#### **SECTION II**

#### A. Humanitarian Context Analysis

Briefly describe (in no more than 300 words) the current humanitarian situation in the specific locations where CHF funded activities will be implemented. Provide evidence of needs by referencing assessments and key data, including the number and category of the affected population<sup>1</sup>

The security situation in Jonglei and Unity states is deteriorating due to an increase in inter-communal fighting, cattle raiding and conflict between Non-State Armed Forces (NSAAs) and State Armed Forces without any prospect of dramatic improvement in the short term. Therefore, it is highly likely that tens of thousands of people will be displaced due to conflict within these states; draft figures for the worst case scenario in contingency planning for the second half of 2013 estimate that up to 300,000 and 135,000 individuals may be displaced in Jonglei and Unity states respectively (UNOCHA), highest and second highest figures among the 10 states of South Sudan.

Pibor county has been most severely affected by conflict and displacement as well as natural disasters in 2012, and so far in 2013 as well; estimated number of displaced in two locations alone (Dorein and Labrab) reaches at least 10,000 and 5,000 respectively (both from Inter-agency needs assessment under OCHA coordination). Furthermore, Jonglei also has been receiving spontaneous returnees from Khartoum. Sudden and unexpected flash floods may also be expected. In summary, the need for provision of life-saving NFI/Emergency shelter materials is expected to be very high in the state.

The population of Unity State is exposed to inter communal violence in particular in the neighboring counties of Mayom, Mayendit and Rubkona, as well as with communities from Warrap State. Evidence of increasing inter-communal conflicts have been reported by the RRC in the bordering areas of Boaw Payam, and Guit and Pariang Counties triggered by cattle raiding, causing 800 -1000 HHS & 5550- 7000 individuals IDPs (so far registered by RRC and interagency assessment in coordination with UN OCHA) displaced. Further cases are anticipated in the coming months and NFI/Emergency shelter materials will be required in response.

#### **B. Grant Request Justification**

INTERSOS has almost seven years of experience in life saving and immediate response in the rural areas of the South Sudan, actively performing activities in five states including Jonglei and Unity. INTERSOS had built a solid network of coordination with INGOs and Governmental Institutions in Jonglei and Unity States, where the agency is constantly cooperating with the other ones active in this field, sharing plans, assessment and resources. INTERSOS has skilled staff experienced in quickly respond to emergency situations providing immediate relief to the civil and natural disaster affected populations. The experience INTERSOS has gained, as NFI State Cluster Lead in Jonglei State will enhance the knowledge needed to serve as State Cluster Leader in one of most "critical" State where every year thousands of IDPs were registered.

Proposed activities contribute to the agreed NFI & ES Cluster priorities of coordination, including capacity-building, storage and stock management, assessment, and distribution in geographical hotspots prone to on-going emergencies and in need of quick assessment and response. The experience of implementing the CHF round 1 NFIs/ES project leads INTERSOS to strengthen the "Emergency Response Team" in Jonglei State, in order to deliver increased assistance to IDPs, returnees, and vulnerable host community members and reduce the emergency response time.

#### C. Project Description (For CHF Component only)

#### i) Contribution to Cluster Priorities

Briefly describe how CHF funding will be used to contribute to the achievement of the cluster priority activities identified for this allocation.

The main objective of this project is to ensure proper field coordination in the emergency response in Jonglei and Unity states, front line transportation, assessment, appropriate shelter/NFI response and also PDM.

The project responds to the cluster priorities by ensuring front-line transportation of NFI and ES items, so that common-pipeline NFI/ES items will be prepositioned ready for timely dispatch for frontline delivery.

It also supports field coordination in the emergency response in Jonglei state, through coordination efforts, such as cluster meetings and participation for inter-agency meetings, by the State Focal Point.

The project covers assessment and appropriate shelter/NFI provision and post distribution monitoring.

- To strengthen the capability of response to emergencies in Jonglei and Unity States through prepositioning of NFIs and ES materials.
- 2. To improve the humanitarian agencies coordination mechanism strengthening NFIs cluster leadership at Jonglei State level
- To respond to basic needs of IDPs, Returnees and host communities through distribution of NFIs & ES materials in case of emergency.

