Based on the need for and existing opportunities to build on progress in women's political participation in ARoB, a Post-Election Study and Gender Analysis were conducted in June 2015 after the Bougainville Presidential and Parliamentary Elections . The study findings pointed out the existing gaps and justified the project's outputs, thus this became the baseline for this outcome. A number of political participation advocacy and capacity-building for women, including Parliamentary Trainings were supported by the project which saw women gaining a thorough understanding of the challenges related to their leadership even in a 3/4 matrilineal society like Bougainville. These support and that of other development partners through government departments and civil society groups, paved the way for a united approach to developing a phased Strategic Plan to address women's lack of equal participation and opportunities at all political and administrative levels of decision-making in the region. The various forms of support for women in leadership and advocacy for referendum has also significantly increased the participation of women leaders in referendum preparations especially at the advocacy level. Women in various capacities who were reached

through this PBF support have now become champions of community outreach and the veritable instrument for reliable and trusted messages into communities related to the BPA and referendum.

This outcome has been achieved but needs to be closely monitored by the UN for any distortion of joint messages by the women themselves or other various external players within the limited space of Bougainville.

By partnering with various key Bougainville Government departments including that of the President and the Bougainville Executive Council, to advocate for the development of gender-responsive mechanisms at the policy, process and institutional levels, a historical achievement in the Pacific was made with the Bougainville House of Representatives establishing a Parliamentary Select Committee on Gender Equality, Peace and Security. This Committee have since become a powerful voice for the women in Parliament, with one of their greatest supporters being the President and Speaker of Parliament. The partnership and collaboration with government also brought about the establishment of the Office for Gender Equality that is mandated to coordinate equal gender mainstreaming into all ABG departmental policies and programmes, including monitoring the implementation of the

Bougainville Women in Leadership Strategic Plan, and working closely with the Parliamentary Committee on Gender to ensure women's issues are voiced on the floor of Parliament. Through the effective partnership and collaboration with the government, further milestones were achieved; one of which was the development of Department of Community Development's Policy for Women's Empowerment, Gender Equality, Peace and Security, and the other being the ratified Bougainville Community Government Act 2016 which called for a 50/50 political representation of men and women at local level elections. Bougainville Government have taken ownership of Gender Equality by taking on board and institutionalizing gender-responsive mechansims not only at the legislature and policy levels, but right down to the community government structures to effectively ensure equal participation of men and women in all aspects of decsion making.

This outcome has been achieved but needs to be closely monitored by UN to ensure its sustainablity and that there is continued advocacy on new and emerging trends of good practices in and around the Pacific that promotes women's empowerment.

What consultation/validation process has taken place on this report (1000 character limit)?	2016 - UN Women's collaboration with the ABG on establishing the OGE is an evidence based output backed with existing approval minutes from the Senior Management Committee (SMC) and the Presidential directive to the Office of the Chief Secretary. These included other ABG policy guidelines endorsed by the ABG e.g. the Bougainville Women's Empowerment, Gender Equality, Peace & Security and Community Government Act 2016. Through coherence between UNDP's Parliamentary Project and Equality for progress, there is strong and clear support from the male Parliamentarians, including the President and the Speaker who are outstanding male champions of Gender Equality. Request from the BHOR Speaker to UNDP/UNWOMEN to provide information and ToRs as well as sharing of best practices on establishment of a gender parliamentary committee elsewhere globally is an indication that the project made a positive impact in support of women's empowerment

(1500 character limit)	Equality for progress fills a critical funding gap complementing the limited ABG budgetary base. The funding has also been critical through the establishment of Policy coordiantion platforms including the Office of Gender Equality (OGE) an area that has received minimum support from the ABG in the last 5 years. With the Department of Community Government tasked with the mandate of Gender Mainstreaming, capacity strengthening of senior Departmental personnel has been realized with funding from this Immediate Response Facility (IRF) project.

This has resonated throughout the

initiatives that have embraced capacity strengthening for Women Parliamentarians as well as the membership of the Bougainville Women's Federation, establishment of the OGE, Women participation in the referendum preparatory processes including attendance of JSB meetings and approval of the Gender Policy by the ABG.

Risk taking/innovation: Did the project support any innovative or risky activities to achieve peacebuilding results? What were they and what was the result? (1500 character limit)

Utilizing a top down approach, key institutional platforms that will roll out Gender mainstreaming have been established. The project has taken a number of innovative or risky activities that have positively added value to the overall outcome. Under Outcome 1 of the UN Peacebuilding Priority Plan, support to the Bougainville parliament has been extended to reinforce gender mainstreaming in the Bougainville Parliament. As such, UNDP also utilized this opportunity through the parliamentary project to raise awareness on gender, engagement and dialogue with male parliamentarians. Furthermore to promote Gender sensitive Legislation enactment, the Bougainville House of Representatives endorsed the decision of establishing a select Committee on Gender Equality, peace and security which had the full support of the ABG Government.

With the UN's sustained engagements with the Autonomous Bougainville Government, Gender mainstreaming remains the principal objective of the Equality for progress project. This has included capacity strengthening of parliamentarians through several trainings in political delibrations, ICT etc with key focus on the 4 women leaders and the development of Gender responsive policy guidelines. Gender equality remains the principal objective of the women in Leadership project and the original gender marker 3 is still relevant. This is crucial given the small numbers of female representatives in the Bougainville Parliament accounting for less than 10% with 1 female representative under the open seat and the 3 women legislators occupying the regional reserved seats. This is even compounded by the fact that of the 14 Cabinet Ministers only one is female.

In preparation for the upcoming referendum, women have been mobilised under the Bougainville Women Federation (BWF) to lead BPA and referendum awareness in their respective communities. The determination and organisation of Bougainville's women and their unflinching desire to have their voices heard in political decision making which will determine Bougainville's political future, they advocated for two slots in the Bougainville Referendum Commission once established. This is duly been considered by the ABG. Furthermore, to show their degree of resilience and much anticipated level of engagement they have also advocated very strongly to be included in the ABG Joint Supervisory Body delegation as a member with a view to lend their voices to the determination of Bougainville's political future which will be determined by the referendum of 15 June 2019.

An external Evaluation of the IRF project conducted responded to the overall management and implementation arrangements of the project. (Refer Evaluation Report attached)

In terms of changes to the project, there has been an adjustment in its implementation timeframe. Due to delayed official submission of project documents to PBSO, and the lengthy government administrative and legal processes involved in setting up substantive government offices, there were subsequent delays in progressing some outputs of the project such as the establishment of the OGE. Therefore the IRF sought and was granted a No-Cost-extension from 31st July 2016 which was the initial end date for the project, to 31st January 2017.
