(A) Describe the project rationale based on identified issues, describe the humanitarian situation in the area, and list groups consulted.

There are clear indications that the humanitarian situation in Gedo region is worsening as a result of below average precipitation caused by La Nina meteorological phenomenon. The failure of the Deyr rains is demonstrated by failed crops and severe crop and pasture shortages in most key pastoral zones in the region causing deterioration of livestock body condition. Due to critical climatic conditions, abnormal migration of livestock, mainly small ruminants, is going on and livestock body conditions is have started to weaken especially for cattle and lactating animals.

Besides, the food security conditions in the entire region have also started to deteriorate with a significant negative impact on crop, livestock body conditions and overall market performance.

The "deyr" short rains either failed or performed below average in Gedo region and consequently the entire region has begun to experience multiple shocks including inadequate access to drinking water for both human and livestock, inadequate access to pasture for livestock and failure of rainfall dependent crops in both the agro-pastoralists areas and riverine communities causing decline in livestock prices and escalation of prices for critical food items thus resulting in unfavourable purchasing power among vulnerable households.

An Inter Agency Assessment in the region indicated that the entire pastoral food economy group has been affected. And due to the intensity of the drought, body conditions of small ruminants have started to deteriorate. Cattle death of already been observed in pastoral settlements arouns Bardera long before the harsh Jilaal season commenced. According to the assessment jointly conducted in December, some critical findings indicated that:

Prices of 20lt jerican increased from 0.04\$ to 0.08\$ probably due to reliance on tankered water, high cost of water from boreholes due to increased operation and maintenance costs and reduced number of sources.

Pasture situation is pathetic in the entire region where a bale (20kg) of fodder increased from 5\$ to 10\$. The little pasture available from remnants of the last "Gu" season has remained in areas far away from water sources. The areas with some pasture but no water include Damero, Well harrar, Habadaale, Babaa, Buraxado, Ramu, Toosiley and Goofo in north

Livestock prices declined by 49% as compared to two months ago according to the findings of the assessment. Households in surveyed communities entirely depend on market purchases for their food sources while prices of key

food items increased by of 55.5% as compared to the last two months. Critically, the locally produced commodities are In regards to the needs of the drought affected communities, SADO, ASEP, NAPAD and ADA are not implementing any activities in related to the drought. The activities so far undertaken was to carry a joint inter-agency assessment that was aimed at identifying the effects of the drought and the immediate needs of the local communities. Presently, only ASEP is presently distributing dairy goats in Dolow which will be finalised by the end of this month.