#### iii) Proposed Activities

- 1.A Preposition Shelter/ NFI items to logistics hubs and distribution sites, in close coordination with IOM, Logistic Cluster, and other partners. At least 5,000 NFIs and 1,000 ES prepositioned in Jonglei and at least 1,000 NFIs and 250 ES in Unity State (either in Rubkona or container in Mayom, which was procured under CHF 1<sup>st</sup> round).
- 1.B maintain cluster-dedicated warehouse in Bor, Jonglei by establishing concrete pad (to make the ground of rubhall higher than ground to avoid water) and ensure appropriate management of stocks.
- 2.A Convene at least 6 state-level cluster meetings in Jonglei, to ensure information sharing of partners both inside and outside the cluster
- 2.B Ensure information sharing with non-cluster humanitarian partners, through participation to Inter-agency meetings with RRC, UNOCHA and other concerned parties,
- 2.C 95% of Inter Agency assessment missions attended by the cluster through the SFP coordination (both Jonglei and Unity states);
- 3.A Maintain, strengthen and deploy Emergency Response Team (ERT) members for Jonglei State
- 3.B At least 95% of Emergencies regarding NFIs/ES addressed by the Cluster through the SFP coordination with the partners on the ground:
- 3.C 6,000 HHs supported (conflict and flood affected IDPs, host community, Returnees) with NFIs and 1,250 HHs with ES, by Intersos ERT or by Intersos Unity team;
- 3.D Conduct Post Distribution Monitoring (PDM) exercise, possibly with other partners, in order to evaluate appropriateness, effectiveness and coverage of past responses and feedback other members recommendations

#### iv). Cross Cutting Issues

Briefly describe how cross-cutting issues (e.g. gender, environment, HIV/AIDS) are addressed in the project implementation.

The project will ensure protection mainstreaming, including with a focus on gender, in shelter/ NFI response planning. This will be ensured by two methods; collecting real gender-disaggregated data for our responses where operationally possible, and also involving the Protection Cluster member(s) in shelter/NFI response planning.

Intersos will ensure use of the cluster-standard reporting format (such as beneficiary registration format and also distribution narrative report format), both of which are clearly gender-disaggregated.

Second mechanism is inclusion of Protection Cluster member for any NFI/shelter response planning. Because of very sensitive political background in the areas of operation, in particular in Pibor county, distribution of NFIs and/or shelter materials can inadvertently cause more harm than benefits. One of most likely negative consequences of the NFI/shelter distribution is putting beneficiaries at risk *because of* distribution. Beneficiaries sometimes travel long distances, sometimes even days, to reach to registration/distribution points, possibly through hostile environments. After they receive aid materials, they may become target of looting.

Intersos, using experiences working together with the protection cluster members in NFI interventions in Jonglei state, will make sure to include protection cluster colleagues in the shelter/ NFI response planning, so that these concerns will always be addressed and minimize the risk associated to the distribution.

#### v) Expected Result/s

- 1. At least 6,000 NFIs and 1,250 ES kits will be prepositioned, and properly maintained, as part of Emergency Preparedness for Jonglei and Unity states.
- 2. Coordination of NFI/shelter actors in Jonglei state will be ensured, through at least 6 state-level cluster meeting and 6 interagency meetings with RRC, OCHA, and other concerned parties, and as a result. 95% of IRNA assessment will be participated by shelter/NFI actor(s)
- 3. At least 95% of Inter-agency assessment identified shelter/NFI needs responded to by shelter/NFI actors under SFP coordination. At least 36,000 people will receive NFI support and 7,500 people receive shelter support from Intersos team, and at least 2 PDMs will be carried out by Intersos.

State Focal Point/Project Manager for Jonglei, in close communication with IOM Cluster Coordinator, will be in charge of overall project management in Jonglei state, and will supervise the Emergency Response Team. Logistic Officer will manage all logistic arrangements and support emergency response logistics including inter-agency missions. Emergency Response Team (3 national Emergency Response Team members), will be deployed on demand to participate in assessment, verification, registration,

distribution and also PDM in all over Jonglei state. PM supervises the 3 team members, lead NFI/shelter distribution, and if necessary support NFI PM in Jonglei for coordination and other project implementation.

NFI PM in Unity will supervise all activities in Unity.

Cluster-standard formats for assessment/verification, registration, distribution narrative report and also stock and distribution will be used to ensure implementation of activities. Intersos NFI Project Managers in Jonglei and Unity will collect all data which will be obtained from registration and/or distribution on the ground. NFI PM Jonglei, who is also State Focal Point in Jonglei, collects data from other partners, compiles stock and distribution data into state-level format, and sends them to national cluster coordinator. NFI PM Unity reports the data to SFP Unity, so that s/he will send information to national-level cluster lead. These data will be used for the preparation of mid-term report and final report.

Monitoring of project implementation will be carried out by INTERSOS Head of Mission and Administration staff through regular project review meetings and field visits.
