Emergency child protection and child centred resilience building in Wau project, at a cost of \$ 100,000.06 will scale up already on-going integrated, quality and emergency family tracing and reunification for unaccompanied separated and missing children 200 to be newly registered(100 girls and 100 boys) and already registered caseload with regular follow ups, reunification's and setting up of the child protection help desks to support vulnerable children for instance during food distributions; psycho-social support to relieve, distress and restore normalcy of 3,600 children (1,800 boys and 1,800 girls) through community based psycho-social support by utilizing the existing structures like schools, churches and open play grounds, mobile teams will support the moving population in case of an emergency as this will be integrated with other services offered by other partners; strengthening of social structures through rapid training's and orientation and promotion of child rights and SGBV by means of community awareness and discussions to increase the well-being of the affected boys, girls, youths and their families in Wau. This project therefore directly contributes to the standard allocation and directly contributes to the cluster strategy priority actions for the 2017.

BACKGROUND										

1. Humanitarian context analysis

According to South Sudan Protection Trends paper number 09: Renewed conflict in 2016 caused new displacement, generating an influx into existing sites, and requiring the creation of new camps and collective centers – including in locations previously not hosting mass displacement sites. Fighting in June and July in Wau and Juba resulted in thousands of people seeking physical protection in UNMISS bases, and church and NGO compounds. A new protected site and five collective centers were established in Wau in 2016, jointly hosting over 42,000 IDPs. Despite investments to upgrade and maintain the sites, overcrowding continues to be of significant health, security and protection concern. The population in the Wau protective site lives in less than 5.5m2 space per person – one sixth of the Sphere standard. Overcrowding poses stress and mental health concerns for the population and increases protection risks, particularly for women and girls. Wau like any other location it has declared as a famine hit area that needs immediate humanitarian response this is due to the influx of IDPs to many surrounding areas of Wau town. This has risen the needs for children for instance the separation process has gone high, the need for psycho-social services for children, including other grave violations like killing, abduction and rape that have been witnessed as results of the on-going conflicts in many parts of Western Barl El Ghazal. DTM data (20th June 2016) indicates a total of 63,386 individuals are displaced into Wau town and scattered among relatives in the different blocks.

2. Needs assessment

On 26th January 2017, there was an attack by raiders in Wadalel payam in areas of Atiido, Maleng, Masina, Kuawal. This resulted to displacement of over 10,000 people to Wau town in areas of Mbili, Jebel Tik and ECS. For instance in Mbili; 17 cases of missing children of which 11 are girls and 6 were boys. One case of girl killed during the incident in Khorgana. 28 children abducted 20 boys and 8 girls taken to a place called Ayar, and the children were abducted from payam called Rojrojdong, 60% of these IDPs were children and Women and majority of the children are of ages below 10. This is scattered across many surrounding areas of Wau town. Due to ongoing conflicts, in major parts of Wau has left many children with psycho-social distress therefore there is great need for Hold the child to continue offering PSS to these vulnerable children. For FTR, HCO has the current caseload of 151 (unaccompanied children, 33 girls, 30 boys, separated children, 22 girls, 35 boys, missing children, 12 girls and 19 boys, closed cases 12 girls and 10 boys, reunified cases, 15 girls and 19 boys, total TCM 105 girls and 109 boys). Funds from this project will enable HCO to continue offering FTR services (registration of new cases of UASC targeting 120 children (100 boys and 100 girls); tracing request will be initiated, regular follow ups, reunification and referral to other services.

