Development Goal and Immediate Objectives

The objective of the project is to create a critical mass of highly qualified teacher trainers who will serve to drive the reform process and ensure quality of teacher education in the reform process. A total of 308 lecturers from the colleges of science and education from four geographically selected universities will participate in capacity building activities which include upgrading subject materials, English language, computer skills, and new teaching methodologies in addition to short term fellowships. Specific project objectives are:

- Transfer of knowledge and best practices in the training of teacher trainers.
- Create a critical mass of highly qualified teacher trainers.
- Establish modern, updated curricula for the colleges of science and education.
- Formulate a national strategy plan for teacher education.

1. A network of eight Iraqi institutions, four Colleges of Education (CoEs) and Colleges of Science (CoSs) and 6 International higher education institutions created. A workshop was organized at UNESCO Iraq office in Amman during 15-17 March 2010 to bring together the international experts from Alberta University and 9 Iraqi focal points from the 4 Iraqi partner universities. 4- Medium-term National Strategy for Teacher Education adopted	One complete draft of the strategic plan for teacher education has been developed in cooperation with the established national committee, which includes MoHESR, MoE and MoP. Several meetings were organised in May-June 2010 with partner institutions including Bangor University, UNICEF, MoE and MoHESR to ensure development of teacher training strategy in line with the developed preliminary chapters under the national education strategy. Coordination has been ensured to develop one national teacher education strategy within the framework of ongoing UNESCO and international initiatives on teacher training and teacher education in Iraq.	% of planned	75%

Qualitative achievements against objectives and results

The Training of Trainers workshops have been successfully implemented by international partner universities in cooperation with Iraqi MoHESR. Multiplier effect training inside Iraq has started benefitting colleges of Education and Science of the universities of Basra, Baghdad, Erbil and Anbar.

An extensive formative evaluation of the project was completed in June 2010 as part of the ITF Lessons Learned Exercise. Its findings are being used as appropriate to improve project's outputs.

Main implementation constraints & challenges (2-3 sentences)

Several issues contributed to the delay of project activities, thus affecting implementation of all project activities. In this regard, lack of security and continuous changing of focal points caused major delay in the completion of the 10 Training of Trainers workshops, which benefited 80 lectures of Colleges of Education and Science. This activity could only be completed in April 2009.

Implementation constraints have been currently solved. The TTNI, which also connected Iraqi professors in the Diaspora with partner Iraqi universities, is actively involved in the completion of the project, project focal points at MoHESR and MoE are now following-up on implementation of project activities and taking active ownership of all project activities.
