### 3. BACKGROUND AND NEEDS ANALYSIS (please adjust row size as needed)

(A) Describe the project rationale based on identified issues, describe the humanitarian situation in the area, and list groups consulted.*	<p>In Cabudwaq, FSNAU Post Gu 2010 assessment reported that 8,000 people were in Humanitarian Emergency (HE) while 9,000 people were in Acute Food and Livelihood Crisis (AFLC). This is roughly 1,334 HHs in HE and 1,500 HHs in AFLC. All these people are pastoralists who live in Cabudwak district.</p> <p>Despite the crisis in the earlier Post findings, the pastoralists expected to recover from the crisis sparked by spells of drought with the hope of the good Deyr rains; however, Deyr rains failed completely in the target area. In addition to the above-mentioned people in humanitarian crisis, the failure of the Deyr rains has even caused the situation to be worse as the condition became critical for the better-off households who expected to consolidate the gains they made in Gu 2010.</p> <p>The lives of these pastoralists are now in danger due to the expected long dry spell which may render most of them destitute. The humanitarian crisis of these pastoralists is compounded by high food prices, water and conflict. The poor pastoralists in Cabudwaq have limited opportunities for migration, while their asset holdings are low and coping capacity eroded by consecutive seasons of drought. As result, more livestock, particularly the small ruminants are feared to disappear during this long dry spell mainly due to water pasture and water shortages. The distances between water zones and grazing has become unbearable for both the livestock and the their owners. In the area, Berkedds have dried up as early as October and commercial traders are taking the opportunity to explore the lucrative water trucking business. The poor and weak face a difficult scenario as they cannot afford the high water prices. A barrel of water is sold at a price of \$5, the highest since the onset of the drought. The situation demands for an urgent intervention in order to save the lives of the destitute pastoral households and their assets. Therefore, the aim of this project is to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Provide water to the destitute and vulnerable pastoral communities and their livestock in order to mitigate the disastrous effects of the drought</li> </ul>

If necessary, attach a table with information for each location.*	<p>The impact of the drought has disastrously affected the lives of the pastoral community who solely depend on livestock resources as their day to day mainstay. However, the drought has reduced both the production level and body conditions of livestock. This crisis in Abudwak district and the entire region persisted for almost five years as rains have either performed poorly or below average. The Post GU assessment of FSNAU in 2010 indicated that a total of 17,000 persons, mainly pastoralists, remained in HE or in AFLC. And with the failure of Deyr rains, the situation has further turned miserable and depressing. The critical needs of the worst affected pastoralists include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Water for the pastoralists and the livestock is a major problem affecting them.</li> <li>- Escalating prices of water which the vulnerable households are not able to afford.</li> <li>- The distance to the water points for livestock which is making livestock weaker.</li> <li>- Availability of pasture has vanished around the water points and that distant areas with little pasture still available have no water.</li> </ul> <p>This intervention, which PASOS proposes will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Ensure access and availability of water for 1329 pastoral households and 53160 goats and sheep and 7392 cows belonging to the households.</li> <li>- Enable beneficiaries' access water from the commercial traders involved in water trucking through the voucher system.</li> <li>- Allow the vulnerable pastoralists, who have already compromised food intake to meet water demands, spend more on food expenditure as water demands will be met by PASOS.</li> </ul>

Presently, PASOS is has finalised a urban hygiene and sanitation campaign in Abudwak and does not have any ongoing project at the moment. In the previous drought of 2008, PASOS has implemented a drought response project with FAO with components of FFW and distribution of meat through butchering of small ruminants.</p>

<b>(W) Implementation Plan*</b> Describe how you plan to implement these activities	<p>Strategically, the proposed intervention intends to mitigate the effects of water shortages facing the pastoral communities and their livestock in Abudwak town of Galgaduud region. The response will apply the voucher for water system. The intervention proposes to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Provide water to the vulnerable and most destitute households and their livestock in order to tackle the critical water shortages facing them.</li> <li>- To reduce the long distance human being and animals trek to distance boreholes, this makes them weaker.</li> <li>- To enable water availability for the livestock to areas close to pasture areas.</li> <li>- Reduce the beneficiaries' expenditure on water and increase their expenditure on food and other livelihood needs essentials.</li> </ul> <p>Through the voucher for water systems, the project will support 1329 pastoral households with 53160 goats and 7392 cows in ten villages around Abudwak town. The project will provide 5 liters of water to every household per day for a period of four weeks (30 days). Each household will therefore require 900 liters of water for the period of 30 days. A total of 1,116,360 liters of water will be supplied to the beneficiaries for the 30 days period.</p>

The project team on the ground will conduct daily monitoring exercise. Both challenges and lessons will be noted and absorbed into the process of implementation and future programs.</p> <p>Activities that will be monitored will include the following: (1) Community mobilisation activities. (2) Identification, selection and registration of beneficiaries and their locations. (3) Identification of money vendors. (4) Identification of water vendors (5) Distribution of water vouchers (6) Working success of the water vouchers system (7) Payment of money vendors to water vendors (8) and the impact of the project to the beneficiaries.</p> <p>The selection of beneficiaries will be done through consultation with Pastoral Committees for Relief. Along with this pastoral committees, the project will also establish Village Project Committees (VPCs) who will support in the selection of beneficiaries. The selection will therefore be done through a consultative method involving the Pastoral Committee for Relief (PCR), the VPCs and the project team. The targeted beneficiaries will include: the poor pastoral families, poor women and their livestock and the marginalised communities.</p>
