Project Summary:

This project proposes a 10-month intervention aimed at improving access to quality education and WASH inputs for drought as well as conflict affected students in remote areas of Bari region of Puntland State of Somalia through the provision of education supplies, emergency take away food rations for students and family food rations for teachers to meet their food and energy needs and motivate teachers to stay in the schools, sanitary kits for adolescent girls to facilitate their regular attendance at school, increasing water storage capacity, rehabilitation/extension of water points and latrines and safe drinking water supply to schools to provide for student and teacher safe drinking water needs, and improving hygiene practices among children through engagement with community hygiene promoters. The project will provide training on the roles and responsibilities, water management, food management, and Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) for Community Education Committee (CEC) members of the respective schools. The project will also train community hygiene promoters on hygiene promotion, psycho-social support and child protection and safeguarding as they will be closely interacting with children during hygiene promotion sessions. Water for schools will be provisioned through water tanks with increased and improved water storage facilities. This will ensure children remain in school and learn in a protected, adequately resourced, and safe environment. Further, the CECs will be trained on DRR to build their capacity and preparedness to respond to future disasters. Minor rehabilitation of schools will be carried out to provide a safe and secure learning environment to children. Water points and gender friendly latrines in the targeted schools will be rehabilitated/extended to allow girls and boys to access the facilities in order to avoid disruptions in learning. Back to school campaign will be launched through mobile radio by airing messages with special focus to encourage enrollment of IDPs children. The Ministry of Women's Development and Family Affairs' (MoWDAFA) Regional Child Protection Coordinator will be engaged to strengthen the child protection referral mechanism at the regional level. The regional Education in Emergency (EiE) coordination system will be strengthened in Bari through monthly meetings of humanitarian agencies in the Education sector to coordinate the response and minimize duplication. This system will linked with the Puntland-level EiE Working Group for discussion, refinement, and sharing of lessons learned.

The indirect beneficiaries of the project will be the catchment population of the schools including general community, parents and siblings of children who are enrolled in schools. This will total approximately 19,800 individuals.

Catchment Population:

The catchment population of the targeted location is approximately 3,300 households an estimated catchment population will be 19,800 individuals.

Link with allocation strategy:

The overall strategic priority of the project is to ensure that children affected by the prolonged drought and acute water scarcity in remote, underserved locations of the Bari region of Puntland remain in school and continue to learn in a protected environment through provision of critical education and WASH inputs with a focus on the provision of teaching and learning materials, the provision of safe drinking water and emergency school feeding, the establishment/rehabilitation of safe learning spaces, hygiene promotion to combat Acute Water Diarrhea (AWD)/cholera, the rehabilitation/provision of water storage in schools, and support to CECs. All of the proposed activities are in alignment with the Education Cluster allocation strategy. Further, the project will be implemented in rural areas of Bari, as per the prioritized location for the Education Cluster allocation strategy.

BACKGROUND

1. Humanitarian context analysis

Somalia is ranked as the second most fragile state in the world behind South Sudan based on social political and economic indicator (Fragile State Index). The lack of rule of law as well as ISIS and al-Shabaab's threats and attacks affect families and schools. Additionally, schools and communities are subject to factors such as local conflicts, drought and floods which can lead to infrastructure destruction, displacement, and temporary school closure. The increasing spatial and temporal variability of the rainy and dry seasons and droughts result in severe natural disasters. In February 2017, the President of the Federal Government of Somalia declared a severe nationwide drought and state of national disaster resulting from consecutive seasons of poor rains. For the fourth season in a row since the beginning of 2016, the rains performed poorly in Somalia. Rainfall in Deyr season October-December 2017 was erratically distributed and approximately 50% below-average in most areas. Furthermore, a below-average April to June 2018 Gu season is likely, and if this forecast comes to fruition it will mark the fifth consecutive poor season in Somalia. The overall impact of the drought in Somalia has taken a heavy toll on the affected population as basic living conditions have deteriorated and access to education, water and sanitation continues to decline. According to FSNAU/FEWSNET, over 2.7 million people will face Crisis or Emergency (IPC Phases 3 and 4) between January and June 2018 in Somalia.

