(maximum 1500 characters) *	<p>This proposal is targeted at Hiran (Access to Food), severely impacted by the current La Niña drought. FSNAU shows 32% of all Somalis are in HE, 75% of Hiran's rural population are in AFLC/HE, La Niña impacts food security by: prolonged drought (less food, child malnutrition-1/4 MAM, 1/23 SAM in SC), less casual work/wages); increasing food prices; poor livestock conditions, disease as animals migrate to water sources (also separating families) and lower prices (ie pastoralists income); stress on poverty-affected HHs' income from accumulated debt; recurring conflict (displacement, economic disruption). #s of food insecure people will continue to rise in 2011 and vulnerable HHs will continue negative coping strategies to survive.</p> <p>People in all LVH zones are suffering from long-term poor rains and their capacity to withstand the current crisis during the dry season is very limited. In Hiran, emergency food security intervention will protect child nutrition in vulnerable HHs. SC has worked for 18 yrs in</p>

(maximum 1500 characters) *	<p>CAPACITIES: SC staff in Hiran implemented a successful DFID funded cash grant program linked to nutrition in 2010 targeting 2,500 children/families. Lessons learnt were documented &amp; will be applied to this program. SC's strength is direct implementation and community acceptance;</p> <p>FSNAU/FEWSNET and cluster information supplements knowledge applied to cash grant activities.</p> <p>NEEDS: Predicted normal to below-avg rains for April-11, livestock deaths, increasing cereal prices and extreme food stress will continue to seriously impact poor and vulnerable HHs. The cost of minimum food basket keeps increasing for the past 5 months: cereal prices have risen (for instance sorghum: 4% between January and February, 54% compared to last year). Acute malnutrition</p>
<b>(C)</b> List and describe the activities that your organization is currently implementing to address these needs.(maximum 1500 characters)	<p>Since 1992 SC has implemented humanitarian and development activities in nutrition, FS&amp;L, WASH and education. SC runs an emergency nutrition programme (ECHO) in Hiran and reached 15,500 SAM &amp; MAM children in 2010. In 2011 there will be 50 OTPs reaching up to 6330 SAM children. It is not possible to implement SFP in Hiran at present, hence a marked increase in OTP admissions. OTPs patients will receive a cash supplement to increase food security as per CHF Access to Food envelope (2025 SAM children).</p>

In addition community based targeting will be applied by community leaders. A key component of success is the the community sensitisation and mobilisation: meetings with elders and local administration explaining the targeting, the cash transfer process are essntial to ensure full community participation and buy-in to the principles of assisting the poorest and most vulnerable. Money will be delivered by money lenders to beneficiarys bearing SAC identity cards

Effective monitoring will incorporate lessons from past projects/evaluations and will be based on info from previous baselines, market assessments, as well as climate / food security sitreps. Ongoing monitoring includes regular feedback through the UN Cluster. End-use monitoring, involving a random number of beneficiary households will be conducted to better understand their involvement in project activities, their use of cash, the delivery system & their degree of satisfaction, and the impact of the scheme on their household food&LVH security. Other stakeholder feedback is also a component (community committee members) plus regular price monitoring in local markets. Monthly (internal) and quarterly (external/donor) progress reports against project indicators. FGDs at end of project will gather qualitative information to reinforce impact findings and to inform the project implementation on processes. A complaints mechanism will handle concerns raised by beneficiary communities, and these (plus their resolution) will be included in reports as will project photos and any other documentary verification.

At a field level, close monitoring will be required on cash payment days, to ensure that the quantity and quality of the cash are correct (torn notes are a concern to beneficiaries) and that the system is not abused. Log and Finance Manager will advise on compliance/procedures, Reg'l Manager will oversee all.
