**3. BACKGROUND AND NEEDS ANALYSIS (please adjust row size as needed)**

(maximum 1500 characters) *	<p>The AMISOM offensive in the Afgoye corridor, TFG-led evictions of IDPs from public buildings in Mogadishu, and consolidation of IDP settlements have led to increased internal displacement and an unknown number of displaced individuals relocating to 77 IDP camps in Daynile, Zone K in Hodan and in the Afgoye corridor. There are over 180 settlements, with an IDP population of 184,378 individuals, most of them residing in the above-mentioned districts (UNHCR, Oct 11); some 40,000 people are reported to have been displaced from the Afgoye corridor to Mogadishu in recent weeks, (mostly ending up in existing IDP settlements).</p> <p>The protection situation in IDP settlements is dire due to poor infrastructure, lack of social services, predatory gatekeepers, inadequate security forces and ongoing conflict and insecurity. Service delivery remains difficult as access remains poor. GBV incidents have increased. Girls and boys are becoming orphaned, separated from their social support systems, and at risk of recruitment into armed groups, sexual abuse and trafficking.</p> <p>DRC's long-standing presence in the area and active engagement with the Protection Cluster has enabled DRC to acquire accurate primary and secondary information through consultation with UNHCR, Child Protection and GBV Working Groups, LNGOs like Somali Peace Line, Community Concern Organization (COCO), Organization for Somalis Protection and Development (OSPAD), IDP Committees, gatekeepers, authorities and other stakeholders. In this project, DRC will target 3 IDP camps with total beneficiary number of 88,060.</p>

(maximum 1500 characters) *	<p>In Mogadishu and Lower Shabelle, women and children form 80% of the displaced populations. The existing mechanisms and structures are inadequate to provide a protective environment.</p> <p>The number of GBV incidents is unknown, but reports suggest that numbers are on the rise due to the increasing IDP population, with larger IDP camps putting vulnerable people more at risk, and increased vulnerability of women and girls during displacement (Badbaado assessment, Aug 11). The number of reported GBV cases in South-Central Somalia has nearly quadrupled compared to the same reporting period in 2010, with 332 incidents reported from Jan to July 11 (PMN).</p> <p>The immediate needs of displaced children remain unmet as most IDP shelters do not meet basic standards; camps are overcrowded and lack space for children to receive protective care. Children encounter a number of concerns and challenges: 1) In Lower Shabelle, 12% of care-givers reported their children's safety was a major concern in terms of forced recruitment and early marriage; 2) In Lower Shabelle, 21% of respondents reported violence in relation to the distribution of food aid, 3) Sexual violence against children was found to be a prominent issue (CPWG, Sep 11).</p> <p>Activities under this project will be carried out in the same locations where DRC's WASH activities occur if access is guaranteed and IDPs are not facing eviction threats. DRC will work through partners in areas of insecurity and inaccessibility, including Afgoye.</p>
<b>(C)</b> List and describe the activities that your organization is currently implementing to address these needs.(maximum 1500 characters)	<p>In 2011, DRC conducted trainings and workshops for local leaders and key community members on local advocacy, indigenous fundraising, community watch, improved equity and accountability of IDP settlement governance, conflict management and resolution skills, improved resource management, sharing and resourcing, role/rights/responsibilities of aid providers/receivers.</p> <p>Additionally, DRC supported the construction of safe social spaces, which encouraged community cohesion to promote socialization of different community members. DRC piloted a social spaces programme in 2009 that built social spaces for adults and play areas for children in the Afgoye corridor. These spaces allowed for improved social interaction, a place of rest, and protection from heat/rain (as most of the makeshift homes are cramped and not waterproof). The social spaces are used by the residents of the settlements and by visiting neighbours and friends. The beneficiaries felt that the social spaces facilities improved interaction and cohesion within the settlement.</p> <p>DRC contributed to the Protection cluster assessment of Badbaado IDP settlement and the CPWG protection assessments in 2011. New activities are always accompanied by a baseline assessment, results of which are shared with the Protection cluster.</p>

<b>(W) Implementation Plan*</b> Describe how you plan to implement these activities (maximum 1500 characters)	<p>This action is implemented through a participatory, rights-based approach with information dissemination and service provision engaging relevant stakeholders and beneficiaries to assure support for protection mechanisms and structures. This action consults with men, women, host community, IDPs, CSOs, NGOs, CBOs, Protection Cluster and the CP and GBV Working Groups and relevant government agencies through small group engagement and capacity building and uses training curricula specific to the Somali context and technically advised by DRC. Information-sharing among these relevant stakeholders ensures the provision of appropriate tools and assessments for referrals and services for children and GBV survivors.</p> <p>Target groups and beneficiaries will increase their theoretical knowledge and practical output to act as change agents in the community via context-specific capacity building on rights and gender. Awareness raising/mobilization are expected to yield positive solutions to change traditional norms and attitudes towards GBV and gender equality. Beneficiary selection will be determined by aDRC developed vulnerability tool outlining the criteris to be used. DRC will finalize the criteria for this intervention with the local community during the mobilization and in close coordination with members of the Protection Cluster and CPWG.</p> <p>Community-watch groups to be established using DRC's internal guidelines and existing curricula that consider the context and allow for external variables. DRC will apply the international protection principles/guidelines for child-friendly spaces (CFS) in emergencies. CFSs include safe play areas, nutritious snacks, and activities through local partners selected by DRC and frequent monitoring by DRC protection staff. All activities will be directly implemented by DRC with the exception of the daily management of the CFSs which will be done through local partners selected through established partner selection procedures.</p>

Partner 1 will be responsible for all activities implemented in Zone K and 77, while partner 2 will implement all activities in Abdi. Monitoring and evaluation will be conducted on a systematic basis, with several monitoring benchmarks to ensure proper progress, quality control and impact. At inception, a work plan detailing the activities will be developed to guide on implementation of the activities. A Monitoring &amp; Evaluation Plan will be developed at the beginning of the project to guide on capturing progress and achievements, and highlight how data will be collected. In Lower Shabelle and Benadir, security is likely to limit consistent access to program areas by senior managers, but measures will put in place to ensure quality adherence. For internal monitoring, monthly progress reports will be documented. All periodic reports will adhere to donor requirements, disaggregated data by gender, age and diversity. Pre and post-training tests will be conducted to measure the effectiveness of training activities. Community-watch groups will be provided with logbooks to record human rights violations and will be supported through routine supervision. The CFSs activities will be reviewed after every 3 months, to determine whether the activities are producing meaningful improvements in the lives of the boys and the girls. Children needs will be monitored and identified for further action for instance, identify unaccompanied to refer to agencies dealing with family tracing. Compliance with the Humanitarian Accountability Partnership (HAP) benchmarks will be ensured and monitored during the project.</p>
