I. PURPOSE

Through its participatory approach, the project is implementing socio-economic development activities in war-affected areas of South Lebanon. It is working with and supporting efforts of governmental bodies, local institutions, employers' and workers' organizations and civil society groups present in South Lebanon, for the development of strategically planned, locally-driven and locally implemented livelihoods recovery projects that would generate permanent and temporary employment. The project takes into consideration socio-economic assessments and recovery initiatives adopted by the Government of Lebanon, its partners, the UN Country Team, and non-governmental organizations, in addition to addressing key components of the Social Action Plan "Towards Strengthening Social Safety Nets and Access to Basic Social Services".

It is primarily working towards:

- 1. Enhancing the implementation capacities of local institutions and major implementing partners in South Lebanon in managing livelihood projects through application of acquired tools and methodologies.
- 2. Strengthening the capacities of local institutions in South Lebanon, so they can maintain and replicate participatory methodologies in promoting local economic development initiatives.

The project is continuing to work in partnership with municipalities, local cooperatives, relevant ministries at both central and local levels, micro-credit institutions (e.g. Al Majmoua, ADR), academic institutions, Social Development Centres, syndicates, workers' and employers' organizations present in the South. It also established strategic partnerships with international institutions, including the Italian ROSS programme and INTERSOS.

II. RESULTS

Progress made during the period under review:

Capacity building:

- The International Management and Training Institute (IMTI) provided a nine-day workshop on Local Economic Development. The material was developed with the assistance of a pool of specialized trainers in the fields of strategic planning, proposal writing, and monitoring and evaluation. The training workshop took place in January-February 2011, in Tyre, South Lebanon. The training targeted the 19 assessed partner institutions, and it was actually able to target 36 participants from 17 institutions.
- The Center of Social and Educational Studies (CSE) and the Lebanese Physically Handicapped Union (LPHU) provided training on the integration of people with disabilities in the job market. The trainers from both organizations prepared the material. While CSE mainly contributed to the theoretical part of the training along with some real life case studies on disabled people who are successfully surviving the increasing competitiveness of the job market, the LPHU contributed with the practical part where it trained the institutions on how to build and maintain a database about the skills supplied by the disabled people versus the skills demanded by the market in South Lebanon. The training undertaken focused on the ways and means of collecting skills data, rather than on the data collection itself. The seven-day workshop was held in February 2011 in Sarafand, South Lebanon. In addition to the five Social Development Centers, Intersos and LPHU which were already included in the Assessment, 10 active local NGOs working with disabled people in the South were targeted. These non-profit organizations were selected based on how active and involved they are in the field of socially and economically integrating people with disabilities in the Southern community. (The list of these NGOs is attached to this report as annex IV).

Micro-finance and small enterprise development:

 Utilizing the new funds allocated for micro-finance by each respective institution, Al Majmoua and the Association for the Development of Rural Capacities (ADR) reached a total of 114 people during the period under review (the classification of beneficiaries for each institution is illustrated in the table under output 1.3).

Output 1.1: Local institutions in targeted economic sectors demonstrate enhanced managerial capacities so as to effectively plan design and implement socio-economic projects	The Center of Social and Educational Studies (CSE) and the Lebanese Physically Handicapped Union (LPHU) provided a 7-day workshop on the integration of people with disabilities in the job market. Output 2.1: Capacities of local stakeholders in exchanging practices is enhanced via establishing/strengthening existent fora related to the selected socio-economic sectors.	Seven members of the Local Economic Fora were targeted during the training workshop on Local Economic Development. Hence they were further strengthened in the domain of strategic planning, proposal writing, budgeting and monitoring and evaluation. Furthermore, in the practical exercises, these members were assisted to redraft the strategies of the beekeeping and the cooperatives sectors in light of the knowledge acquired during the training.
Output 2.2: Local stakeholders capacities are enhanced to replicate, plan and coordinate socio economic initiatives.	A 9-day workshop on Local Economic Development was conducted by the International Management and training Insitute. The training workshop targeted the 19 assessed partner institutions, and it actually involved 36 participants from 17 institutions. Participants gained additional skills in strategic planning, proposal writing, institutional mapping, budgeting, and monitoring and evaluation.

Impact assessment:

Depending on the nature of the activity, the impact of the project interventions can be determined through the performance indicators (examples: % increase in knowledge in Management skills, % participation of women...) or through the accomplishment of the milestones set in the logical framework (examples: establishment of a local forum, drafting of a sectoral strategy...).

Visibility and outreach:

The training workshops which were conducted to enhance the organizational capacities of the partner institutions were extensively covered by local media.

Challenges faced:

- In the LED training, the indicator measuring the increase in knowledge and skills of the institutions' representatives does not demonstrate the actual impact of the training on the participants' knowledge because some institutions were not represented by the same person across the module. Hence, it was not always the same trainee sitting for the pre and the post evaluation test and the average of increase in knowledge per module was lower than it actually is.
- The impact of the capacity building efforts can not be measured immediately; there is a need for at least a 6-month period to actually be able to identify changes in the institutions' practices due to the provided trainings. However, the project came to an end, and resources were not earmarked to conduct this post-assessment.

Lessons learned:

Capacity building of institutions should not be only limited to training workshops. More resources should be allocated to allow on-the-job or in-house trainings, problem-solving trainings which would produce a higher impact on institutions and attend to their specific institutional challenges. Moreover, these trainings would ensure the full involvement of institutions' representatives, for they are given the opportunity to receive training in their offices, while still attending to their daily duties.
