The original project targeted 2500 returnees and the host community in four Payams of Fangak County, Mareang, paquir, Pulita and Juaibor. According to IRNA conducted on 24th and 25th January 2014, there are 40,600 IDPS living in phom primary school in New Fangak and were displaced by political conflict that started on 15 December 2013. About 8000 more IDPs are living in Old Fangak. The IDPS have got limited humanitarian support from the NGOs WFP distributes food, It is only SALF and Nile Hope who are implementing protection projects in Fangak. SALF under CHF and Nile Hope under UNICEF. SALF would like to change the target beneficiaries since the context has changed dramatically. The original target beneficiaries who are the returnees are mixed with IDPS and are currently living with the IDPS. Therefore there is a challenge of singling out only returnees as beneficiaries amidst the IDPS. Though the budget is not adequate to cater for this caseload, SALF is in discussion with UNFPA to access technical and financial support for additional 5000 beneficiaries.

There has been a difficulty with access due to insecurity, Currently there is a challenge of fuel supply in malakal, and therefore staff cannot access the field by the organization speed boat. Another factor is Pigi county enroute to Fangak is very insecure.

SALF would like to allocate USD 15,200 for flight charters to ferry personnel and relief items in cases where WFP cannot land in the target location or carry cargo. (This budget will come from vehicle maintenance costs, contracts and sub-grants and Relief items, training of police) Because of the current dynamics activities like training of police on the protection of survivors is not viable.

On contracts and Sub-grants SALF is compelled to engage a consultant to conduct training on clinical management of rape and another one on psychosocial support as oppose to the original plan of hiring Specialists on HIV AIDS and SGBV.

- 1. Needs assessments in Fangak on the effect of emergencies on returnees and host community women, men, boys and girls.
- 2. Establishing of 1 safe psycho-social support center among the host and returnee populations in Fangak County
- 3. monthly meetings with cluster partners in Fangak headquarter to coordinate protection activities and jointly advocate for women and child rights
- 4. Conduct monthly awareness campaigns through dramas on HIV/AIDS and SGBV prevention and response targeting 2500 people in Fangak County.
- 5. Conduct monthly meetings with protection partners.
- 6. Staff internal meetings/debriefing to discuss project progress.

- 1. Training of 5 male and 5 Female government health care workers and service providers on clinical management of rape/sexual violence (including of child survivors).

Explain the rational to endorse or reject the request

After December 2013 SALF has experienced delays in the implementation of the project as related to the current crisis. Results and recommendations in the IRNAs conducted in New and Old Fangak require that the scope of projects in that area is revised in order to address the needs of increasing number of people affected by the conflict.

While some activities that are no longer relevant have been eliminated from the revision, most of the GBV response activities in the SALF project remain a protection priority, especially in northern Jonglei, where the delivery of protection services to the newly displaced is highly dependent on the presence of national partners such as SALF and NPC. The Protection Cluster welcomes the engagement of UNFPA in supporting SALF to respond to the needs of a greater number of affected populations by complementing the CHF with another financial resource. Such complementarity of funds will allow SALF to guarantee access to protection services not only to the returnees and host community originally targeted, but to the newly displaced as well.

The revision of the project was conducted in coordination with the GBV sub cluster and aimed at aligning activities planned for the extension period to the sub cluster strategy for the crisis response. Therefore, based upon the favorable recommendation of the GVB sub cluster, the NCE request is endorsed by the Protection Cluster.
