UN Women is non-resident agency in UN country team and is one of the implementing partner of the LECReD project. UN Women activities mainly focus on bringing gender perspective in to the LECReD program on providing guidance and training on gender and climate change/resilience responsive planning and budgeting to program coordination unit, technical working group, program staffs and local level Laamu specific institutions such as atoll & island councils, women's development committees, civil societies and women groups, in order to mainstream gender throughout the LECReD program. Furthermore training of trainers on gender and climate change and climate resilience and also conduct advocacy campaign on gender and climate change throughout the program period in order to bring gender perspective in all local level plans interventions which translates to higher level policy shifts on gender and climate change/resilience. Additionally support to prepare guidelines and conduct trainings for women led organizations on climate resilience small grants projects. Through LECReD this is also first time where gender dimension have been looked into detail and advocacy on gender and climate initiatives will be implemented separately at UNCT programs. UN Women headquarter received the first tranche of LECReD program funds (USD 72500) on November 2013 but since the reporting period there are no expenses incurred to reflect on the report.

  document throughout pro-doc formulation. The pro-doc had been revised and formulated on a more
  comprehensive and concise format where gender will be mainstreamed throughout the LECReD
  project cycle.
- The new revised LECReD outputs and activities specific to UN Women are incorporated in UN Women 2014-2017 strategic note and 2014 UN Women Multi-country office work plan, on the areas of promoting women economic empowerment and importance of incorporating gender dimension in climate change and climate resilience initiatives while taking note of the socio-cultural roles assigned to women and men in the local community, power relations and decision making processes which influences impacts of climate change on men and women

- UN Women contributed on LECReD in finalizing the LECReD working group activities and participated in meetings to finalize program inception initiatives
- Through Low Emission Climate Resilient Development (LECReD) this is the first time Advocacy on Gender and climate initiatives will be implemented separately at UNCT programs
- UN Women also engaged in drawing technical expertise on gender and climate change from UN
  Women headquarter level and compiling similar experience programs within regional level in the
  context of Small Island developing states.
- Engaged with government counterparts and line ministries on UN Women specific activities on LECReD program components on the implementation arrangements also to reflect on Ministries 2014 focus areas.
