### **Project Summary:**

The shelter project will support the provision of sustainable transitional shelter and NFIs to the vulnerable IDPs in Northern Baidoa. The project will target new arrivals with NFIs and emergency shelter kits while vulnerable protracted IDPs will be supported with transitional shelter construction. The transitional shelter construction will adopt owner-driven approach where project beneficiaries will be involved in the planning and site layout, actual construction and monitoring. SYPD will provide technical guidance throughout the construction process. The project activities will target an estimated 3000 vulnerable IDPs. Based on the 2014 Somalia demographic profile this is estimated to include 869 women, 812 men, 638 boys,681 girls. Priority will be given to vulnerable female headed households and actual gender disaggregation will be updated after beneficiary registration. The shelter typology will be the charish, with iron sheet (CGI) roof, poles and sticks walls plastered with mud and a raised floor. The typology is the traditional shelter across Somalia and will be readily acceptable to the beneficiaries and appropriate to the temperate climatic conditions. Due to the familiarity with the typology among the beneficiaries, the owner-driven approach will be easily adopted. In addition, the project will provide NFIs to vulnerable IDPs to allow them live a dignified life.

The shelter construction process will mainstream Housing, land and property rights. This will include holding consultations with local authorities, local land owners and host communities to explore longer term security of tenure for IDPs. SYPD will facilitate the acquisition and signing of security of land tenure documents with local authorities to ensure that IDPs are not eventually evicted once the project has been implemented.

The project will incorporate site and settlement planning for every shelter construction to promote secure and safe environment for IDPs. The project will mainstream protection issues for IDPs particularly at night by distributing household solar lamps and street lightin. The provision of household lighting will contribute to prevention of gender -based violence and sexual violence and limit the use of environmental unfriendly energy such as kerosene and firewood for lighting.

The project targets North Baidoa prioritizing settlement sites that have received new arrivals or experiencing IDPs congestion and pressure on existing facilities such as Wadajir 4, Wadajir 3, Ala-amin, Kormari, garasgoof, Xanano 3, Allaweyn, Fatxu-raxman and Eeleiyal among others.

By addressing the protection concerns of vulnerable IDPs, the project will through the Shelter cluster activities enhance the protective environment of the most vulnerable through the adoption of an integrated response model in IDP settlements.

The activities are part of SYPD shelter project in the 2016 HRP; which aims at promoting a more protective environment for most vulnerable IDPs in Banadir, Bay, Bakool, Gedo, Galgaduud, Hiraan, Lower Shabelle and Middle Shabelle regions.

The project will contribute to the achievement of the 2016 Humanitarian Response Plan strategic objective 1, 2 and 3 and specifically to the Shelter cluster objectives; 1. Contribute to the protection of newly displaced people and those affected by natural hazards, 2. Improve the living conditions of protracted IDPs and 3. Facilitate access to durable solutions for IDPs that are willing to locally integrate or return to the place of origin.

The project will adopt the sustainable shelter solutions for IDPs in Baidoa by mainstreaming site and settlement planning, capacity building on the use of local building culture and building back safer and training of trainers to create a locally available of shelter construction skills. To promote durable shelter solutions, the project activities have been strategically designed to include resilience building through cash transfers and owner driven approaches, linking shelter activities to secure land tenure and property rights for IDPs,

### **BACKGROUND**

# 1. Humanitarian context analysis

Internally displaced persons (IDPs) remain a major vulnerable category in Somalia. According to estimates from UNHCR, there are about 1.1 million IDPs, exposed to highest degree of rights violations, such as gender-based violence or forced evictions. Nearly 648,040 people or 68 percent of the total number of people in Crisis and Emergency are IDPs. They continue to live in crowded settlements, in poor shelter conditions, exposed to protection risks and with limited access to basic services including health, sanitation and hygiene facilities. Baidoa is one of the districts hosting large numbers of IDPs in Somalia. IDP settlements in Northern Baidoa are among the worst affected by congestion, lack of shelter, NFIs and other basic services. Housing, land and property rights violations are a central element to address in an integrated response. In addition, 75 per cent of all Gender Based Violence (GBV) incidents recorded occurred in IDP settlements, requiring GBV-mainstreaming activities throughout the cluster system as part of the integrated response.

Analysis of the food security status based on the food consumption score Household Dietary Diversity (HDD) and coping strategies index (CSI) reveals that IDPs have the highest rates of food insecurity. The poor and borderline food consumption score for Baidoa IDPs stands at 20 per cent thus reflecting high level of food insecurity in these areas. Similarly, acute malnutrition remains high in many IDP settlements. Global Acute Malnutrition (GAM) rates among IDPs in major towns are above the emergency threshold of 15 per cent. This is in part attributed to food insecurity and other underlying causes notably protection issues.

Newly arrived IDPs have further exerted pressure on the limited basic services. About 260 households who recently arrived in north Baidoa will require emergency shelter support and NFIs in the meantime while vulnerable protracted IDPs require appropriate and adequate shelter.

