## **BACKGROUND**

# 1. Humanitarian context analysis

- •Estimated 855 000 people in Somalia are in Crisis and Emergency (IPC Phases 3& 4) a 17% increase over estimates between February and June 2015 and 2.3 million people are Stressed (IPC Phase2) (FNASU August 2015). Over 1 million people will remain in crisis and emergency despite heavy Deyr rains (FEWSNET October 2015), 22 000 of them are IDPs in North Mudug and require support for predictable food access and livelihoods.
- •Displaced persons in Somalia are estimated at 579 000 all vulnerable and in crisis and emergency. In Galcayo the IDPs in settlements are very vulnerable to food insecurity evidenced by 75-85% of their total household expenditure being on food (FSNAU, August 2015). They need cash support to access food and other basic needs especially women and children headed households. This will also enhance protection against child labour, increased sexual and gender based violence and involuntary family separation among IDPs already in crisis and emergency. Additional 30,000 IDPs are stressed.
- •Acute malnutrition is reported in 214 700 children under the age of five and 39 700 of them severely malnourished. The number of acutely and severely malnourished children is expected to increase to 343 400 and 63 400 respectively through the end of 2015(FSNAU Sept 2015). In Galcayo acute malnutrition rate of GAM 20.2% and stunting rate of 10.8% are reported among IDPs (FSNAU August 2015). There is need to support households with acutely malnourished children to access food (milk, meat, etc) to improve nutrition of these children.
- About 1326 000 urban people are stressed across Somalia. In North Mudug 10,000 people are stressed in urban areas while in rural areas 11,000 are stressed and require livelihoods protection interventions (FSNAU, GU 2015 assessment reports).
- •A household expenditure on food among IDPs is 75-85% of in settlements in Galcayo, implying inadequate cash for other basic needs. There is need to support provide opportunities for these households to earn income through cash for work for both integrated and those in the camps in urban and rural areas to access other basic needs.
- •In North Mudug, increased crisis and emergency is attributed to poor rainfall in pastoral and agro-pastoral areas; trade disruption in southern urban areas due to insurgent activities and continued population displacement, unofficial taxation in neighboring regions pushing food prices much higher, below average cereal harvest and dry Xagaa period.
- •Above normal Deyr rains are going on and causing flash floods and damage to strategic productive assets (access roads,) crops and outbreaks of infectious and vector-borne livestock diseases CCPP RVF Anthrax Helminthosis Foot rot etc in both regions. Damage to access roads will affect flow of goods and services and increase food prices beyond the reach of populations in emergency. The livestock disease outbreaks will result in deterioration of food security and livelihoods. Thus there is need to support households in emergency and food crisis to access food through cash transfer.
- •This intervention envisages improving food access of households with malnourished children by providing unconditional cash transfer to enable them have scheduled access to food.

#### 2. Needs assessment

Galkacyo is one of the towns in Somalia with the high number of IDPs where an estimated 60,000 IDPs live in about 27 settlements. The settlements are characterized by chronic poverty and lack of sufficient basic domestic and hygiene items (VSF G assessment report, Nov 2013) among other things. According to an assessment report by VSF G team in Galkacyo in December 2014, food security situation in the IDP camps is deteriorating due to limited economic opportunities, influx of more displaced populations resulting from recent clashes in parts of South Somalia and inadequate support in the aid agencies. Begging, casual work (garbage collection, construction work, cloth washing, etc.) and support from relatives are the main sources of income for the IDPs. Despite food security and livelihoods interventions by aid agencies IDP households still spend 75-85% of their total household expenditure on food (FSNAU, August 2015). Acute malnutrition rate of GAM 20.2% and stunting rate of 10.8% are reported among IDPs (FSNAU August 2015). Women headed households in particular face greater challenges (FSNAU's Post Gu 2014 report) due to less diversified income sources, inadequate dietary diversity and very severe coping strategy index to meet their dietary needs with very little productive and livestock assets. According to market assessment report done by VSFG in September 2015, the community strongly recommended the support of vulnerable households to access food from markets since their purchasing power is eroded due to lack of income despite the food being available in local markets.

### 3. Description Of Beneficiaries

The beneficiaries are urban poor and Internally Displaced persons currently living in Galcayo town. Men, women ,boys and girls from poor and vulnerable households will be the direct beneficiaries.

#### 4. Grant Request Justification

The grant will be used to support the households in emergency need of food access. The unconditional cash transfers will enable the target households have purchasing power and access basic food. The improved access will enable the supported households address the acute and critical malnutrition currently affecting their children under five years of age. Improved food access through the cash transfer will also provide protection of the households against child abuse, Gender Based violence and separation of families.

## 5. Complementarity

VSF Germany proposes to assist 900 IDPs and urban vulnerable households (70% female) in acute food insecurity in Galkacyo with cash grants to enable them access food; each household receiving \$ 60/month for 4 months (900 x 6 = 5400 individuals). The selected beneficiaries will be issued with a voucher which they will cash at a local money transfer company, Dahabshiil. Money obtained will be used to access food from local markets for the family. Through similar projects in the past, the organization has learnt that the proposed intervention is effective in supporting people in crisis, particularly IDPs and children