According to the Multi-dimensional Poverty Index (MPI) for Somalia, an estimated 82% of Somalis were in multidimensional poverty before the drought. More than half of children were out of school and only a quarter of primary aged children were enrolled in school; this number has further declined due to the prolonged drought. According to the Drought Impact and Needs Assessment (DINA), approximately 80,000 children stopped attending school and more than 121,000 students have been at risk of dropping out since the drought set in.

The effects of drought have affected the availability of water which directly affects hygiene and sanitation. Pervasive poverty compounded by the dramatic decline in household purchasing power due to losses in livelihoods, primarily livestock and agriculture, has reduced households' ability to buy water. The cost of water has increased 50% during the critical drought period. Commodity price increases of this scale further undermine the ability of families to send their children to school.

With the failure of the Deyr rains, the Vice President of Puntland issued a drought declaration and an appeal in November 2017. This followed an earlier appeal released by the Humanitarian Affairs and Disaster Agency (HADMA) in August 2017 in response to the ongoing drought. According to HADMA's drought field monitoring report issued on 11 November 2017, most of the population in Puntland does not have access to adequate food and income, apart from those who receive humanitarian assistance. The report indicated that more than 20,000 households, mostly nomads, in about 15 districts visited are in need of emergency water trucking as most of the rural berkads are dry and the price of water had doubled compared to normal seasons where the price of 200 liters of water ranges from 4 to 5 USD. The recent FSNAU 2017 post-Deyr results show that 61% of Nugaal and Bari populations are acutely food insecure in IPC Phases 2, 3 and 4. On average, the prolonged drought has affected an estimated 384,000 school-aged children to varying degrees.

2. Needs assessment

Drought-related displacement has drastically affected children's access to education services. As a consequence of the prolonged drought, the sector experienced the following effects: disruption of school calendar in some regions of the country, scarcity of adequate safe water in schools, scarcity of nutritious food for children and their families, and increased enrollments in displacement destinations resulting in overcrowded and resource-constrained schools.

A joint multi-cluster needs assessment conducted from July to October 2017 shows that 9% of the school-aged children in the assessed households across Somalia were reportedly attending school at the time of assessment. The attendance rate of girls was consistently lower across age-groups and types of school. In a probable reflection of the negative impact of displacement on education, the reported attendance rate of non-displaced children (10%) was double that of IDP children (5%). Children in urban areas reported a higher attendance rate (18%) than children in rural areas (8%). When disaggregated by district, the assessment shows that in Qandala only 23% of school aged children (5-17) attend school despite 77% of respondents reporting that Education was a high priority, 20% as a medium priority and only 3% in low priority category. When ranked as broad categories, Education ranks as the top need (67%), followed by health care (61%), and food (49%). For Bosaso district results show that only 24% of school aged (5-17) children attend schools despite 83% household reporting Education as their top priority.

RI recently conducted a drought assessment in 22 rural schools in Alula, Qandala, Ganbah, Ufyan, Iskushuban, Bareeda, and Bargal districts of Bari region. 45% of those are located in remote areas while the remaining 55% are located in rural villages in Bari region. The assessment shows that current enrolment in these schools is 2,583 where 62% are boys and 38% are girls. Since last academic year 420 students have dropped out from school due to many factors with drought being prime among them. 65% of the dropped out students were boys, while 35% were girls. The data shows that 77% of schools rely on water trucking for water needs while 23% of schools have other water sources including wells and boreholes. In response to the question regarding what is the most pressing need of the school: 64% responded water, 36% responded food. While in response to the question "What is the second most pressing need of the school": 55% responded food, 36% responded water, and 5% each responded protection and learning materials respectively. In response to third most pressing need of schools: 32% responded teacher incentives, 18% responded teaching and learning materials (TLMs), 14% responded food, and 36% responded other, including protection and shelter. The data also show that currently they are not receiving support from any humanitarian agency.

