## PROBLEM STATEMENT

In 2009, the UN drafted its *Joint Vision for Sierra Leone*, in line with the Government of Sierra Leone's *Agenda for Change*. The document establishes a general framework for donor cooperation in an effort to combine efforts and resources in support of the Government of Sierra Leone and its people. Canada, as chair of the UN Peacebuilding Commission's (PBC) Sierra Leone Country Configuration, aligned the Commission's peacebuilding priorities with those of the Agenda for Change and the Joint Vision. As a result the PBC resolved to prioritize the following three issues: 1) Good governance and the rule of law; 2) Combating illicit drug trafficking; and 3) Addressing youth unemployment.

The UN Development Programme established a Multi-Donor Trust Fund (MDTF) for Sierra Leone in order to catalyze support toward peacebuilding priorities. The modest contribution to the MDTF proposed in this concept note touch upon the PBC priorities 1 (Good governance and the rule of law) and 3 (Adressing youth unemployment). The MDTF has 22 programme themes of which the following two were selected:

Support to Democratic Institutions – Sierra Leone's decade long conflict was in part due to poor governance and societal breakdown, with the main drivers of violence being exclusion and lack of access to resources and power by certain groups of people in the society. Democratic gains made in Sierra Leone through recent peaceful national and local elections will not in itself assure the entrenchment of democratic values in the country which is dominated by a strong executive. Democratic institutions such as the Independent Media Commission (IMC) will need support if it is to continue to play a leading role in arbitrating between the media and the Government and the public at large. In addition, the main national broadcasting radio station (Sierra Leone Broadcasting Service) was mostly controlled by the government in power, while access by the opposition parties was generally restricted. This radio station is now being transformed into a public broadcaster, the Sierra Leone Broadcasting Corporation (SLBC), with the sole aim of ensuring free access by all and thus avoids government control and monopoly of its use. Support will be needed to ensure its smooth transition to an effective and impartial public broadcaster that will benefit all Sierra Leoneans.

Local Governance and Decentralization - The newly decentralized local governance system has created considerable overlap with the new local governments and the existing traditional chiefdom government. As traditional leaders play a vital role in local justice and governance and generally hold the trust and respect of their local population, their leadership needs to be an integral part of new local governance structure. This integration of local governments and traditional chiefdom governments is an ongoing and complex process. A very important factor of the chiefdom governance is the chief's administration of the lease of land. The system requires some revision to bring it in line with modern conditions, especially with regard to increasing agricultural production and leasing land to large international investments. Thus the funds will be used to support part of the land tenure policy reform process. In addition, it is vital to include youth in the decentralization process to prevent disenfranchisement and reduce the potential for incidences of political violence such as those that occurred in Freetown in March of 2009. Support is needed to ensure integration takes place to the satisfaction of the people of Sierra Leone and that critical issues surrounding children and youth do not slip through the cracks. Professional orientation of traditional chiefdom government is needed as they are often constrained by poor organisation and lack trained personnel and technical expertise.

#### **ACTIVITIES**

Specific projects flowing from Canada's contribution to the MDTF will be determined by the fund managers. Examples of project activities under the two programme themes selected are as follows:

#### Support to Democratic Institutions:

- Support the SLBC's transition to a public broadcaster:
  - Train government functionaries and the civil society on what to expect of the new SLBC;
  - Establish a SLBC transition monitoring unit;
  - Hold national seminars for journalists on communicating development issues;
  - Train radio editorial and management personnel in Freetown, Bo and Makeni;
- Support the growth of the IMC
  - Establish a second satellite office in the northern district of Makeni.

#### Local Governance and Decentralization:

- Support for local level child and youth issues:
  - Disseminate current information on child rights and highlight the situation of children to traditional leaders;
  - Sensitize communities on child rights issues;
  - Build the capacity of new local and traditional governments in collaboration with other UN Agencies and development partners in planning services for children and youth.
  - Support the start up of Child Welfare Departments in the Local Councils
  - Support the rollout of Direct Programme Support/HACT procedures in all Local Council
- Strengthen the chiefdom governance system to pay a significant role in the new local governance structure:
  - Revise the chiefdom governance policy
  - Develop the Chiefdom Governance Act
  - o Revise all laws associated with chiefdom governance
  - Revise the Local Government Act 2004
  - Support the roll-out of the new decentralization policy
  - Develop a database of chiefs and chiefdom governance
  - Support the development local economic development which is led by the local councils (in this
    case Kenema City and Kenema District councils)
  - Support to the local governments through capacity development of the Department for Local Government, Ministry of Local Government and Rural Development.
  - Support the inclusion of the local councils and chiefs in the formulation of the new Land Tenure Policy.

#### EXPECTED IMMEDIATE OUTCOMES

### Support to Democratic Institutions:

- Increased sensitization of the role of the new Sierra Leone Broadcasting Corporation by Government functionaries, local councils, civil society and the Sierra Leonean population;
- Increased monitoring capacity of the IMC fostering independent and non-partisan media;
- Improved skills of journalists to cover development related news:
- Increased awareness of the media journalists, reporters and managers on ethical and legal norms;

### Local Governance and Decentralization:

- Increased capacity of the Local Councils and Traditional Chiefdom Governance to undertake their functions and manage resources
- Increased knowledge of the Child Rights Act for the Traditional Administration
- Increased knowledge leading to a revision of the current local Traditional Administrations' decentralization policies

# EXPECTED ULTIMATE OUTCOMES

#### Support to Democratic Institutions:

- Increased constructive local political dialogue in the media to encourage peace and political tolerance;
- Efficient and peaceful transition to the Sierra Leone Broadcasting Corporation;
- Effective use of the Sierra Leone Broadcasting Corporation by all stakeholders.

# Local Governance and Decentralization:

- Effective local governance under the leadership of the local councils and traditional chiefs Increased respect for children's rights in accordance with the Child Rights Act.
