NARRATIVE

Situation Update (please describe critical changes, if any, in the situation that affect the project (1-2 paragraphs))

UNICEF is utilizing the funds from MCA6 through the project 'Supporting the Well-being and Protection of Ebola Affected Children in Liberia' to serve 7500 affected children⁷. Currently, the number of EVD affected children in the Ministry of Gender Children and Social protection (MoGCSP database) is 5978 plus additional 2853 who received PSS services bringing the cumulative figure to 8831. Through this project during the month, the 105 trained Social Workers, 65 trained mental health clincicians and child welfare officer provided case management, recreation for resilience activities, reintegration follow ups and alternative care guidelines to the 8831 children. These services, available pre-EVD outbreak

to all vulnerable children, are being expanded to serve this larger population again.

UNICEF, through its partnership with the Ministry of Youth and Sports, has supported the Ministry to recruit, train and deploy 300⁸ national youth volunteers as contact tracers to identify and refer children affected by EVD, provide psychological first aid, community and social mobilization as well as messaging for EVD prevention. 1200 plus survivors who were recruited in partnership with NGOs for a period of six months to support EVD affected communities have completed their activities- which included anti-stigma awareness and referring children in need to child protection agencies.

Liberia is again free from Ebola. In the effort to build back better, UNICEF continues to support the MoGCSP and MoH to provide Case management and PSS support to families and communities affected, particularly families under precautionary observation. A consultant has been hired to provide support to the MoGCSP in strengthening their HR systems and supporting in the roll out of an improved supervision model in order to support the quality of case management being provided to children.

MHPSS in particular is much needed still as children and families who experienced loss cope and return to routines. Children have returned to school and UNICEF, in conjunction with the MoE rolled out a nationwide training for teachers and PTA members on basic PSS for children. It is expected, once complete, that each trainee will reach out to the 40 or so children in their classroom.

Key Achievements

Alternative care, Case management and PSS support to Children affected by the EVD

- Supported the Ministry of Gender, Children, and Social Protection and the ministry of health-PSS to increase the capacity and technical skills of 105 social workers, child welfare officer and 65 mental health clinicians through several on the job technical supervision visits and spot checks. A consultant currently providing support for the strengthening of this supervision model and of the HR processes in general for the Children and Social Protection department of the MoGCSP.
- ✓ 120 Social Workers, 65 Mental Health Clinicians, and 15 child welfare officers continue to work in the counties of Liberia and through their work we have documented and registered 8831 (3811m,5020f)as children who have been affected by the EVD and received one or more forms of PSS services and case management. Out of this number 6829 (2863m, 3966f) are from the five counties of focus.
- ✓ Types of PSS services being provided to the children include but is not limited to individual supportive talks, group dialogue, community healing dialogues, recreation for resilience activities, linking survivors to available survivor network, referral to essential services including medical care, provision of case management services and referral and provision of the one-time cash assistance.
- ✓ Out of the above listed number from the five counties 3346 (1578m, 1768f) have been registered as orphans and

out of this number 3258 (97%) have benefitted from one-time emergency cash assistance in the five counties of focus. Registration continues nationwide. All of these children are in family based care.

- ✓ 1102 (496m,606f) adult survivors in the five county of focus have completed their activities this month. They had served as referral agents for children affected by the EVD in their communities- identifying and referring EVD affected and other vulnerable children in need of services to the MoGCSP social workers. The cumulative total for adult survivors employed by UNICEF through partners nationwide to date is 1200 (542m, 658f). The survivor network has so far counted over 1,400 survivors, of which 13% are children.
- Revitalized and continuing to provide support to the National Child Protection Information Management System that is currently storing the data of all children in need of child protection services, especially children affected by the EVD.
- ✓ 11 vehicles, 100 motorbikes were provided to the MoGCSP to help facilitate the work of the social workers in the counties and to fast track the registration of children in remote communities.
- ✓ 143 national junior volunteers continues to provide sensitization and awareness activities on EVD prevention, prevention of sexual and gender based violence in the five counties. Some also serve as volunteer teachers, nurses and provide guidance in the decision on children in their communities.
- ✓ Three technical supervision, coaching and monitoring visits were made to the Children and Social Protection Department, MoGCSP and Mental Health Department, MoH to give guidance on the strategy for the implementation of the work plan activities such as utilization of the case management tools and the delivery of the PSS services to children.

Delays or Deviations

UNICEF Child Protection has not experienced major deviations from programming during the past month. UNICEF through its technical support and guidance was able to fast track the MoGCSP liquidations process and the funds for the incentives for some social workers have been given the Ministry.

UNICEF continues to work with the MoGCSP and other NGOs to enhance the capacity of the social welfare system to



properly manage cases of children affected by EVD along with other vulnerable persons in the community. These services provide psychosocial support, case management and alternative care services to those most in need. The system works to ensure that contact children without parental care are provided with appropriate care during the 21 day observation period and link them to coordinated services to ensure that basic needs are met, that they are reunified with families, that families are supported, and livelihoods are restored. We will continue to promote adolescent and child ambassador structures among slum communities, engaging children to conduct awareness, sensitization, monitoring and reporting of child protection concerns. We are continually working to strengthen the referral system to ensure that the most vulnerable receive services, which presently includes child survivors of Ebola who are faced with medical problems and need access to the relevant medical services. UNICEF also continues to work closely with the MoGCSP GBV unit and the Police to effectively respond to cases of sexual gender based violence and link them to the justice and protection system.
