINNA will further coordinate with other clusters and active organizations.

## M & R

### Monitoring & Reporting plan

Women Pioneers for Peace and Life (HINNA), has its M&E policy in place, shall be able to carry out monitoring and evaluation in terms of project activities, objectives, impact and goal however, HINNA will be in compliance with Donors M&E system. The HINNA Board will act as a mechanism to support and provide oversight to the project and will also support the development of narrative and final reports as well as financial report to SHF.

Each month project progress report will be submitted as well as at the end of the project final narrative and financial reports should be submitted to SHF/donor.

HINNA regularly update the 4W matrix and inform the protection cluster and OCHA on the progress. An evaluation will be conducted every month during the project duration to measure effects and/or impact made by the project and learned lessons accordingly. HINNA will hire an independent monitoring person to monitor and evaluate the project activities and its impact. Confidentiality of the survivors will be observed, but for transparency and accountability the telephone contacts of the community volunteers, survivors who received dignity kits will be collected and shared with UNOCHA and protection cluster. HINNA will organize joint monitoring missions with OCHA/protection cluster partners after the project is completed.

### Implementation Plan

All project components will be carried out by the HINNA. The HINNA has recently reinforced its staffing structure to be able to support the expansion the HINNA South Central Somalia witnessed responding to the crisis. The HINNA Management Team (Senior Executive Director (ED), Project Manager (PM), Senior Project officers, including Protection Officer, Administration and Finance officer, field officers to provide adequate support to the increased number of field sites and field operations. Programming is led by the Executive Director along with specific program coordinators per sector.

The ED, in close collaboration with HINNA management team, is responsible for ensuring and maintaining overall program quality through supervising technical staff, conducting monitoring visits, liaising with partners and donors, and supporting compliant, timely, efficient and effective project implementation. The Protection officer is responsible for the support to and oversight of field sites and field operations. The Management team provides grants management oversight and looks at donor compliance, supported by Admin/Finance officer through ensuring adherence to organizational finance manual in consideration with donor financial policy and procedures/regulations and provides technical assistance for financial reporting system.

The proposed project will be directly managed by HINNA management team specific field based project officers who will be responsible for the overall management and technical aspects of the project. The field based project officers will report directly to their respective Field Coordinator (Protection officer) to ensure that all operational and logistical support needed for the success of the project is provided. The project officers will receive remote technical support from project based managers to ensure that the Action is implemented in accordance with the SHF standards and are technically sound. The project based managers will conduct periodic field visits to ensure that the project follows the implementation plan and meets the expectations of both the HINNA and the program participants.

In addition to support quality project implementation, project coordinators are supported by HINNA's Protection units at Regional/HQ level who provide dedicated technical support on programming parameters, tool design and support in M&E systems to ensure adherence to best hard work practices and standards. The HINNA will continue to work closely with relevant partners to strengthen the effectiveness of GBV and protection responses, harmonize coordination, and ensure women's and girls' protection are integrated across responses.