3. Description Of Beneficiaries

The project will increase the protection of boys and girls, youths and their families among the most hit communities of Wau:

- A total of 3,600 children (1,800 boys and 1,800 girls) provided with psycho-social support and life skills education;

- 200 children (100 boys and 100 girls) separated, missing and unaccompanied registered, provided with optimal foster care, followed up, family tracing conducted including referral for services and reunification;

- 4,200 people (1,000 boys, 1,000 girls, 800 men and 1,400 women with prevention messaging;
- 20 caregivers (15 females and 5 males) with enhanced psycho-social well-being;
- Community Based Protection Networks strengthened and supported (60 females and 60 males);

Wau being the recent affected location with crisis it has resulted to displacement of many from their various locations to UNMISS PoC and collection centres, it is indicated that the majority of this affected population remains to be children, youths and women as the most vulnerable to family separation, sexual economic exploitation, physical violence and psycho-social distress and in some cases lack of necessary and adequate parental/guardian care or support

4. Grant Request Justification

Through the funding allocation of \$ 100,000.06 towards the implementation of this project will focus on service delivery associated with various forms of welfare threats and rights abuse with particular concerns to the children including exposure to violence, psychological distress, family separation, exploitation, child labor among others.

HCO will continue offering child protection services especially family tracing and reunification for unaccompanied separated and missing children and setting up of the child protection help desks to support vulnerable children for instance during food distributions; Psycho-social support will relieve, distress and restore normalcy of 3,600 children (1,800 boys and 1,800 girls) through community based psycho-social support by utilizing the existing structures like schools, churches and open play grounds, emergency mobile team could be in place to over both FTR and PSS services to the moving population in case of an emergency as this will be integrated with other services offered by other partners;

Strengthening of social structures through rapid training's and orientation and promotion of child rights and SGBV by means of community awareness and discussions to increase the well-being of the affected boys, girls, youths and their families in Wau.

5. Complementarity

The project will compliment and sustain already ongoing activities of FTR and PSS with the support from SSHF that is ending 3rd of April, 2017.

HCO with the current caseload of over 151 (unaccompanied children, 33 girls, 30 boys, separated children, 22 girls, 35 boys, missing children, 12 girls and 19 boys, closed cases 12 girls and 10 boys, reunified cases, 15 girls and 19 boys, total TCM 105 girls and 109 boys).

Funds from this project will enable HCO to continue offering FTR services (registration of new cases of UASC targeting 200 children (100 boys and 100 girls); tracing request will be initiated, regular follow ups, reunification and referral to other services. With the ongoing PSS intervention in the targeted areas HCO will continue providing PSS to distress children who have not fully recovered

and new children who are reportedly coming to this sites on daily basis.

The project also will complement the family linkages implemented by ICRC where unaccompanied, separated children will be linking to their families through phone calls.

Through regular reporting, referrals and sharing of caseload summary on FTR to the lead agency; the project will complement the work done by SCI who will be able to regularly update the CPIMS database for South Sudan.

Through monthly reporting of 5ws to the CPSC the project will complement the work of UNICEF who is the lead agency of CPSC, hence for easy service mapping to avoid duplication of activities

Monitoring & Reporting plan

The training on FTR team with the technical support and tools from SCI as the lead agency. This will include all the necessary steps involved in case management i.e. from identification, documentation, tracing, follow ups and reunification for unaccompanied, separated and missing children. Data will be collected (by case workers) using standardised FTR forms and booklets provided by SCI, this data will be entered by the data clerk into the CPIMS database used by FTR actors in South Sudan. Regular reporting on weekly reports i.e. weekly back ends and caseload summary compiled by the data clerk and the FTR officer in Wau will be shared to lead agency, case workers will be assigned cases to enable them have regular follow ups and filing of TCM forms as the database will be updated on regular basis. Case workers will regularly refer of cases to other agencies for services as this will be documented using the referral forms and information updated into the CPIMS. Means of verification will be through the number of cases identified and registered (unaccompanied, separated and missing), TCM forms filed, cases reunified, cases closed all updated in the CPIMS; weekly reports on back ends and caseload summary shared.

