| Project Description: The regional reconciliation consultations and the national reconciliation conference seek to harness peace and reconciliation in Liberia by providing the opportunity and space in which Liberians can discuss reconciliation and provide further understanding of the four policy issues (Reconciliation, Amnesty, Reparation, and Prosecution) of the TRC. The project focuses on two key activities: (1) Three Regional reconciliation consultations. The consultations will be for five-days in each region involving five counties. Region I (Maryland, Grand Kru, River Gee, Sinoe in Grand Gedeh; Region II (Grand Bassa, River Cess, Nimba, Lofa will meet in Bong County. Region III (Gbarpolu, Bomi, Cape Mount and Margibi will meet in Montserrado. A total of 200 key stakeholders (13 representatives from each county) are expected to attend the regional consultations, and (2) The National Reconciliation Conference. Outputs and Key Activities:

Output

The project is expected to produce the following outputs: 1. Increased participation of local Liberian populace in harnessing the TRC recommendations with the aim to prevent conflict and promote peace and reconciliation at regional and county level; 2. National peace and reconciliation initiatives strengthened to sustain peace and stability in Liberia.

Key Activities

The key activities of the project will include: 1. Convene three regional consultations for five days each in Grand Gedeh, Bong and Bomi counties; Discuss the TRC four policy issues in relation to the views and expectations of the participants; identify key issues of the conflict specific to each county and region for mediation; to compile report on county specific outcomes and issues for the national conference; and facilitate the selection of 13 delegates per county to the national conference. Main activities related to output 2 (National conference) include: Establish Secretariat to plan and execute the regional consultation and national conference; Convene a five-day national conference in Monrovia that will bring together participants from across the 15 counties, the Diaspora and to include international partners; Facilitate reconciliation ceremonies; and compile conference report.

Full Project Document - Outline (Max. 14 pages)

1. Background and problem statement

Liberia has experienced 14 years of violent armed conflict that adversely affected socio-economic life and led to destruction of lives and properties. The civil conflict is regarded as one of the most horrible civil crisis in West Africa. Fuelled by ethnic division and other factors, the conflict shattered the lives of over two hundred and fifty thousands (250,000.00) people and rendered nearly two million (2,000,000) people displaced both internally and externally. Most infrastructural were destroyed, while basic social services were inadequate in most parts of the country.

Following the Accra Comprehensive Peace Agreement of 2003 which brought relative peace and calm to Liberia after 14 years of bloody civil war, the TRC was established in 2005 as one of the five Commissions formed to address some of the underlying causes of the conflict in Liberia. The TRC has as one of its six mandates to promote national peace, security, unity and reconciliation with the aim to ensure that peace and reconciliation is sustained so as to enhance national stability and development.

Liberia is becoming more stable after the 14 years of conflict and that rehabilitation and recovery of basic social services are being achieved progressively. Despite the significant positive developments in the country, sustaining peace, stability and reconciliation remained a challenge. Essentially, promotion of peace and reconciliation are a prerequisite to accelerating economic growth and development in Liberia.

A Number of peace-building and reconciliation activities have been undertaken and/or being implemented by Community groups, civil society organizations, International Development Partners and the Government itself, but most of these have been on an ad-hoc basis. The creation of the Peace-building Fund for Liberia provides an opportunity to strengthen national capacity in preventing conflict and promote and sustain peace and reconciliation in Liberia.

2. Project Rationale and expected results

The signing of the Accra Comprehensive Peace Accord in 2003 essentially provided a critical turning point and an opportunity for Liberia to turn from war to peace. As part of the peace deal, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Liberia was established. The Commission's mandate emphasises the promotion of national peace, security, unity and reconciliation. The Commission has made significant progress in meeting its mandate. For example, the Commission has collected, coded and documented over 20,000 statements in order to determine the various violations from witnesses and perpetrators within the 15 counties and in the Diaspora; conducted individual, thematic hearings in all 15 counties and is finalizing thematic and institutional hearings in February. These proceedings will enable the commission to make determinations for individual and institutional accountability. Also the Commission has investigated and researched 20 window cases in 14 thematic areas and has begun writing the final report, the first volume of which has been completed.

In 2008, The European Commission provided technical assistance to the TRC in supporting its peace-building mandate through the conduct of the National Conflict Mapping Programme. The mapping recorded current conflict that may threaten Liberia's peace and security including voice accountability in decision making processes, land and property disputes, identity conflicts as well as youth issues. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission by its mandates has been involved in reconciliation initiatives since its establishment in 2005. However, this mapping project, along with other investigations and research including economic crimes, the roles and experiences of women and children; the religious and traditional dimensions of the conflict, further informed the need for proactive actions, stronger and sustained reconciliation initiatives that will help sustain and promote peace and security in the country.