3. Description Of Beneficiaries

Beneficiaries to be targeted through this intervention are primarily students, teachers and community education committee (CEC) members from drought and conflict affected agro-pastoralist communities in Qandala, Ufeyn, Alula, and Ganbah districts of Bari region in Puntland who have been affected by acute water scarcity and food insecurity due the prolonged drought and conflict. Relief International (RI) is currently implementing the EGEPT (Educating Girls End Poverty Transition) project in Qandala and Alula districts of Bari and is closely engaged with the regional education offices (REOs), district education offices (DEOs), and CECs. RI is involved in community mobilization and campaign initiatives including enrolment and retention campaigns across the catchment communities. Hence, replication of the interventions in the other two proposed contiguous districts of Ufeyn and Ganbah will follow a similar strategy. RI will endeavor to actively engage at the community level led by the CECs, REOs, and DEOs leading the way. RI has successfully implemented Education in Emergencies (EiE) responses in rural areas of Bari through its engagement of communities and local authorities. RI staff will oversee the process and provide guidelines to support the CECs and local authorities in the identification of direct beneficiaries to ensure transparency and accountability. RI will rely on its experience and expertise in targeting vulnerable girls, including those who are marginalized and adolescent girls on the verge of dropping out of school. In total, 2,305 students (855 girls and 1,450 boys), 68 teachers (3 females and 65 males), 15 CEC members (5 females and 10 males), and 15 Hygiene Promoters will directly benefit from the project inputs.

4. Grant Request Justification

The proposed intervention will address the specific needs of the targeted beneficiaries (i.e. girls, boys, teachers and CEC members) in alignment with the strategic priorities of the Cluster. The first set of activities aim to retain students and teachers in schools, addressing their specific needs through the provision of TLMs, safe drinking water, take away food rations for students and teachers, construction and/or rehabilitation of water storage infrastructure, rehabilitation/construction of toilets, and the provision of sanitary kits to adolescent girls. The second set of activities are focused on building the capacity of the CECs and local authorities to manage immediate water distribution, food distribution in schools, and to enhance their ability to cope with future disasters. CECs will be trained on their role and responsibilities, emergency food and water management and DRR. Hygiene promoters will be trained on hygiene best practices, psychosocial support and child protection as they will interact closely with children during hygiene promotion sessions. This will help to provide a safe and protected learning environment to drought and conflict affected children in schools. RI will leverage its experience and expertise from other projects to ensure that the intervention meets both the strategic priorities of 2018 allocation strategy and the emergency needs of the affected students and communities in the Bari region of Puntland.

5. Complementarity

The proposed project will complement and build on RI's emergency drought response projects and RI's ongoing long-term education programming. In February 2017, RI received OCHA/SHF emergency funding for "Improved Access to Education and Water, Sanitation & Hygiene (WASH) Services for Drought Affected Students and Teachers in Remote and Underserved Locations of Bari Region of Puntland' project which aimed to ensure that children remain in school in a protected and sufficiently resourced environment. In this emergency Education and WASH project, RI trained 36 CEC members were trained on water and food management, hygiene promotion and Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR). RI improved access to drinking water by distributing safe drinking water to all the schools and constructing/rehabilitating school water points. The project also provided TLMs, emergency supplementary feeding, sanitary kits for adolescent girls, and hygiene promotion sessions for students. In total, 1,843 students, 36 CEC members, and 36 teachers benefited from this emergency intervention. Linkages have already been developed with some of the CECs in the ten (10) schools targeted under this project in Bari. In addition to this short-term emergency project, RI implemented the DFID-funded Girls' Education Challenge (GEC) project from 2013-2017. The second phase of the project, EGEP-T, began on May 1, 2017 and will see the same schools, and specifically the same cohort of targeted girls, supported until 2020. Approximately 58,000 girls are receiving bursary fee payment or other educational support through EGEP-T across Somaliland, Puntland, and south central Somalia. In addition, RI is also implementing an Education Cannot Wait project in Nugal, Bari, Gardufu, and Mudug. To this point, RI is supporting 9,008 students and 297 teachers and CEC members with takehome food rations, access to safe water, sanitary kits, TLMs, and equipment for extracurricular activities. RI has an established office in Bosaso and its education team is on ground.

