The current crisis lead to restricted movement of staff in the immediate aftermath of its commencement on December 15th. As the conflict spread rapidly from Juba directly affecting five states in its wake, GOAL, to ensure the safety of its staff, put each site on lock down and began preparing for a possible evacuation of staff in addition to putting in place contingency plans for this occurrence. On the 22nd of December, the decision to evacuate relocatable, expatriate staff and South Sudanese staff directly threatened by the violence was acted upon and the team was relocated to Nairobi to GOAL Kenya's office. Remote support was provided to national staff working at the field sites, but with movement restricted, it was not possible to continue with the implementation of nutrition activities.

GOAL had planned to conduct a Multi Annual Cluster Survey (MICS) in Agok late December. This however could not be achieved as GOAL could not assure the security of the survey team due to the unpredictability of the unfolding crisis and needed to contain the numbers at the field site to a level where evacuation was possible. As well as the need to conduct the MICS, GOAL also requires a cost extension so that it can resume services at OTPs in Baliet. This county suffered the most devastation of all of GOAL's operational areas due to its proximity to Malakal and it being on the route taken by the White Army to attack the aforementioned city. Considering the devastation that has been experienced and subsequent displacement and loss of livelihood, it is essential that GOAL resume its OTP services. The additional months are required so as to allow for sufficient time for the security situation and access in Baliet to improve.

GOAL requests a change to its original allocation of UN-CHF funds, in the form of extending the project duration for an additional two and a half months until 15 March 2014. The major reasons for this request centre on programmatic delays which have originated from the negative impact of insecurity and inaccessibility.

Between April – December 2013, the context in Twic, Baliet and Ulang Counties and Abyei Administrative Area has continued to be a testing and fragile area to operate in, despite GOAL's best efforts to utilize its strong experience to plan activities accordingly.

In Abyei, on 4 May 2013, a Misseriya attack on a convoy led by the United Nations Interim Security Force for Abyei (UNISFA) resulted in the death of Abyei's Ngok Dinka Paramount Chief, Kuol Deng Kuol¹. This worsened the already fragile relationship between the Ngok Dinka and the Misseriya, and resulted in thousands of Ngok Dinka taking to the streets of Abyei, burning down Misseriya-owned shops, and causing damage to the mosque. In response to this, GOAL halted the movement of staff to areas north of the River Kiir for a month due to these heightened tensions. This had a direct impact on the supervision of nutrition services and the movement of staff and equipment. Throughout this period, intermittent clashes have persisted in Abyei. In Twic, Baliet and Ulang Counties, smaller scale disruptions have resulted from cattle-raiding incidents and skirmishes in particular payams.
