A. Humanitarian Context Analysis

The unfolding unrest in South Sudan, beginning with the events of December 15th 2013 in Juba when fighting broke out within the presidential guard and had spread to Greater Upper Nile within two days, may not have been exactly predictable, but it was not entirely surprising. Surely, the abrupt nature of it, the scale of violence within a single military unit, the rapid spread to other branches of the armed forces in other states, the speed at which it begun to take on ethnic overtones and the death toll of over 1,000 people, many of them civilians, has shocked the population. How South Sudan seemed to have gone from one day of confidence that it will weather the political disagreements within the Sudan People's Liberation Movement (SPLM), the country's ruling party, to the next day of near total unraveling was definitely terrifying for Juba residents. Over 200,000 south Sudanese beliefs to have been displaced across the Country by the three weeks old unrest, Lacha Community and Economic Development is operating in Mundri County in WES and Yirol West County in Lakes State where currently over 10,000 people have been displaced and more number is expected to increase if unrest in the Country continues, in Mundri most of the IDPs were from Juba while in Yirol West, the IDPs are both from Juba as well as from Jonglei State, on 3rd to 5th Jan 2013 LCED, Mundri Active Youth Association MAYA and RRC conducted registration of over 3200 IDPs in Mundri while the number continue to raise on daily bases, due to the security and logistical and pragmatic needs for the inter-agency assessment, LCED is planning an assessment to Yirol West to assesses the shelter and NFI needs in over 5000 IDPs currently in Yirol West

B. Grant Request Justification

- Due to the composed security situation in Mundri and Yirol West many IDPs from Juba and Bor have currently flee and displaced to Yirol West and Mundri for their safety, and considering the mammoth number of the displaced persons in Mundri and Yirol West, the host community at the moment has no capacity to bear the burden of supporting the IDPs, and IDPs are currently living under the critical situation, most of the IDPs runs without any households belongings and become more vulnerable that others,
- The CHF funding will surely be used to address critical life-serving needs of providing e-emergency shelter materials and NFI kits from the IOM common pipeline
- The CHF funding will be used for the timely assessment and verification of the IDPs, timely transportation of emergency shelter material and NFI to the final distribution point, procurement of locally shelter materials, distribution and post-distribution
- LCED currently has 6 qualified national staff and three trained volunteers on the ground that will optimistically undertake the assessment, verification and NFI-S distribution in Mundri and Yirol West,

Based on the above mentioned background information Lacha Community and Economic Development is appealing for the 99,157 USD funding from CHF 2014 first round allocation in order to provide immediate NFI and Emergency Shelter material for the IDPs displaced by the ongoing conflict to Mundri and Yirol,

The CHF fund will provide adequate transport, storage and distribution of the NFI/ES from IOM Pipeline. It will also include conduction Post Distribution Monitoring to ensure quality response.