Enhancing national peace, unity and reconciliation is critical to the TRC's work and in meeting its mandate under the Comprehensive Peace Agreement. In addition, the promotion of sustainable peace and reconciliation is critical to sustaining Liberia's nascent democracy and its development agenda. The TRC National Reconciliation Initiatives: County Consultations and National Reconciliation Conference are designed to provide an opportunity once more, for Liberians in the 15 counties and from the Diaspora to come together and dialogue on peace,

reconciliation and share their perspectives on how peace and reconciliation can be sustained in Liberia and to strengthen the recommendation of the TRC.

Furthermore, this initiative will help to enhance accountability, inclusiveness, participation and ownership of the peace-building and reconciliation initiatives in Liberia by Liberians, and promote the implementation of the TRC's recommendations. Evidently, the civil conflict has posed a huge challenge to the country and there is a dire need to undertake post-conflict peace building and reconciliation initiatives that will help to support social cohesion, democracy and national development. The regional and national dialogue on reconciliation and conference will help provide the foundation for sustained peace in Liberia.

3. Partnerships and Management Arrangement

UNDP will be the recipient agency and management of the peacebuilding fund contribution, and will be responsible for procurement. UNDP will also be responsibility for making financial reports for the Multi-Donor Trust Fund (MDTF), and help provide technical to the project.

The **TRC** will ensure partnership and collaboration with its partners in conducting these Regional Counties Consultations. Organization and institutions expected to partner with the TRC in planning and holding the Consultations include the Human Rights and Protection Section of the UNMIL, International Center for Transitional Justice, Interpeace, Foundation for International Dignity (FIND), the Ministry of Internal Affairs and others.

The main roles and responsibilities of partners shall include:

In collaboration with the Secretariat of the Regional Counties Consultation;

- Assist in developing training and consultation package/module
- Help to conduct training for County Coordinators/ Mobilizers and mediators
- Develop and deliver presentations on key topics such as: Reconciliation, Amnesty, Reparation and Prosecution
- Assist in facilitating plenary and county specific discussions along with Commissioners and other facilitators
- Support the mobilization exercise through existing structures at regional and county levels.
- Support the planning and execution of the National Conference

The Consultation

The Consultations will be held at the regional level and will bring together a cross-section of representatives from each county. Careful mobilization shall be conducted throughout the counties to ensure that representation is broad. County specific discussions in county groups are a key component of these consultations. Particular efforts will be made to ensure that county specific issues are raised and discussed.

The significance and value of bringing the counties together rest in the opportunity it provides representatives to share their perspectives on reconciliation, amnesty, reparation and prosecution. In addition, they will share and discuss their experiences and unique county issues.

The main intent of the regional consultations is to solicit the views and perspectives of Liberians through discussions on the four policy issues and to inform and enrich the TRC's report and recommendations. These consultations will also enhance the national scope of the outcome of the TRC process.

Mediation

Mediation is a key component of the consultation process. A team of mediators comprising TRC staff and partners will assist with mediation during the various consultations. The team will be provided training and orientation in basic mediation skills that will enable them actively mediate in emerging conflict issues during the regional consultation, as well as support county specific discussions.

Program Methodology

The methodology applied here is not different from what the TRC has applied over the years. The commission has offices in all 15 counties that are headed by county coordinators. For operational purposes and work that has been done at the county levels, the commission has worked through the county and district coordinating committees. The size of each team varies from 15 to 25 persons representing a cross section of civil society, government representatives including office of the superintendent, the chief education officer, traditional and religious leaders, youth and women groups and eminent persons in the communities. The commission has budgeted for the coordinators and will recall them as Mobilizers. They will be deployed in the last week in February where they will together with the CCC who will be selected to come to the regional meeting. The following steps constitute the methodology process:

- Step 1. Develop guide-lines and content for Regional Consultations;
- Step 2. Identify/Select facilitation team and provide training;
- Step 3. Deploy County Mobilizers;
- Step 4. Selection of County Representation Target (CCC and DCC) key institutions to help identify county representatives- taking into consideration gender equality;
- Step 5. Facilitation of Regional National Conference.

The team of experts drawn from the partnership will collaborate with the TRC program department to modify existing monitoring instruments and schedules to measure the effectiveness of the implementation using these indicators. The commission is aware that it mandate ends in June 2009 and therefore plans to work in partnership with the entities mentioned in this document. This partnership ensures that other organizations are equipped to continue to build on the foundation laid for the peace process.

- The UNDP will participate as custodian of the funds. They will ensure that the funds are requested along line items and monitor activities against expenditure. They also have the responsibility to go into the field to monitor activities.
- Glencree, OSIWA, ICTJ, Ministry of Internal Affairs will form a team of experts along with the TRC program department and commissioners to conduct the county consultations. That team will also supervise the conclusion of the county reports in time for the national conference. Both ICTJ and OSIWA have developed capacity of a number of CSOs who will participate. MIA staffers at the ministry and county levels will conduct mediation and memorialization ceremonies where necessary.

Region 3 Margibi, Bomi, Cape Mount, Gbarpolu in Montserrado-May 2009.

County coordinators will be redeployed to engage the county coordinating. Committees in February 2009. A facilitating team of experts from the above will conduct the county meetings. Planning will be done in the first week of the month, the meetings in the second week and the report completed in the third week. The final week in May, all reports for the National conference will be finalized.

