Project Description	Considering that the legal and institutional anti-corruption framework has only recently been established in Iraq, there is a need to strengthen the institutional framework, and to streamline the laws and regulations that govern the mandates, powers, and interaction between the various anticorruption agencies. Legislative reform on its own will not be sufficient to combat corruption in Iraq, particularly if the personnel that are responsible for enforcing the law are not equipped with up-to-date knowledge and skills. This project will provide administrative and technical assistance to the newly established Anti-Corruption Academy, particularly with a view to enabling capacity building and knowledge development for the country's anti-corruption agencies.

Qualitative achievements against objectives and results

Output 1: Anti-Corruption Academy has sustainable organizational arrangements. Output 1 at the end of Q2 2014

- The Commission of Integrity has approved the structure of the Anti-Corruption Academy.
- The ACA is an official Directorate of the Federal Commission of Integrity.

Output 2: Relevant resources in place for the Anti-Corruption Academy.

Output2 during Q2 2014

- Procurement of equipment lists under process.
- Negotiations and linkage with international counterparts is underway to establish centres of excellence in Iraq.

Output 3: Anti-Corruption Academy ability and capacity to deliver training established.

A project revision was submitted 25 March to the UNDAF Fund to request a no cost extension for additional time to monitor the receipt of procurement and the cascade of training based on the twenty curricula.

Output 3 during Q2 2014

- Training of Trainers initiating and nominations being collected.
- The needs assessment regarding the on-line training and IT applications completed during 2nd Q 2014. All 20 curricula are under discussion to be available on line to assist in the present crisis and have the ability to reach the governorate level more rapidly.
 On line discussions opened regarding content and technical applications
- All of the 20 curricula partially delivered during the quarter. And Assessment is underway of how best to deliver the remaining curriculum to the Anti-Corruption Academy.
- The Academy initiated trainers to train with nominations open and under discussion during second quarter
- A workshop was conducted on June 9 at the Academy with the international IT firm about the training of staff on the new systems and software which will be provided within this project.

Main implementation constraints & challenges

The ACA remained open during the insecurity in 2nd Quarter 2014.

The unstable security and escalation of violence in Iraq has impeded access for students during part of June. Alternate locations for training of trainers may be either Erbil (if acceptable to the federal government) or Turkey. Alternative arrangements and close attention to security especially into the International Zone are being monitored.

The identification of twenty curricula rather than nine has taken longer to develop. However, the curricula that have completed, the hands on training will begin. Nominations for trainers initiated this quarter. The risk is that the present lifecycle of the project will not allow for the monitoring of the training and the decentralization of training through on-line course development. Thus, as a management response a no cost extension was submitted early in the quarter to the UNDAF Fund and has been approved by the Board but the final step not yet complete at the end of 2nd Quarter.
