	Additionally, DRC supported the construction of safe social spaces, which encouraged community cohesion to promote socialization of different community members. DRC piloted a social spaces programme in 2009 that built social spaces for adults and play areas for children in the Afgoye corridor. These spaces allowed for improved social interaction, a place of rest, and protection from heat/rain (as most of the makeshift homes are cramped and not waterproof). The social spaces are used by the residents of the settlements and by visiting neighbours and friends. DRC will implement all projects using two local partners. Partner 1 will be responsible for all activities implemented in Zone K and 77, while partner 2 will implement all activities in Abdi Monitoring and evaluation will be conducted on a systematic basis, with several monitoring benchmarks to ensure proper progress, quality control and impact. At inception, a work plan detailing the activities will be developed to guide on implementation of the activities. A Monitoring & Evaluation Plan will be developed at the beginning of the project to guide on capturing progress and achievements, and highlight how data will be collected. In Lower Shabelle and Benadir, security is likely to limit consistent access to program areas by senior managers, but measures will put in place to ensure quality adherence. For internal monitoring, monthly progress reports will be documented. All periodic reports will adhere to donor requirements, disaggregated data by gender, age and diversity. Pre and post-training tests will be conducted to measure the effectiveness of training activities. Community-watch groups will be provided with logbooks to record human rights violations and will be supported through routine supervision. The CFSs activities will be reviewed after every 3 months, to determine whether the activities are producing meaningful improvements in the lives of the boys and grisc. Children needs will be monitored and identified for further action for instance, identify unaccompanied to refer to agencies dealing with family tracing.
