## Qualitative achievements against outcomes and results:

**Costa Rica:** IOM continues to work in coordination with national stakeholders to ensure access to health services for mobile indigenous populations.

**Nicaragua:** IOM continues to advocate with national partners for the inclusion of migrants in influenza pandemic plans. IOM raised awareness of ILIs with Nicaraguan migrant communities in border areas.

**Panama:** IOM continues to strengthen partnership with national stakeholders to conduct activities on ILIs for indigenous populations.

**Ukraine:** UN partner agencies representatives and IOM staff involved in providing services to migrants were provided with counseling and communication skills with the objective to roll-out the training with other partner organizations working with migrant populations.

**Geneva:** IOM Geneva head quarters continue to provide technical support for capacity building and training relating to pandemic preparedness, migration health and other migration management areas. The importance of counseling and communication skills during crisis situation was promoted during a forum for African diaspora health professionals held in Bern Switzerland.
