**Project Summary:** 

Through Child protection initiatives, case management, FTR and capacity-building intervention, CCoC is looking to implement services that will meet the basic needs of IDP's and host communities identified with protection concerns such as UASC, neglect, all forms of abuse, child trafficking, GBV through sexual exploitation, early child marriages. Those communities have been displaced from Unity, Jonglei, Upper Nile and Greater Equatoria area due to the July and ongoing conflict in these regions. CCoC partnership with the Ministry of Gender and Social Welfare, IsraAid, ICRC, UNICEF, CHF, UNHCR, UNFPA and other Protection partners will enable the cooperative response to protection issues which will strengthen both the communities and community focal points in delivering services. Currently CCoC is the only organisation that provide accommodation to all child protection cases that are referred by multiple agencies and by community members. Our services, has been ongoing for several years and our Social Workers have developed a good relationship with the community' members and most importantly the leaders who have a great say and trust within their areas. As, such these services are vital to children that have nowhere to go, and the founding will enable ongoing support for them.

## **Catchment Population:**

IDPs and Host Communities in the Urban Juba (i.e. Gumbo, Lologo & Mahad IDPs) and the surrounding Host community including Salakana, St. Mary Cemetery and Korobou most vulnerable communities.

## Link with allocation strategy:

Quality protection response services to address the current conflict, displacement and violence in the Greater Equitoria regions are current priorities within the Protection Cluster in South Sudan. The proposed interventions are centrally located within all of the 2017 protection cluster objectives for CES. CHF SA2 Funding will enable CCoC to continue to strengthen community-based monitoring and reporting along the existing and yet to be updated referral pathway established by Child Protection partners. We require more specialized support in order to be able to deliver urgent psychological first aid to more critical and complex child protection cases. While much work has been ongoing on Child Friendly Spaces, the child protection sub-cluster has regularly acknowledged the critical need for programs specifically tailored to youth for conflict affected areas. Our activities for youth engagement will include providing psycho social support to young people excluded from programming until now, and also will engage them in community dialogue activities and in through the existing Youth/WFS. This engagement will both serve as a preventative activity against Child Protection Concerns. Finally, CCoC has offered interim care for girls and young boys, providing safety and protective spaces vulnerable children to be able to express their concerns freely and be helped to access services they need in an appropriate manner. The CHF funding will enable CCoC continue to meet this critical need and provide a safe haven for Survivors away from threats they receive from abusers or perpetrators of violence.

#### **BACKGROUND**

#### 1. Humanitarian context analysis

Over 1.6 million South Sudanese people were indicated to be displaced due to fighting since 2013 according to (South Sudan Migration Crisis Operational Framework) and thousands more fled to neighboring countries. Since the establishment of child protection sub cluster and GBV working group in South Sudan, they have identified the increased movement of Internally Displaced People, the high presence of UASC, GBV survivors and other protection concerns which has impacted the population.

These protection concerns are continuing to be unmet and the number of IDP's movement into Central Equatoria is estimated over 71,000 (UN Children's Fund, Protection Cluster 2017) and still growing due to instability in Greater Equatorial regions. The implication that comes from being displaced, settling in areas unknown and having no means of support can result to exploitation for many children, due to breakdown of their normal supporting mechanism from the community. As we sighted through the previous projects, there is increase in reporting of UASC, GBV and other child protection issues within the IDP areas and in host communities. We believe the activities conducted by CCoC social workers on awareness raising and referral services could have impacted the volume of reporting, however the increase is still prevalent possibly due to more incidents occurring.

CCoC is a participating member of the Child protection Sub cluster and our project location are recognized by the Ministry of Gender and Social Welfare. CCoC has been providing protection, care, age and gender sensitive PSS for girls and boys as prevention and responds strategy to children with psychological distress since the beginning of the crisis. Moreover, the organization has established child/youth friendly spaces and Women Friendly Spaces in 6 areas of which four (Gumbo, Mahad, Korobou and Lologo) has the highest number of IDP's from affected areas in Unity, Upper Nile, Jonglei, Malakal and Greater Equatoria. We also collaborate with Save the Children, UNICEF, ICRC, OXFAM and UNHCR on cases that are directly referred from those affected areas.

## 2. Needs assessment

The on-going conflict continues to create great risk for children and their families in the communities. Multiple needs have been identified during the previous projects, which includes the prevention of risks to children in the IDPs who fled conflict affected areas., The provision of active tracing to UASc identified in the communities.

CCoc has identified the need for the CPSC partners to collaborate in providing PSS materials for Child Friendly Spaces, which will help in conducting activities in the center. There is a need for updated referral pathway for child protection services. Also, the need of full collaboration from partners referring children to the center, to provide case documents in order for successful case plan to commence. Lastly, CCoC has identified the need for partners to actively follow up on cases they have referred for interim care and fully inform the children being referred on their transit plan and reunification.

# 3. Description Of Beneficiaries

There are 2.570 beneficiaries from Gumbo, Mahad, Korobou, and Lologo IDP's camp and host Communities) totally: 1,532Children (Girls No:912 and Boys No:620).

