A. Humanitarian Context (Context Analysis)

In South Sudan, 20 UN agencies 155 INGOs, some 300 NNGOs, diplomatic missions and donor organizations are providing humanitarian assistance to, refugees, host populations, Internally Displaced Persons and conflict-affected populations. The humanitarian community is responding to the humanitarian crisis in multiple hot spots simultaneously across all ten states.

South Sudan is the size of Austria and Switzerland combined, yet there are no paved roads outside of the capital and the road network is comprised of dirt roads and bush tracks. During the approaching rainy season, the roads become completely impassable and 60 per cent of the country is inaccessible by surface transportation. Several areas are not safe for road travel due to risks of encountering armed militia groups, armed bandits. Several sections of the roads, particularly in the northern border states are mined. Other stretches can only be accessed through travelling under the most strict security precautions, which ties down extra resources and prolongs the travelling time significantly.

The significant increase in demand for humanitarian agencies to access areas affected by recent humanitarian crises has led to an increased exposure to security risks. The border areas between South Sudan and Sudan are the most insecure due to continued conflict as evidence by various bombardments in 2012. In this challenging environment the UNDDS plane contributes to improving humanitarian access to inaccessible and at risk areas.

The lack of medical facilities in remote areas in all states and the lack of alternative emergency transport options calls for continued air Medevac capability for humanitarian personnel by the UNDD airplane

Ensuring the continuation of the DSS air plane is an urgent priority to ensure and increase the presence of the humanitarian community in responding to humanitarian needs.

With the current funds available to DSS, the operation cannot be sustained beyond December 2012. Unless additional funding is received the provision of UNDSS security assessments vital for ensuring humanitarian access and urgent movements and relocation/evacuation of humanitarian personnel from remote corners through the DSS plane will have to be suspended. This will severely affected the presence and safety of humanitarian actors on the field. Immediate funds are needed to extend the operation and to sustain not only UNDSS but the humanitarian community's ability to respond to the crisis in South Sudan in a safe manner.

The CHF reserve will allow for the UNDSS plane to operate until the end of March 2013 thus supporting the humanitarian community in South Sudan for the on-going emergency response. The activities of the project will be crucial to the organizations and agencies working in the area of operation to ensure:

- i) Access for rapid assessment teams to move into locations throughout the country
- ii) Safety of staff deployed in the area of operation through the facilitation and provision of medical or security based evacuations
- iii) Movement of life saving security items
- iv) Regular analytical reports regarding the security situation in South Sudan

With this funding proposal DSS will be able to continue offering security support for an additional period of **three** months across all ten states in South Sudan through the following activities:

- Timely security assessments and movements of humanitarian personnel
- Timely evacuation/relocation of humanitarian personnel in case of need due to security or medical reasons
- The movement of life saving security items
- Submission of regular analytical reports on security situation across all ten states in South Sudan.

Approximately 2,900 UN humanitarian personnel and 3,500 INGO personnel working South Sudan are able to be rapidly provided transport or relocated in case of emergency requirement and medically evacuated by UNDSS, with a dedicated plane for this purpose that counts with the necessary medical equipment for Medevacs.
