(maximum 1500 characters) *	The capacity of the target population to cope with access to safe water, hygiene practices and sanitation services is weak. This is due to poor purchasing power as a result of multiple livelihood orises. The severe drought has resulted in massive loss of critical assets and collapsed social support. Findings of WASH needs assessment indicate limited access to water, sanitation and hygiene promotion. There are less than 12 boreholes, many of which are obsolete, overused, have limited distribution infrastructure, and are poorly maintained (prone to frequent breakdowns). Wells are unprotected thus prone to contamination. Prices of water have risen by over 200% making it unaffordable. In the area women and girls are most vulnerable and are responsible for water collection, and bear the biggest burden in periods of water scarcity. IDP settlements are severely affected and have no functioning latrines. Limited households have participated in hygiene promotion campaigns over the last 6 months. Considering the current situation and the likelihood of above normal to near normal rainfall, RAWA is proposing to improve safe water through development or rehabilitation of/ and ensuring functionality of strategic water sources, latrine construction in Institutions (Schools, Nutrition centres,IDPs, health), hygiene promotion, pre-positioning of AWD/cholera supplies and develop the capacity of WES committees to promote subtainability in the management of water resources.
	RAWA has a main office in Banadir region with branch offices in Xarardheere, Hobyo, Ceel Dherre, Buale, and Nairobi. RAWA is well experienced in relief, rehabilitation and development interventions; RAWA has implemented a variety of WASH programs, tood aid distribution programs, rehabilitation of schools, and supplementary blanket, supplementary feeding, target supplementary feeding, water voucher and food voucher programs. RAWA has implemented water, sanitation and hygiene programs in Mudug region in partnership with CARE international, FAO and OCHA.
