The United Nations has had limited engagement with the government since the military takeover of October 2021, and even less so since the outbreak of conflict between the Sudanese Armed Forces and the Rapid Support Forces on 15 April 2023. The PBF Joint Steering Committee co-chair is a government official, so following the October 2021 military takeover it was decided to wait until political context is more suitable for convening a JSC. The PBF Secretariat has been in contact with the National Peace Commissioner since the outbreak of conflict on 15 April, but there has been no formal meeting or engagement in the last 6 months.

As of this reporting period, outcomes 1 and 2 of the project have completed implementation, having finalized all activities in support of peacebuilding strategies and infrastructures for peace in Sudan in the previous reporting period (For further detail, see November 2022 Progress Report). This project report therefore only covers outcome 3, which supports the functioning of the in-country PBF Secretariat. As of January 2023, the PBF Secretariat has merged with the Sudan Multi-Partner Trust Fund (MPTF) Secretariat to form a joint PBF-MPTF Secretariat, responsible for the coordination, monitoring and evaluation, and communications of all PBF and MPTF investments in Sudan. This merger was intended to strengthen the coherence and impact of both funding mechanisms by ensuring alignment on strategic outcomes, enhancing cohesion in funding allocation, and building thematic and geographic synergies. The merger of the two secretariats was guided by the Joint MPTF-PBF Strategic Results Framwork (SRF), endorsed by the DSRSG/RC/HC in October 2022, which brings together the investments of the two funding sources under a shared strategic chapeau and with common high-level outcomes. As of the outbreak of conflict in April 2023, the PBF Secretariat has been evacuated from Sudan, and is undertaking its role remotely.

Indicate any additional analysis on how Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment and/or Youth Inclusion and Responsiveness has been ensured under this Outcome <i>Please limit your response to 3000 characters including spaces.</i> The Peacebuilding Assessments completed in 7 states under this outcome adopted a gender-responsive questionnaire and were carried out to assess the situation related to gender-sensitive issues and barriers to women's participation in peace processes (ex. the exclusion of women from political participation and civic life including local peace committees run by Omdas and Native Administration, issues of poverty, insecurity, SGBV, illiteracy, access to justice and very conservative social norms, particularly in rural communities which hindered women and especially young women from equally participating in social, economic and political life and decision making.)
The preparation of the assessment ensured 30% gender representation for the regional team carrying out the assessment, which contributed to building local capacities for women to develop methodologies and lead assessments on their local context to address their own issues and challenges. The assessment ensured women and youth focus consultations as well.

Indicate any additional analysis on how Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment and/or Youth Inclusion and Responsiveness has been ensured under this Outcome <i>Please limit your response to 3000 characters including spaces.</i> The conflict risk dashboard (CRD) developed under this outcome has a gender-responsive conflict analysis system, where the information is captured through dedicated indicators to provide an overall gender-disaggregated
analysis. The technical team for the conflict sensitivity training, also supported under this outcome, developed a selection criteria of trainees with priorities on gender parity and age distribution. As a result, women trainees represented 13 out of 31 total participants, and more than half of the participants were below 35 years old.

The PBF Secretariat continued to perform its functions to ensure the quality of new and ongoing PBF-funded projects through support to project design, coordination, monitoring and evaluation, and communications.

The Secretariat supported two newly-approved projects (one YPI project implemented by SOS Sahel, and one GPI project implemented by Search for Common Ground) with project start-up. The Secretariat also oversaw the closure of a project in February implemented by Search for Common Ground on strengthening the political and peacebuilding role of women in Gedaref, South Kordofan, West Kordofan and Khartoum states. The Secretariat led trainings on M&E, gender and youth responsiveness, and other topics at the planning workshop of the PBF-funded project implemented by IOM and FAO on the climate-security nexus in Gedaref in March.

In February, the Secretariat organized a donor visit to Blue Nile State to demonstrate the progress of the PBF-funded project implemented by UNEP, UNWOMEN, and UNDP. The Norwegian Ambassador, Deputy Head of Mission for Switzerland, and First Secretary (Political) of Canada participated.

With the onset of conflict on 15 April, the PBF Secretariat engaged with the 12 active PBF projects to understand the conflict's effects on project teams and implementation, support required, and proposed next steps. The Secretariat reviewed and submitted to PBSO five NCE and/or project amendment requests, and is continuing to engage with the remaining seven projects in case of future reprogramming needs.

In March the PBF Secretariat began the development of an M&E plan for the previously-developed SRF. However, the outbreak of conflict in April halted this process, as well as related M&E and reporting activities. The Secretariat requested a waiver regarding the submission of progress reports for June bi-annual reporting as a result of the conflict. Nevertheless, the Secretariat supported the finalization of the independent final evaluation of the recently completed Search for Common Ground project, and the impact evaluation for the previously completed joint Darfur Programme.

Finally, the PBF produced a series of communication and information products that are regularly distributed to partners and other stakeholders, including a visual overview of the PBF portfolio, attached as an annex.

The PBF Secretariat in Sudan, in partnership with the United Nations System Staff College (UNSSC), IOM, UNDP and the Conflict Sensitivity Facility in Sudan, held a training of trainers (ToT) from 12-16 March in Khartoum. The training brought together 26 participants (7 female, 19 male) from various backgrounds (17 UNAFPs, 7 civil society, 2 academia) from across the country, including the Darfur, Kordofan and Eastern States, as well as Khartoum. The one-week intensive training equipped participants with the skills to independently create and deliver trainings on conflict sensitivity and peacebuilding using a variety of methodologies. The training also prepared the participants to help their respective organisations adopt conflict sensitive practices.

Following the outbreak of armed conflict between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) on 15 April, one of the participants reported that they used what they learned in the training to provide a conflict-sensitive emergency programming training to UNDP, UNICEF and national implementing partners (5 NNGOs) as part of a PBF-supported project building social cohesion in East Sudan, as well as two local Peace Centres (8 female and 18 male participants). As a result, the project team is using the conflict sensitivity considerations and practices learned from the ToT to navigate the current complex political and security landscape of Sudan while implementing the project.

The PBF Secretariat in partnership with UNSSC and UNDP has developled a self-paced, online learning platform focused on conflict sensitivity that is available free of charge for all HDP Nexus practitioners working on Sudan. As of April 2023, 2597 participants registered for the course and 127 have already completed and received certificates. This work is continuing, in stage 2 now, with 3 other modules currently being developed focusing on community engagement, durable solutions, and Darfur. The initiative also delivered 6 thematic seminars on conflict sensitivity, land issues, women and youth peace and security, climate security and durable solutions. Based on this course, the Conflict Sensitivity and Peacebuilding training of trainers in Sudan was conducted in March with 26 participants (7 female, 19 male) from UN AFPs and civil society across the country, selected out of 850 applicants.
