A. Humanitarian Context (Context Analysis)

In South Sudan, some 180 humanitarian agencies including UN agencies, NGOs, diplomatic missions and donor organizations are providing humanitarian assistance to, but not limited to, refugees, host populations, IDPs and conflict-affected populations. The humanitarian community are responding to the humanitarian crisis in various hot spots across the ten States and access by road is a major challenge.

South Sudan is the size of Austria and Switzerland combined, yet there are no paved roads outside of the capital and the road network are comprised of dirt roads and bush tracks. During the approaching rainy season, the roads become completely impassable and 60 per cent of the country will not be accessible by surface transportation. Several areas are not safe for road travels due to risk of encountering armed militia groups, armed bandits and several sections of the roads, particularly in the Northern border states are mined. Other stretches can only be accessed through travelling under the most strict security precautions, which ties down extra resources and prolong the travelling time significantly.

The significant increase in demand for humanitarian agencies to access areas affected by recent humanitarian crisis has led to an increased exposure to security risks. The border areas with Sudan are the most insecure to continued conflict as evidence by recent bombardments.

Lack of medical facilities in the remote areas in the states call for continued air Medevac capability. Humanitarian community personnel are getting assisted in many critical Medevac situations through DSS air plane transport. Ensuring the continuation of the DSS air plane is an urgent priority to increase the security posture of the humanitarian community.

With the current funds available to DSS, the operation cannot be sustained beyond June 2012. Unless additional funding is received the provision of security services and urgent movements and relocation/evacuation of humanitarian personnel from remote corners through the DSS plane will have to be suspended. This will severely affect the security posture of humanitarian actors in the field. Immediate funds are needed to extend the operation and to sustain not only DSS but the humanitarian community's ability to respond to the crisis in South Sudan in a safe manner.

C. Project Description

The CHF reserve will allow for the DSS plane to operate at least until the end of the year thus supporting the humanitarian community in South Sudan for the on-going emergency response. The activities of the project will be crucial to the organizations and agencies working in the area of operation to ensure:

- access for rapid assessment teams to move into locations throughout the country
- the safety of staff deployed in the area of operation through the facilitation and provision of medical or security based evacuations.
- movement of life saving security items.

With this funding proposal DSS will be able to continue offering security support for an additional period of six months across ten States in South Sudan through the following activities:

- Timely security assessments and movements of humanitarian personnel
- Timely evacuation/relocation of humanitarian personnel in case of need due to security or medical reasons.
- Submission of regular analytical reports on security situation across ten States in South Sudan.

Approximately 2857 UN humanitarian personnel and 3500 INGO personnel working in or on mission to South Sudan are able to be rapidly provided transport or relocated in case of emergency requirement and medically evacuated by UNDSS, with a dedicated plane for this purpose that counts with the necessary medical equipment for MEDEVACs.