CCoC provides interim care services to 98 children (61 girls and 37 boys) from across South Sudan, with many being referred from affected areas in Unity, Upper Nile, Jonglei and Greater Equatoria.

#### 4. Grant Request Justification

CCoC has been responding to the crisis in conflict affected areas. From the last CHF funding, the organization has been able to assist to vulnerable children impacted by child protection issues such as UASC and GBV survivors by providing adequate support through various services.

CCoC has the only national referral center that addresses the protection concerns of children from all parts of the country. Consequently, CCoC, will be able to respond to emergency Child Protection cases even during out of hours to provide care and accommodation in the Interim Care Center for those in fear of their safety. During all stays of children at the Interim Care center, CCoC provides case management through intake assessment and case plan, counselling by CCoC psychologist, FTR and various PSS activities.

CCoC community responses will continue to provide support in the pre-established location through awareness raising on Child protection concerns, Psychological first aid services for CP cases and strengthening of our referral services for health, police and legal aid services. In addition, the organization will conduct training for Community Based Focal Point on case management for the vulnerable children identified within the communities.

CCoC, has continued to support Child/youth friendly spaces within the IDP areas, whom had face protection concerns and at risk of exploitations and abuse. These vulnerable group will also be benefitted in this coming project through PSS activities and awareness raising. In the last project CCoC re-established the Women Friendly Services in the four affected areas impacted by the instability of July, as a way to support the caregivers of the children in the communities. This will be done through the provision of PSS in form of livelihoods activities, counselling support and community lead dialogue on child protection concerns.

The funding will ensure the continuation of those services to support those still receiving case management and to respond to the high volume of referral currently being reported due to the increase of IDP's in Gumbo, Mahad, Korobou and Lologo area.

## Overall project objective

By the end of 2017, CCoC overall objective is to equip and empower IDP's and host community in Gumbo, Mahad, Korobou and Lologo with relevant information and materials on Child protection in-order for them to tackle child protection concerns. This will be achieved through providing awareness raising, psychosocial support and information on referral pathway.

- The project will address the objective and priorities of the protection cluster through the activities which will be conducted in the location. The child friendly spaces and the women friendly spaces activities will aid towards alleviating and upholding the dignity of the most vulnerable people in the communities. Also, CCoC interim care centre will provide shelter to the most at risk and vulnerable groups.

## Monitoring & Reporting plan

Most indicators are connected to the Protection Cluster CHF 2017 standard project output indicators and will be part of the standards procedures that Protection Cluster HRP partners performance will be measured. A designated M&E officer along with the Child Protection Project Officer will carry out regular supervision and monitored visits to the respective field sites. As a way of supporting and strengthening the capacity of local leaders and community protection networks such as the CBCPN's, CCoC will organized periodic meetings joint monitoring visits to the CBCPN's, Youth and Caregivers in each of the respective project locations. CCoC will also organize review meetings with the respective community protection networks, youth, caregivers and children. Reports will be shared on a weekly (5Ws), monthly (internal reports) and quarterly/midterm (CHF/GMS) basis. Weekly PSS attendance sheet, sheets training reports, financial reports, activity work plans and reports, ICC register, will be used for data verification.

#### Implementation Plan

CCoC will take sole responsibility for the implementation of this project. The Child Protection and GBV officer will oversee planning and implementation of this project in the four locations, under the supervision of the Director and in coordination with Monitor and Evaluation Officer, Program Manager. A Case Manager will work alongside the social workers in the provision of quality care and case management for survivors of child abuse, neglect and exploitation. CFS facilitators will lead the work with the children in the CFS location. Our dormitory staff and interim care case workers will continue to run the activities at the center for girls and boys. An implementation work plan will detail all te activities to be carried out within the Project Contract Agreement.

## Justify Chosen Gender Marker Code

Gender Based Violence considerations are core to this Project's activities as it is part of Child Protection.

GBV is one of the main parts of the project; therefore, CCoC is planning to promote and advance gender equality in all its intervention in the selected project locations. Gender sensitivity has been integrated throughout this project in recognition that gender needs and problems associated with those needs mean a varied response is required in order to meet a minimum package for Child Protection services including safety and care for child survivors of GVB and Sexual Violence. This as well is intended to fill some critical gaps in the current crisis response in the state. While the focus of CCoC had been ICC for UASC and providing protection to other most vulnerable children remains a priority, both to this end and for general child protection reasons, we realize a response that is tailored to the needs of both boys and girls, especially adolescents remains critical in Juba and Central Equatoria in general.

The children/youth programming will include some gender-specific activities and community outreaches will include specific messages to men and women.

## **Protection Mainstreaming**

CCoC will implement the new recognized Guideline for Women and girls friendly spaces for South Sudan as part of the different activities of this project in the four different locations. This Guideline has been recognized as a National Child Protection tool to be used with this population. CCoC will also collaborate with the Protection Cluster to assure that all the child protection concerns are highlighted and addressed.
