3. BACKGROUND AND NEEDS ANALYSIS (please adjust row size as needed)

(A) Describe the project rationale based on identified issues, describe the humanitarian situation in the area, and list groups consulted. (maximum 1500 characters) *	The humanitarian situation in Ceel Waaq district of Gedo region in Somalia continues to deteriorate with the prolonged drought that has continued to ravage the area since late last year. Some additional 16,320 people (2,720 households) are in dire need of assistance after the drying up of all the 12 shallow wells, the main source of water for the pastorals and their livestock. The main productive borehole on the Somalia side at Damassa is far from the 10 settled villages with an average distance of 53.1km (ranging from 36 to 72km from the nearest to the furthest location). The current conflict between militia and TFG troops in Bulla Hawa has raised tensions with people fearing the fighting may escalate to Ceel Waaq, Somalia. Meanwhile, men have moved away with livestock in search for water and pasture, leaving the vulnerable women and children to care for the calves and shoats as well as to fend for themselves. Pasture- and water-related conflicts are being reported in the areas they have migrated to in the neighboring Somali districts, as well as in Kenya and Ethiopia. Due to lack of alternative livelihoods, the community lacks income to pay for water from water vendors who collect the water from the Damassa borehole for sale. Women are forced to walk long distances in search of water in the remaining shallow wells which are on the verge of drying up. Consequently, access to water per person per day has

(maximum 1500 characters) *	As described above, the ten locations have faced dire need for water. Household data indicates the current water available is 2 litres per person per day, which is hardly enough to sustain the needs for cooking, washing, bathing and drinking. See Excel table for information on households, population, distance and direction to water source. The voucher system will be used as an emergency measure for 6 weeks and will provide an additional 3.3 litres per person per day, raising the intake per person to 5.3 litres per day. Villagers will be trained on hygiene practices so as to reduce the prevalence of waterborne diseases.
(C) List and describe the activities that your organization is currently implementing to address these needs.(maximum 1500 characters)	Hygiene promotion campaigns, chlorination of water at household level, distribution of chlorine tablets through vouchers at household level, peace dialogue among communities conflicting due to water and pasture shortage, and water pan rehabilitation are activities being undertaken in the area to address the issues of hygiene and conflict. The water pan is expected to provide water harvesting infrastructure for future.

The project work plan will be key in the monitoring of the project. The matrix of water supplied and the vouchers signed per delivery as well as randomized routine check-ups will be critical in affirming that beneficiaries receive water. This will be done on a weekly basis in order to avoid issues that may arise and inform the need for change in project strategy if necessary. The data from these forms will be collated used to calculate the total number of beneficiaries and the amounts of water provided. Event documentation forms will be used to document hygiene promotion activities. These forms will document every hygiene promotion activity detailing the objective, outcome, number of participants by gender. Home visits will be used to observe changes in hygiene. Soma-action based in Ceel Waaq and we are long partner with UNICEF and WFP, 10yrs partner with CARE somalia for Rural Food Security Project (RFSP) in Ceel Waaq district. We also have enough local staff which can access in our project area and enough stock of chlorine tablets in Ceelwaaq-District.