Overall project objective

Contribution to Cluster/Sector Objectives: The proposed activities aim to keep children in school and to facilitate learning in a resourced and protected environment - the key priorities of the Education Cluster in this response strategy. The activities will include the provision of TLMs, water, takeaway food rations for students and teachers, increased access to water and toilets, distribution of sanitary kits to adolescent girls to reduce absenteeism, capacity building of CECs, and improvement of hygiene practices though hygiene promotion engagement with students in schools to reduce the risk of AWD/cholera and other disease outbreaks.

Activities

Activity 1.1.1

Standard Activity: School equipment and material learning distribution

Teaching and learning materials will be distributed to 15 schools (2305 students) and will include notebooks, pens, bags and sports equipment at the start of new academic year. Each student (1450 boys and 855 girls) will receive 4 notebooks (1 square line for Math and 3 broad line notebooks for English, Somali, and Science), 1 packet of 10 lead pencils, 3 pencil sharpeners, 1 geometry box (kit), 3 erasers (rubbers), and 1 school bag once at the beginning of the academic year. Each school will receive 3 boxes of chalk (50 pieces each), 4 teacher attendance registers, 8 student attendance registers, 1 CEC minutes book, 3 packets of A4 papers, 4 boxfiles, 1 hole punch machine, 3 packets of ball point pens, 1 stapler with staples, 4 lesson preparation books, 10 student sitting mats, 3 dustbins, 3 sports equipment kits (football, pump, and skipping rope), 5 teacher chairs, and 2 teacher tables.

Activity 1.1.2

Standard Activity: School feeding

Take-home food rations comprising 10.5 kg of rice, 1 L of oil and 1.5 kg of sugar will be distributed to all children on a monthly basis in the 10 schools (899 boys and 471 girls): 1370 students) where there is no WFP school feeding for five months (Sept-Dec and Feb) during the project period excluding vacation period. The academic year begins in September through December. January is holiday with classes resuming in February. The project will provide take-home food rations for the months that school is in session (5 months) during the project period.

Activity 1.1.3

Standard Activity: Incentive for teachers

68 teachers in all 15 schools will receive in kind support for family food rations (enough for an average family consisting of six members). The monthly family food ration will comprise 63 kg of rice, 9 kg of sugar, and 6 L of oil per teacher on monthly basis. This distribution will be for 5 months (Sept-Dec and Feb) during the project period. The academic year begins in September through December. January is holiday with classes resuming in February. The project will provide take-home food rations for the months that school is in session (5 months) during the project period.

Activity 1.1.4

Standard Activity: Back to school Campaign

A back to school campaign will be launched at the start of the academic year through the engagement of local mobile radio & main stream Radio by airing messages and engaging CECs and religious figures to participate in airing messages for mobilization. one enrollment campaign event will be held in Balidoog village which is the catchment area of Balidoog, Tastic & Geesoqbad schools.

Activity 1.1.5

Standard Activity: Refurbishment of learning spaces

8 classrooms in 4 existing schools buildings will be rehabilitated to provide safe and secure learning environments for children. The schools are Tohin Primary School (88 boys and 44 girls: 132), El Las Primary School (61 boys and 20 girls: 81), Dayah Primary School 51 boys and 24 girls: 75), and Hamure Primary School (44 boys and 41 girls: 85).

Activity 1.1.6

Standard Activity: Hygiene promotion

428 adolescent girls will be provided with sanitary kits to maintain hygienic condition as well as to attend school without any disruption. The distribution of sanitary kits will be managed through the engagement of regional gender focal person. RI will provide sanitary kits comprised of 6 packs of 10 pads and 4 pairs of underwear to each enrolled adolescent girl to last 5 months (Sept-Dec and Feb) of project duration during the academic year excluding vacation period. It is estimated that the typical menstruation period is 5-7 days and each girl will use 2 pads per day.

Activities

Activity 1.2.1

Standard Activity: Water distribution in schools

Water will be supplied to 15 schools through water trucking at a rate of 3 liters/day/student for a period of 5 months during school days and excluding the vacation period for 2,305 children and 68 teachers. RI will select a water trucking company based on a competitive tender process in line with RI procurement polices to ensure the best value for money and quality.

