Qualitative achievements against expected results:


Clearly, it can be deduced the knowledge acquired in peace-building and conflict resolution have well-positioned the youth peace ambassadors to effectively organize workshops and provide hands-on training in conflict prevention/peace building strategy to other young Liberians. This has essentially made them peace ambassadors in communities where they worked. An example of some of the initiative they have performed include their intervention in the youth leadership elections in Foya, Lofa County, and Konobo Town (Grand Gedeh County), respectively, when relations between these youth groups were strained, and could possibly danger the on-going peace initiatives.


challenges (If necessary):


- The Youth Peace Ambassadors continue to demand computers, internet access, stationery, and training materials (even though the project provides training materials in the form of notebooks, pens, pad, etc).
- The programme continues to experience substantial logistical constraint that leads to delays in the procurement of needed project related materials/supplies. In some instances, the volunteers have to come to Monrovia to follow-up on procurement requests, collect and transport project related materials/supplies before starting a workshop.
- Delays in process payment request by UNDP's Finance Section for the release of project funds for catering servicesl.
- 360 volunteers set up in 30 districts are constantly demanding for remunerations to enable them continue their services with the project. This contradicts the original concept of the project which made provision to build the capacity of youth in various communities through workshops/training to enable them take on the roles of peace ambassadors whenever the project phases.
