The situation for displaced children throughout Somalia remains dire. Widespread drought, ongoing conflict and subsequent mass displacement have destroyed the traditional protective and support mechanisms leaving children and their families vulnerable to a variety of child protection concerns including family separation, violence, abuse and exploitation, threats to children's safety and security. Children in Somalia tack access to either a national child protection system or an international system that can promote their rights, address life threatening child protection issues and hold their state accountable. Despite the massive humanitarian need, access to children in need of protection is restricted by security constraints in many regions of South/Central Somalia and parts of Puntland and Somaliand. Information relating to child protection is generally limited. However, rapid child protection assessments (CPRAs) conducted by the Child Protection Working Group (CPWG) in South/Central Somalia in November 2011 and in Puntland by Save the Children in August 2011 both highlight urgent child protection issues that need to be addressed either through direct programming or by mainstreaming child protection activities in the work of other sectors in areas where child protection is not possible.

In Mogadishu SC interventions will be carried out through implementing partner Somail Peace Line. There is urgent need for funding of Child Protection interventions. Information relating to child protection is generally limited, but the findings from the child protection needs assessment conducted by the Child Protection Working Group CPWG and SC on the drought crisis and the ongoing conflict that continues to affect South Central Somails in have resulted in new risks for children and worsening of existing child protection concerns in these regions. In Mogadishu for instance boys and girls continue to experience recruitment into armed groups/forces with girls and boys between the ages of 5 and 15 as the most vulnerable; girls being sexually abused while searching for firewood and water and this is affecting mainly women and adolescent girls in IDP settings; boys and girls are dropping out of school to engage in different forms of work in order to earn a living. There are separated and unaccompanied boys and girls are a number of children in the project locations are showing signs of distress due to prolonged lack of basic services and fear of insecurity.

In both Mogadishu and Puntland, community-based child protection work has been introduced and members of those communities are now participating in activities aimed at identifying and responding to child protection concerns. Also, child protection outcomes are being sought through other SC sectors like WASH, Nutrition, Health, Food Security & Livelihoods by building the capacities of SC staff and partners on child protection mainstreaming in order to prevent causing harm in the cause of their work and to also contribute in the protection of children by being able to identify children with protection concerns (such as separated and unaccompanied children, child headed households, children in distress, etc) and making appropriate referrals for assistance to services provided by SC and other organizations across Somalia.