## 2. Needs assessment

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Baidoa is one of the districts in Bay region that continue to face huge humanitarian needs particularly affecting IDPs. Baidoa alone hosts about 3,300 IDPs and currently increasing as a result influx of new arrivals from other areas and refugee returnees from Kenya. A two-day Rapid Needs assessment conducted by SYPD on 24 and 25 June 2016 in 33 IDP settlements in Northern Baidia indicates that over 90% of the IIDPs in surveyed settlements live in makeshift shelters exposed to natural hazards. (report uploaded).

Results from INTÉRSOS mapping exercise shows that about 27 settlements (Wadajir 4, Allaweyn, Xanano, Ala-amin, Dukeysane, Garasgoof, Komari, Boonkey, Aykiilaban, Adc3, Wadajir 3, Towfiq, Awal-barawaqo, Fatxu-raxman, Eedkyal, Warsan-nafada, Daarusalam, Alfurgaan, Qasab 2, Gadiidlee, Yaaqdi 2, Abo-asharow, Beladul amin2, Tawakal Adc, Adc 2 Tawfiq and Idaleo in North Baidoa) in North Baidoa are heavily congested and have also proportionally received the largest number of new arrivals, having received 135 and 125 newly displaced and returnee households respectively. In addition the planned repatriation of IDPs from the Dadaab refugee camp in Kenya is likely to increase the humanitarian needs in the already over-stretched services.

The increasing new arrivals and returnees are either hosted by other IDP households or staying in makeshift shelter structures. Hosted IDPs are putting pressure on the already inadequate resources for protracted IDPs while those staying in makeshift shelters are exposed to natural whether elements such as cold at night, rains and hot sun during the day. In addition about 30 per cent of the previously transitional shelter provided by humanitarian partners several years back are dilapidated and need repairs or replacement. At the inception of the project activities, SYPD will conduct a rapid needs assessment or a baseline survey to establish the most vulnerable households who shelter require repairs or replacement.

Due to weak legal mechanisms, lack of land tenure arrangements for IDPs, evictions are carried out without any avenue for redress. To avoid the risk of evictions, SYPD will facilitate security of tenure arrangements with land owners, government officials and local host community.

The absence of durable shelter options for IDPs is further compounded by the lack of other basic services. Current acute malnutrition prevalence stands 17.3 percent, which indicates Critical level, has persisted during the six consecutive Deyr seasons (FSNAU 2016). Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) prevalence had also similar seasonal pattern with Critical levels of acute malnutrition sustained since Deyr 2013. This suggests that the nutrition situations in Baidoa remained sustained Critical levels of malnutrition. These sustained Critical levels of malnutrition are mainly attributed to poor access to safe water and sanitation, low immunization coverage such as Vitamin A (3.6%) and measles (2.4%), which contributed to high morbidity rate (20.4%), and as well as sub-optimal Infant Young Child Nutrition (IYCN) In view of this the shelter project will ensure strong integration and linkages with health, education, protection and nutrition to ensure that basic services are well integrated in the overall spatial layout of the settlements.

## 3. Description Of Beneficiaries

The project will target about 3000 vulnerable Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in the Northern settlements of Baidoa. The target priority locations will include (Wadajir 4, Allaweyn, Xanano, Ala-amin, Dukeysane, Garasgoof, Komari, Boonkey, Aykiilaban, Adc3, Wadajir 3, Towfiq, Awal-barawaqo, Fatxu-raxman, Eedkyal, Warsan-nafada, Daarusalam, Alfurgaan, Qasab 2, Gadiidlee, Yaaqdi 2, Abo-asharow, Beladul amin2, Tawakal Adc, Adc 2 Tawfiq and Idaleo.

The target beneficiaries for transitional shelter will be 720 people from 120 households, while 600 newly arrived IDPs will be provided with emergency shelter kits. About 3000 people including newly arrived IDPs will benefit from NFIs distribution.

## 4. Grant Request Justification

The funding will be timely and will support the provision of appropriate shelter and NFIs for the newly arrived IDPs and vulnerable protracted IDPs in Baidoa. The new arrivals have significantly increased the need for protection services particularly shelter among other sectors. The grant to this project will ensure that vulnerable IDPs receive adequate shelter and Non-food items to allow them a dignified life. The resources will complement other activities currently being implemented by SYPD and other partners in response to the protracted IDPs in Baidoa.

## 5. Complementarity

The project will complement other activities being undertaken by SYPD such as the the distribution of dry food rations to displaced people in Baidoa in partnership with Direct Aid and Wamy. The project will also complement other projects that will be submitted by other partners in other clusters such as WASH, Protection, Food Security, Nutrition, Health, and Education. In Particular the SYPD shelter project will complement other project being submitted for SHF funding under the WASH and Food Security Clusters.

The complementary in project implementation will not only strengthen efficiency in humanitarian response but also ensure value for money by reducing the net operational and transaction costs in response.