PSS will be provided by the PSS facilitators who will be trained using tools provided by the PSS task force and other existing global tools. Daily PSS activities will be guided by standardised CFS schedule which clearly indicates activities for each different age groups i.e. 0-5 years, 6-10 years and 11-17 years. Minimum standards for providing PSS will be given high priority to all children who will be accessing the activities. Daily data collection and registration through daily attendance register will be taken into account, the data will be entered into the PSS data tool provided by the PSS task force for analysis. Providing quality PSS (community empowerment and engagement, capitalization of the local resources, age and sex appropriate work-plan, adequate staff ration and expertise, accurate data collection and reporting and regular beneficiaries' feedback collection) will be of priority as this one of the key strategic plans by the PSS task force for 2017. For this be realized there will a coordinated team lead by the PSS officer based in Wau who will give support to CFS facilitators, all the reporting will channelled to the respective persons.

Report on training sessions with clear programme and awareness raising campaigns will be compiled at every end of each training session, reviewed and validated using HCO reporting tools; Community based protection networks and child rights monitoring reports be compiled by the Child protection officer reviewed by the Associate Coordinator and validated by the coordination team.

Monthly Situation monitoring and Response motoring tool kits from the CPSC will be utilised to monitor the implementation and knowing emerging protection needs. MRM reports will be submitted in case of grave violations.

Regular monthly reports on 5ws reflecting all activities and the progress will be shared to CPSC.

Both financial and narrative final reports will be submitted using the available templates.

Regular attendance of coordination meetings and sharing of updates at the National level, State level, County level and site level (for Cluster, Sub cluster, and other technical working groups for instance PSS task force and FTR WG).

Periodic field visits by program coordination and support staff at different follow progress and performance of the project. Quarterly program performance evaluation by the coordination team to review the overall status of the program achievement against targets, output quality and beneficiary feedback will be part of the monitoring process to inform project adjustments and refocusing.

Budget follow up is also shared by the administration and finance department for financial monitoring and follow up.

However the above depends whether the security situation will remain calm during the entire implementation period and access to the areas targeted is guaranteed; hence in case of insecurity and inaccessibility of these areas, mobile response team comprising the local personnel will be deployed across all the targeted areas to make sure the targeted population among vulnerable of children, adolescents, youths, adults and elderly are reached with protection services.

The targeted children for Family Tracing and Reunification their data will be dis-aggregated according to sex and age for both girls and boys; daily data for children accessing PSS activities will be recorded according to sex and age where both girls and boys will be given equal opportunities to participate including children with special needs/disabalities; Personnel will include both male and female who will undergo fare process of recruitment while female candidates will be encouraged to be on board; on the target of beneficiaries the project will benefit internally displaced persons from children (girls, boys), youths and adults both females and males.

Protection Mainstreaming

The project will improve the protection of boys and girls and young people among the IDP collection sites in Wau: The implementation process will include all boys and girls, men and women within the target figures regardless of their background, and affiliations. The project will involve measures to increase Social cohesions, Child rights awareness, Gender inclusion; contribute to normalcy and peace-building in Wau

Country Specific Information

Safety and Security

Wau with incidents of night gun shots, intermittent clashes with less impact on the establishment of PoC and other collective centers. The project is designed on assumption that this happenings will be kept at minimum as the security situation improves. Building on our experience working in the area and the diversity of our team the following security observations will be undertaken during the project life alongside the normal security observation;

Regular if not daily security updates will be analysed by our operations team with key concerns as far as movements is concerned; People within sites will be vigilant during movements at least two or more people will be taking care of each other;

HCO will make sure that there is optimal visibility materials for quick identification of staff;

HCO will work closely with other organizations operating in Wau to have an active contingency plan in case of possible evacuation

Access

Wau is well served with airport and the roads all targeted sites are accessible by road all year round. In case of impediments due to insecurity during the project, HCO being a member of the CP cluster will work with cluster leads to negotiate access corridors as it will deem appropriate.

In case of inaccessibility an approach of NO cost extension will be used, as the project end period will be prolonged to cover the activities planned and target beneficiaries to be reached
