This is why investing in impoverished girls, especially very young adolescents and those who are married or out of school, is the key to achieve health development goals. This workshop was sponsored by UNFPA, and brought together participants from Benin, Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, Malawi, Nigeria, Niger, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, Uganda and Zambia. Most of these countries are among the poorest in the world and face rapid population growth.

UNAIDS Executive Director learns from Rwanda

UNAIDS Executive Director Mr Michel Sibidé paid his first official visit to Rwanda from August 27th to September 4th. to discuss support to AIDS in Rwanda in the context of the Delivering as One UN reform.

"I would like to congratulate the Government of Rwanda for the tremendous progress made in years", says Mr Sibidé. "With access to antiretroviral treatment

for persons living with HIV, covering about 70% of those in need, Rwanda has one of the highest coverage rates in sub-Saharan Africa. Rwanda's per capita expenditure on HIV/AIDS is also one of the highest in sub-Saharan Africa. The UN is proud to be a partner in this work", he adds. "Mr Sibidés visit to Rwanda gives us a unique possibility to advocate for universal access to HIV prevention, treatment, care and support to those affected by HIV, says Aurélien Agbénonci, UN Resident Coordinator in Rwanda. During his five days visit, Michel Sidibé visited several projects including the Prevention of Mother to Child Transmission services and other health services offered by Rwamagana Hospital, HIV and Tuberculosis services in Biryogo's health center and an association of former sex workers in Muhanga District. Michel Sidibé, met with high level officials of Rwanda including President Kagame and the First Lady of Rwanda Mrs Jeanette Kagame to interact on the UN support to Rwanda and

learn from the Imbuto Foundation.

his Legal Framework will help to integrate the different kinds of volunteerism in the country and also to create new opportunities for Rwandan youth. "Volunteering is both an opportunity and an asset for development. It represents a tremendous resource for addressing many of the development challenges of our times" said the UN Resident coordinator a.i. The conference brought together governement officials, the private sector, national and international volunteering organizations, development partners and participants from East and West Africa, mainly Kenya and Burkina who shared their countries experiences. The Conference was jointly organized by UNV Rwanda, VSO and Lov Rwanda.

17 new million USD for UN Rwanda

At the last Steering Committee for the Expanded Delivering as One Funding Window UN Rwanda's request was acknowledged with an additional 17.219 million US Dollars for 2009. A similar amount is expected for 2010. "These extra funds will be used to think out of the box to come up with initiatives where we can deliver differently. Our intention is to bring out the best in each agency to design a support where we really show that we are truly Delivering as One", says UN Resident Coordinator to Rwanda Aurélien Agbénonci.

Four resolutions adopted by the WHO Regional Committee

The fiftyninth Session of the WHO Regional Committee for Africa nominated a Regional Director and adopted four resolutions aimed at scaling up action

in areas that are key to improving the health situation in the Region. The session voted to renominate incumbent Regional Director, Dr Luis Gomes Sambo of Angola, to steer the affairs of WHO in the African Region for another five years. The Regional Committee also adopted resolutions on tackling drug resistance related to AIDS, tuberculosis (TB) and malaria; accelerating progress towards malaria elimination in the African Region, and strengthening outbreak preparedness and response in the context of the current influenza pandemic. The fourth resolution related to policy orientations on the establishment of centers of excellence for disease surveillance, public health laboratories, food and medicines regulation. The WHO Regional Committee for Africa took place in Kigali, Rwanda, from 31st August to 4th September 2009. The meeting has been attended at high level by President Paul Kagame who chaired the Opening Ceremony, the Director General of WHO, Dr Margaret Chan, the Executive Director of UNAIDS, Mr Michel Sibidé, and Ministers of Health and Delegates from 46 Countries of the African Region.