## Activity 1.1.1

### Standard Activity: Provision of transitional shelter

Construct 120 sustainable transitional shelter for protracted IDPs. SYPD will hold consultations with women, girls, boys and men as well as local communities to identify the most vulnerable groups. The construction of shelter will adopt owner driven approach where benefiting households will be trained and participate in the actual construction of their shelter. SYPD will compensate them for the manual labour to enable them earn income for the time spend. The shelter typology will be the Chariish and will take into account environmental protection by ensuring that sourcing of building sticks does not contribute to massive deforestation. The typology of the shelter is chosen based on the local building culture and consideration of the appropriateness in terms of temperate climate in the location.

### Activity 1.1.2

## Standard Activity: Site planning and building communal infrastructure

SYPD will carry out area based settlement planning to ensure that IDPS settlement targeted for shelter construction have access roads, well planned layout and common spaces. SYPD will hold consultations IDPs leaders, women, girls men and boys to design appropriate and acceptable layout of the settlements. In addition, SYPD consult relevant clusters such as Shelter cluster, WASH, Education, Health and Protection to ensure site layout is appropriate for the provision of other services.

### Activity 1.1.3

### Standard Activity: Not Selected

SYPD will install solar street lights to enhance the protective environment in the settlements The street lights will be installed in common places such as communal latrines and along the streets.

SYPD will distribute emergency shelter kits to newly arrived IDPs. SYPD will hold consultations with community leaders and IDPs to identify the vulnerable newly arrived IDPs for targeting with Emergency shelter kits.

## **Accountability to Affected Populations**

The beneficiaries have been involved at the needs identification stage through needs assessments and consultations which helped in prioritizing the settlements in Baidoa. During the project implementation, beneficiaries will be involved through community consultations to help identify the appropriate shelter typology, site spatial layout and secure land tenure. This will provide opportunity for IDPs to contribute ideas and determine the type of shelter they need.

Additionally affected people will be involved at the monitoring stage to get their feedback. In particular Post Distribution monitoring exercises and post construction occupancy survey will provide opportunities for IDPs to provide feedback.

Owner driven approach and capacity building for local artisans will build local capacities and also enhance ownership by the affected people. SYPD will establish project steering committees under the different outputs,. The committees will be responsible for receiving unsolicited feedback and complaints on the project implementation from the beneficiaries.

# Implementation Plan

SYPD will be responsible for the overall project implementation in coordination with the Shelter cluster for NFIs in kind contribution and technical guidance. To maximize impact for IDPs, SYPD will promote an integrated approach by liaising with other partners in Baidoa to maximize efficiency, avoid duplication and promote sustainability of achievements.

SYPD will start project implementation with wide consultations with local authorities, IDPs, land owners and host community to ensure that project activities are grounded on realistic expectations and needs on ground. A quick baseline survey will be undertaken at the beginning of project implementation to identify priority beneficiaries and settlements. SYPD will also establish a project implementation committee that will include both women and men. The committee will be in charge of leading the owner-drive construction approach, identifying bottle-necks and contribution ideas during the project implementation process. It will be responsible for receiving complaints and dispute resolution at the project level.

SYPD will adopt the owner-driven approach and community participation to promote local building culture for shelter solutions. The training of trainers' component will create a locally available pool of artisans who will promote the continuity of building back safe and owner –driven approaches. SYPD will ensure that beneficiary feedback is taken into account and feeds into the project learning to improve implementation efficiency. This will done through post distribution and post construction monitoring and beneficiary feedback and complaints mechanism established through project committees.

### Justify Chosen Gender Marker Code

The project design will involve consultations with local beneficiaries including women, girls, boys and men to ensure that shelter typology, design, site and settlement planning takes into considerations the differentiated needs of women and men. Specifically, the project will give priority to vulnerable women headed households. The implementation of project activities such as distribution of household solar lamps will enhance the protective environment for women and girls. Planned training of trainers will include women as well as men.

### **Protection Mainstreaming**

The project will mainstream protection issues particularly to ensure that women are not exposed to gender-based violence, discrimination and evictions. SYPD will design shelters with lockable doors and ensure that site and settlement layout provides easy and secure access to sanitation facilities.

The project specifically includes the distribution of Solar lamps to each household and installation of solar street lamps at common facilities such as latrines to provide good lighting and ensure protection for IDPs at night especially women from sexual abuse.

SYPD will facilitate secure land tenure through consultations with local authorities, land owners and host community to ensure that IDPs are not exposed to human rights violations through evictions. SYPD will facilitate linkages with other clusters such as food security to support livelihood rebuilding.

SYPD will hold consultations with women, girls, boys and men as well as local communities to identify the most vulnerable groups. The construction of shelter will adopt owner driven approach where benefiting households will be trained and participate in the actual construction of their shelter. SYPD will compensate them for the manual labour to enable them earn income for the time spend. The shelter typology will be the Chariish and will take into account environmental protection by ensuring that sourcing of building sticks does not contribute to massive deforestation.
