(maximum 1500 characters) *	Lower Shabelle Region has been experiencing significant influx of the displaced population from Southern regions of Somalia due to food crisis being experienced currently. The situation is very pathetic since there is high mortality rates amongst children under 5years as well as increased malnutrition rates amongst children, pregnant and lactating women as well as the aged. The situation is exacerbated by food inaccessibility due to limited food products resulting unaffordable price, limited milk supply in the market as a good number of livestock have succumbed to drought. The failure of Gu 2010 rains has greatly impacted to the current food crisis. According to FSNAU – FEWSNT press release of July 19, 2011, evidence of severely reduced food access, acute malnutrition, and crude mortality indicates that a famine is currently ongoing in two areas of southern Somalia: the Bakool agropastoral livelihood zones and all areas of Lower Shabelle. This crisis represents the most serious food insecurity situation in the world today, in terms of both scale and severity. Current humanitarian response is inadequate to meet emergency needs. Humanitarian support in the project area is limited by the presence of al-shabab militia group. SSWC has access to the project area as we have been working in different programmes in the area. The organization has local staffs who are able to access the area. FSNAU- FEWSNET of 19th July 2011 confirmed the crisis.

The selected beneficiaries will be issued with payment vouchers, containing their names, IDP camp, food products to be redeemed by the voucher, date when food is collected, IDP committee leaders sign and SSWCs staff sign. A money vendor and food vendor will be identified. The selection of food vendor will be an open competitive process based on the costs of their products, their experience verified by the local authority, IDPs committee members and beneficiaries. SSWC field staff will survey the current market prices and determine the cost of food per voucher. Money vendor will issue money to the food vendors with details of target beneficiaries. Beneficiaries will obtain food

Evaluation will carried out at the end of the project. Project monitoring will be continuous and will include both monitoring of the impact of the implemented activities, as well as its effectiveness in achieving the result indicators. The project Manager and field staffs will carefully monitor the project on daily basis and document all activities to ensure effective implementation and in particular targeting the project beneficiaries. The project manager will produce weekly progress reports on activities till their completion. Monitoring from project start will be supported by the use of a logical framework. The project manager and board of directors will ensure that monitoring and evaluation information is recorded in an accurate and consistent way, and that reporting is done in a timely manner.
