Updates and Key Achievements (please use this section to highlight project inputs and key achievements for the current period, including 1-2 narrative paragraph as well as Table, Graphs and or Infographics)

- The Office of the Special Envoy (OSE) continued to oversee the implementation of the new UN approach to cholera in Haiti in close coordination with the Government of Haiti, the UN Country Team and other stakeholders. This includes the provision of input for various media engagements, including interviews with NPR, PBS, the Guardian and others, as well as contributions to the Secretary-General's (SG) Noon Briefings and the SG's report for BINUH.
- The first quarter of 2020 saw the continued positive trend of zero laboratory-confirmed cases of cholera in Haiti since the first week of February 2019. Importantly, according to World Health Organization (WHO) standards, in order for cholera to be considered eradicated, zero transmission must be maintained for three consecutive years, while maintaining an effective surveillance system that can detect potential cases. As such, OSE will continue to work with partners to ensure the three-year benchmark is reached.



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- The Representative of the OSE conducted a joint mission to Northern Haiti with the United Nations Office for Project Services (UNOPS) and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) to re-evaluate the methodology of the track 2 response. During the visit, meetings and focus groups were held using multiple platforms, as well as with local officials. The Representative further supported the programme development process of UNDP and UNOPS, as they plan for the next expansion phase of the Track 2 programming.
- The Representative of the OSE also conducted a joint mission with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) to review the Track 1a emergency response. Field visits were made to the Central Plateau and border regions of Haiti with UNICEF's Global Director of Emergency Operations, as well as the Haiti UNICEF Representative. OSE and UNICEF began plans for potential future funding for the evolving cholera response.
- Engagement continued with important members of civil society. OSE facilitated briefings for the Executive Director of Lawyers without Borders Canada. With the support of Lawyers without Borders, OSE also met with over 20 members of civil society organizations in Haiti. These organizations are focused on and represented by victims of cholera.
- Resource mobilization efforts were also continued. OSE secured a \$10 million contribution from the United States, which was transferred to the Multi-Partner Trust Fund (MPTF) in January 2020. Additionally, in February, the Government of Liechtenstein contributed an additional \$24,819 to the MPTF.
- Active engagement continued with implementing partners on the ground to develop proposals and implementation plans to address the most urgent needs of the response. OSE is planning the fifth Advisory Committee meeting for the second quarter of 2020, during which time, significant funding allocations will be made.
- The UN still requires approximately \$21 million to finalize the cholera response through 2022 and maintain zero transmission to achieve the WHO three-year eradication benchmark. Separately, to cover all of the remaining 109 communities under Track 2, approximately \$26 million is required. To this end, a resource mobilization effort by the Secretary-General was planned for this quarter, but the ongoing Covid-19 crisis has led to a postponement.

Delays or Deviations (if any, briefly describe the delays or changes in focus, approach or targets, and provide a short justification for the change in 1-2 narrative paragraphs)

• The increasingly dire Covid-19 crisis is causing implementing partners to have difficulties in implementing all activities as planned. Haiti currently has 16 confirmed cases of Covid-19, as of 31 March. In the current context, the surveillance system has been strengthened and put in a state of maximum vigilance; schools have been closed and several high emergency measures have been taken by the Government. The Haitian Ministry of Health is working hard to control the transmission following the introduction of Coronavirus in the country. This has caused programming delays, as partners are generally unable to circulate as required. The situation continues to be monitored.
