3. BACKGROUND AND NEEDS ANALYSIS (please adjust row size as needed)

(A) Describe the project rationale based on identified issues, describe the humanitarian situation in the area, and list groups consulted. (maximum 1500 characters) *	Puntland State, like other parts of Somalia is facing severe la nina drought. The failure of dyer rains season lead to severe water crisis in the country. The dyer crop production failed, reaching only 19% of average. The expected drought, as reported by FSNAU on 28th Jan. 2011 and further confirmed by HADMA in Puntland has materialized reversing the gains made in the earlier good gu-rains season. Reduced cereal production combined with high inflation rates and dwindling purchasing power of communities will impact on incomes and consequent labor opportunities for IDPs and urban population. This means their incomes will reduce, and with rising food prices, further cut food access at household level. IDPs and host communities in Garowe are already experiencing gaps in access to water, food, reduced labor opportunities and loss of livelihoods. It is in the public domain, that Somalia, a country facing political and security turmoil, thriving piracy and being semi arid will be the worst hit by drought in the horn of Africa. Prior to the drought, and as alluded in the inter-agency humanitarian gap analysis (HGA) report, IDPs in Garowe town were already facing

(maximum 1500 characters) *	<p>IDPs in Garowe have established some local leadership through the settlement committees. This mechanism collaborate directly and on behalf of the IDPs with the local authorities, mayors and district commissioners and other government arms to address problems facing IDPs. Often they step in to solve resource conflicts such as fights over access to water points, sanitation facilities and so on. Though the humanitarian gap analysis (HGA) report which was recently finalized, and attached herewith, its findings point to various gaps such as congestion in camps and lack of access to basic services such as toilets, garbage disposal, non food items like utensils, blankets, etc.</p> <p>The project will target 11 IDP settlements in Garowe (Nugaal region), with a total population of 11,586, 55% females.</p>
(C) List and describe the activities that your organization is currently implementing to address these needs.(maximum 1500 characters)	Currently, NCA is running the Garowe UNHCR warehouse where stocks of prepositioned items are stored, and from where they are distributed to needy communities. IDPs in Garowe, from time to time, have benefited from this supply. Previously NCA has undertaken water, sanitation and hygiene and income generating interventions targeting IDPs and host communities, and particularly women headed households in the said sites. At the moment, however, NCA is implementing a counter-piracy project which combines components of awareness raising, vocational skills training, seed capital grants and business skills training.

At field level, the implementing team will be lead by the Team Leader, operating out of Garowe field office and supported by a water and livelihood officer, an emergency officer, and a field accountant. The IDP settlement committees will be important elements of the implementation as they will provide IDPs mobilization, buy in and participate in launch, orientation and training activities. Stakeholders such as HADMA representing the government, INGOs and local UN agencies staff will be mobilized to form a IDP Shelter emergency response mechanism. A team of Program and finance staff, operating from Nairobi will provide technical backstopping and support to the field implementers and will make at least one field visits over the life of the project.

Monitoring will be an on going activity throughout the project life. Field visits, observation, debriefs/meetings, and use of detailed work plans are part of M&E plan used. Field-based technical staff will conduct the activities and progressively report using the field monitoring tool. Information collected from reports will be used to inform routine decisions (for remedial /corrective action) and for compilation of substantive reports. The field office will submit progress reports detailing achievement of results. The staff will hold regular meetings to evaluate project using NCA M&E guideline.

The IDP camp committees and key stakeholders are part of the monitoring process. They will provide feedback on project execution and its impact on the lives of IDPs. In selection of project beneficiaries communities will be consulted for buy in and support. The Nairobi Program office will undertake occasional field visits for backstopping and will regularly review progress reports from the field office. In monitoring telephone and internet services will also be used. The program officer will make atleast 2 field visits over project life and will submit Cluster reports like the 3W, data and others as required. Before and after photos will be documented and where possible GPS data. UNOCHA is also expected to partake in monitoring as ell.