Activity 1.2.2

Standard Activity: Water and sanitation infrastructure construction/refurbishment

3 water storage points will be constructed while one will be rehabilitated and 3 twin gender friendly latrines will be constructed in 3 schools.

Activity 1.2.3

Standard Activity: Water and sanitation infrastructure construction/refurbishment

15 PVC tanks (2,000 liter capacity each) and aquatabs will be provided to store safe drinking water in schools.

Activity 1.2.4

Standard Activity: CEC training

15 CEC members from 5 schools will be trained for 2 days on the roles and responsibilities, water and food management, and DRR.

Activity 1.2.5

Standard Activity: Capacity building

15 Hygiene promoters will be trained for 3 days on hygiene promotion, AWD/cholera, psychosocial support and child protection.

Activity 1.2.6

Standard Activity: Hygiene promotion

Bi-weekly sessions will be conducted by the 15 trained Hygiene Promoters with the children from the targeted schools on hygiene promotion, best practices and child protection.

Activity 1.2.7

Standard Activity: Psychosocial support for learners

The enrolled children in targeted schools will be provided psycho social support through recreational activities, e.g. sports competition, quiz competitions & drawing competitions

Monitoring & Reporting plan

RI has designed and developed a robust M&E system and tools for the EGEP project, other education projects, and its SHF projects. RI will adapt the existing monitoring tools to systematically monitor and measure the progress of the project's logframe indicators. RI has offices in the project location (Bari) where the proposed project will be implemented and RI works closely with the Ministry of Education (MoE) at the central and regional levels, as well as with the CECs, in order to monitor project activities including frequent joint field visits to the project sites. With the help of RI's Monitoring, Evaluation and Learning Coordinator, RI's Project and Monitoring Officers will closely monitor the project deliverables and their impact through systematic data collection from direct beneficiaries at the targeted schools and within the targeted communities. In order to measure the proposed outcome and output indicators, the project will employ mixed methodologies (quantitative and qualitative) to collect and analyze the data. These include using direct observation, Key Informant Interviews with school head teachers, and village leaders in the targeted communities. RI will also conduct focus group discussions with the CECs and the girls and boys to gauge the level of impact the deliverables have on the beneficiaries and develop case studies. In addition, RI will collect all relevant and required financial and programmatic documentation to be used as means of verification. This will include training reports, attendance sheets for trainees, beneficiary lists, contracts with vendors, procurement documents, water vouchers, water supply receipt notes from CECs/head teachers, school enrolment figures, attendance rates, photos of water distribution and field reports. RI staff will carry out regular field visits to project sites and assess the progress of the project activities and its contribution to the proposed outputs. Key staff from RI's Garowe office, including the Education Coordinator, the National Project Manager, the Country Finance Manager, the WASH Assistant and the Program Director from Nairobi will provide the necessary support to implement the project. Financial and programmatic reports will be prepared and shared with the relevant donor personnel and the Education Cluster as per contractual obligations. At least one comprehensive case study highlighting the impact of the intervention on the targeted beneficiaries and contribution towards achievement of the project outcome will be developed.

Accountability to Affected Populations

School authorities, CEC members of the targeted schools and relevant education authorities have already been consulted about the proposed project both in person and/or via telephone communication to incorporate their inputs in the project design. The districts and school were identified based on the feedback from local education authorities. The process of continuous feedback, review and revision will be undertaken using RI's operating procedures. Regular consultations will be undertaken after the approval of the project to ensure all are aware of the project deliverables, roles and responsibilities and timelines. RI works with the MoE&HE as leader of the Puntland education system. All activities and actions will be discussed with the MoE&HE and the work plan will be shared. Further, at the community/school level, the CECs will play a lead role specifically in the distribution of water and food as well as in the implementation of other activities to provide drought response. Key informant interviews and focus groups discussions with CECs, teachers and children will be conducted to obtain feedback on the intervention and will be addressed based on RI's feedback mechanism.