Phase II (June 2009) National Reconciliation Conference (two weeks)

Week 1- arrival and hosting of delegates and final preparations.

Week 2

Day 1 formalities and preliminaries/ speeches from appropriate stakeholders and presentations from internationals.

Day 2 presentations of 10 county reports and panel discussions

Day 3 presentations of 5 county reports and panel discussions and mediation meetings in the evenings

Day 4 presentations of the TRC report to the legislature and executive in the morning and mediation continues.

Day 5 TRC mediation finalized and reports made in plenary at the pavilion.

Day 6 national atonement, prayers for the way forward and peace in Liberia.

7. Project Budget (see projet budget)

The total budget of the project is \$460,000.00. In the two-part budget, budget A represents the Peace building component for \$350,000.00 for which 7% or \$24,500.00 is allocated to the UNDP for handling charges and \$325,500.00 is allocated to the TRC for direct implementation of the activities. Budget B is the TRC contribution from Government Funds representing the percentage of commissioner and staff time that will be allocated to the project and other charges including over head and other indirect costs.

| Project Description: | The regional reconciliation consultations and the national reconciliation conference seek to harness peace and reconciliation in Liberia by providing the opportunity and space in which Liberians can discuss reconciliation and provide further understanding of the four policy issues (Reconciliation, Amnesty, Reparation, , and Prosecution) of the TRC. The project focuses on two key activities: (1) Three Regional reconciliation consultations. The consultations will be for five-days in each region involving five counties. Region I (Maryland, Grand Kru, River Gee, Sinoe in Grand Gedeh; Region II (Grand Bassa, River Cess, Nimba, Lofa will meet in Bong County. Region III (Gbarpolu, Bomi, Cape Mount and Margibi will meet in Montserrado. A total of 200 key stakeholders (13 representatives from each county) are expected to attend the regional consultations. (2) The National Reconciliation Conference. This activity will bring together 200 nationals from the 15 Counties and 50 persons from the Diaspora and other partners to participate in the national Conference. The Conference will last for five days. Each of the 15 counties will be represented by 13 persons and each county will make formal presentations of county specific issues and recommendations at the National Conference. The national Conference will be held in Monrovia. It is expected that these consultations and the national conference will help Liberians explore and experience a range of motivations, values and best practices in reconciliation | | | | |

Narrative summary of Project Not to exceed 500 words

1. Background

Liberia has experienced 14 years of violent armed conflict that adversely affected socio-economic life and led to destruction of lives and properties. The civil conflict is regarded as one of the most horrible civil crisis in West Africa. Fuelled by ethnic division and other factors, the conflict shattered the lives of over two hundred and fifty thousands (250,000.00) people and rendered nearly two million (2,000,000) people displaced both internally and externally. Most infrastructural were destroyed, while basic social services were inadequate in most parts of the country.

Following the Accra Comprehensive Peace Agreement of 2003 which brought relative peace and calm to Liberia after 14 years of bloody civil war, the TRC was established in 2005 as one of the five Commissions formed to address some of the underlying causes of the conflict in Liberia. The TRC has as one of its six mandates to promote national peace, security, unity and reconciliation with the aim to ensure that peace and reconciliation is sustained so as to enhance national stability and development.

Liberia is becoming more stable after the 14 years of conflict and that rehabilitation and recovery of basic social services are being achieved progressively. Despite the significant positive developments in the country, sustaining peace, stability and reconciliation remained a challenge. Essentially, promotion of peace and reconciliation are a prerequisite to accelerating economic growth and development in Liberia.

A Number of peace-building and reconciliation activities have been undertaken and/or being implemented by Community groups, civil society organizations, International Development Partners and the Government itself, but most of these have been on an ad-hoc basis. The creation of the Peace-building Fund for Liberia provides an opportunity to strengthen national capacity in preventing conflict and promote and sustain peace and reconciliation in Liberia.

2. Purpose of Proposed Project

Enhancing national peace, unity and reconciliation is critical to the TRC's work and in meeting its mandate under the Comprehensive Peace Agreement. In addition, the promotion of sustainable peace and reconciliation is critical to sustaining Liberia's nascent democracy and its development agenda. The TRC National Reconciliation Initiatives: County Consultations and National Reconciliation Conference are designed to provide an opportunity once more, for Liberians in the 15 counties and from the Diaspora to come together and dialogue on peace, reconciliation and share their perspectives on how peace and reconciliation can be sustained in Liberia and to strengthen the recommendation of the TRC.

Furthermore, this initiative will help to enhance accountability, inclusiveness, participation and ownership of the peace-building and reconciliation initiatives in Liberia by Liberians, and promote the implementation of the TRC's recommendations. Evidently, the civil conflict has posed a huge challenge to the country and there is a dire need to undertake post-conflict peace building and reconciliation initiatives that will help to support social cohesion, democracy and national development. The regional and national dialogue on reconciliation and conference will help provide the foundation for sustained peace in Liberia.
