Developing an integrated corporate preparedness framework	WFP completed the developed and road-tested a new Emergency Preparedness and Response Package – known as the EPRP. The package gives Country Offices the tools to carry out a solid and wide-reaching Risk Assessment as the foundation for building up minimum levels of emergency preparedness. The tool builds on the experience and expertise gathered by WFP and its partners in contingency planning and particularly the Operational Action plans as developed within the Pandemic Preparedness Portfolio of activities. Currently the tool is being field tested.	95%

Expand ICT disaster response strategy and capacity to priority countries and regions	Priority countries for the deployment of the EMK kits have been identified and the EMK capacity development has been initiated.	75%
Enhance civil-military dialogue through strategic engagement on issues such as supply chain management, urban operations and humanitarian relief coordination during emergencies	WFP continues to engage with USAID, military actors and others on initiatives that support the enhancement of logistics and supply chain planning with national authorities. Qualitative achievements against outcomes and results:

By 31 September 2011, substantial programmatic achievements have taken place in line with the objectives and outputs of this project and linked with the broader WFP pandemic readiness initiatives. Most notable are reflected below:

WFP completed the developed and road-tested a new Emergency Preparedness and Response Package – known as the EPRP. The package was tested in 5 country offices together with regional bureaux teams which will be the final custodian of the tool therefore securing the sustainability and mainstreaming of pandemic lessons learnt throughout the 5 of regions where WFP operates. Additional 10 country offices are in the process of rolling out the package. A series of regional workshops are being carried out to bring together WFP country office focal points with government and other stakeholder in support rolling of the package. An online monitoring tool is in development.

The report of the Following the Pandemic Readiness and Response Exercise (P2RX) which was conducted in Dakar, Senegal during July 2011 with the participation of government authorities from six countries (Benin, Ghana, Guinea, Mali, Nigeria and Senegal) and wide range of other stakeholders including civil military representatives, has been finalized. The exercise report focuses on six areas: Planning, Humanitarian Operations in an Urban Environment, Coordination, Supply Chain Management, Information Management, Communications and Messaging (media and public).

The Global 'Toward a Safer World Conference' was conducted on 15-16 September, 2011 in Rome, Italy and included 170 participants from a variety of government, non-governmental, Red Cross/Red Crescent movement and private organisations involved in disaster and pandemic preparedness and response. The conference included both plenary and group breakout sessions on both days and culminated on the second day at World Food Programme Headquarters for a final plenary session and an address by the Executive Director of WFP.

Project activities are moving towards their final implementation phase.