Implementation Plan

RI will directly implement the project after recruitment of project specific staff, who will be guided and supported by the existing EGEP technical team, given its ongoing engagement in Bari region, especially the remote districts and targeted communities. RI will engage regional education officers and district education officers during implementation of the proposed project activities. There will be ongoing consultations with the regional education office staff, school authorities, regional gender focal persons and CEC members to develop a clear school level work plan to ensure that everyone is aware of project deliverables, timelines, accountability and roles and responsibilities to increase ownership over the project by relevant stakeholders. RI will also ensure coordination with other humanitarian agencies as well as UN agencies for a coordinated response. The education in emergencies working group will be updated on project activities to avoid duplication and to keep partners informed of progress and challenges.

Justify Chosen Gender Marker Code

In Somalia, women are disadvantaged compared to men on all socioeconomic and human development indicators. With a Gender Inequality Index of 0.776, the country ranks fourth lowest globally. Social norms and power structures impact the lives and opportunities available to different groups of men and women. With more than 50 percent of the population under the age of 15, addressing gender inequalities is critical to maximize impact and socioeconomic development and build resilience and sustainable peace. RI is currently implementing the EGEP project in the same regions with a focus on girls' education. The beneficiaries' gender disaggregation at schools shows that gender equality is an issue and girls' education remains a significant issue compared to urban areas in Puntland. RI will ensure gender equality while implementing the project activities, focusing specifically on marginalized girls. Gender friendly latrines will be constructed to help girls attend schools without disruption and to feel more comfortable. Sanitary kits will be provided to adolescent girls so that they are able to attend school on a regular basis. In addition, during the training of CECs/Hygiene Promoters, a gender equity component will be integrated into the training to ensure that gender equity is taken into consideration at the implementation phase both at the schools and household levels.

Protection Mainstreaming

Protection programming is defined by RI as the activities and processes through which fundamental human rights principles, including non-discrimination, ensuring meaningful access and prioritizing the safety and dignity of our constituents are recognized and realized in program design and implementation. As per the joint multi-cluster need assessment earlier referenced, drought has resulted in increased household vulnerability and subsequent exposure to protection risks, particularly for displaced groups. Accidental child separation occurring during displacement in some instances or intentional child separation where children may be sent to IDP settlements to access food and other basic services was reported across all 16 assessed regions. 8% households indicated that children were involved in harsh or dangerous activities which is likely a consequence of reduced household resilience as children are forced to contribute to household income. To address child protection issues in the targeted locations, RI will train hygiene promoters on child protection and safeguarding as they will regularly conduct sessions with children. RI has a signed MoU with MoWDAFA under the EGEP project to strengthen the child protection mechanism in the targeted region. MoWDAFA's regional child protection coordinators will be engaged at the regional level in the development of the child protection referral mechanism to address the child protection needs in the targeted locations.

Country Specific Information

Safety and Security

RI has taken steps to ensure the inclusion of security measures in all of its areas of operations. RI has trained field security leads in place. These focal points monitor the security situation in all RI project areas, including Bari, and advise the staff on security issues. The Security Officer at RI HQ also carefully monitors the situation in Somalia and advises personnel on risks and employing best practices to stay as safe as possible in an often uncertain environment.

RI interacts with the communities in such a way that has proven beneficial for early warning systems. Through close coordination and collaboration with these communities, RI has been able to maintain good relationships which are a cornerstone for enhanced security. RI safety and security standard operating procedures are reviewed and adjusted according to the security situation regularly and as needed with contingency plans in the event of further escalation of the security situation.

All RI staff undergo security training as a compulsory part of their orientation. This training is renewed on an annual basis.

Access

RI has access and broad community acceptance in the targeted districts as RI is currently implementing EGEP and an Education Cannot Wait project in the proposed targeted districts. However, due to the remoteness and the presence of armed groups in the catchment districts, access can be abruptly restricted due to the ongoing conflict between armed groups and the Puntland military forces. RI will regularly monitor the security situation in the targeted locations through the engagement of law enforcement agencies, humanitarian organizations in the region and the local communities. In the event that access is restricted based on RI security assessments and/or an advisory from the International NGO Safety Organization (INSO), a revised implementation strategy will be adopted to provide uninterrupted support through the engagement of regional/district education officials and gender focal persons.
