The project is in its initial stage. Actions to date focus on preparatory steps to enable project implementation including: (i) completion of the knowledge, attitude and perception (KAP) survey terms of reference to gather baseline information and contract the organization that will conduct the survey; (ii) onboarding of the Gorée Institute to undertake electoral observation through citizen oversight -- project cooperation agreement was signed and an exploratory mission to inform the implementation of the strategy is planned for end June; (ii) definition of TORs with the Ministry of Education's National Institute for Education Development (INDE) and Directorate of Literacy responsible for revising the functional and political literacy curriculum; (iv) recruitment of a UNV project coordinator is underway and candidates have been identified; and (v) approval completed in April 2018 of the field-level agreement for implementation of Output 1.4 "Rural women advocate more effectively for their rights and needs" with June start-up of the first-phase study and participatory diagnostic to design training priorities and methodology.

Given the recent/current political/peacebuilding/ transition situation/ needs in the country, has the project been/ does it continue to be **relevant** and well placed to address potential conflict factors/ sources of tensions/ risks to country's sustaining peace progress? In the last months, Guinea-Bissau substantially eased political tensions with the establishment of a new Government and preparation for legislative elections expected in November 2018. This project's goal to enable gender equity in elections, strengthen advocacy skills of rural women and their influence on Government policies, and include voices of women and youth in the political arena at the local and national levels, is essential to ensure a rights-based and demographic dividend approach. This approach to sustaining peace progress is relevant and timely in the lead-up to elections and will continue to be relevant as support for conflict prevention once election results are known and preparations begin for the presidential election anticipated in 2019. Although no adjustments to the original project plan are currently required or envisaged, activities will continue to evolve with flexibility adapted to emerging political and social contexts. The project supports conscious and active participation of young people and women in the electoral process, both as electors and candidates, encourages gender balance in lists of candidates for elected office, and supports participation of rural women farmers in the design of Government policies and priorities.

The project brings together three UN agencies in an integrated strategy to advance the gender equality and equity agenda with increased political participation by women and young people leading to greater and more inclusive ownership of electoral results and development policies, including policies directly impacting the economic opportunities and access to resources of rural communities. The project addresses political participation challenges of women and young people holistically by addressing the main factors affecting them. It includes practical demonstration of skills acquired for the active engagement of women and youth with political debates, engagement in the formulation of

development and spending priorities, and monitoring of the electoral process to build a social and political environment that supports inclusive participation. Project implementation is occurring in close collaboration with other Peacebuilding Fund-approved projects, including "PBF/IRF-210: Support to Political Dialogue and National Reconciliation in Guinea Bissau" (MPTF 108256), that harnesses the power of women and youth as change agents to promote their positive role in the political stabilization processes. Synergy between these two projects will enable greater participation of women and youth in the electoral processes and enabling creativity and innovation, while enhancing joint efforts for greater impact.

Because the project remains in its initial phase, there has been no major progress or results to date that would be suitable for use in PBSO public communications. Following project approval and transfer of funds a detailed work plan and project timetable was agreed. Action has also been undertaken to fill positions and engage with partners to ensure essential technical, administrative and financial coordination and management to achieve project outcomes. Engagement with partners has progressed and the foundations are set for implementation during the second half of 2018. Initial delays will not constitute an obstacle to future implementation of the activities within the proscribed time period and timely completion of the project will not be impaired.

Regarding Output 1.4, the WFP partner (Tiniguena) has started work in Oio and Cacheu regions with engagement of three national consultants (2 men and one woman) tasked with completing the initial participatory diagnostic study focused on identifying main sources of conflicts and effective grassroots-led solutions. The team has so far collected data in 4 communities and is expected to reach all 40 targeted communities before the 17 July reporting deadline agreed with WFP.

Outcome 2: Women and youth effectively participate, accompany and ensure fair and equitable electoral processes.

Activities under Outcome 2 will be carried out in partnership with an ongoing Peacebuilding Fund-funded project (PBF/IRF-159) managed by Voz di Paz, a national NGO with previous experience in the field and existing manuals relevant to this project.
