3. BACKGROUND AND NEEDS ANALYSIS (please adjust row size as needed)

(A) Describe the project rationale based on identified issues, describe the humanitarian situation in the area, and list groups consulted *

Floods that occurred mid this year destroyed crops, irrigation canals and underground storage facilities. This caused food insecurity and a hike in food prices. Farmers are not preparing for the planting season because they lack seed crops and also because of the drought; some farmers have already been displaced with others to follow, leaving the farms unattended. The current Agriculture and Livelihood and WASH Cluster position paper on the drought states that Somalia is already experiencing La Nina and that 305,000 agro pastoralists,395,000 pastoralists and 87,000 riverine farmers in HE and AFLC are experiencing its impact. The current drought has made the situation worse since it has dried up pasture in rangelands leading to the death of livestock. Food is therefore not only scarce but also expensive. For many of the agro and nomadic pastoralists and reverine communities and newly displaced living in Balet Weyne district, life is becoming increasingly difficult. With no access to the free food distributions, they attempt to survive by securing temporary menial jobs in the informal sector. Given the overall impact of the drought on livelihoods, these menial jobs attract very little income and they are not easy to come by. Thus, the populations in Balet Weyne district are unable to afford food and water. Those with menial jobs cannot afford a decent meal. The deteriorating humanitarian situation in Balet Weyne has a negative impact on the livelihoods of the residents of Balet Weyne.

Many residents of the villages in Balet Weyne depend on small scale business enterprises and subsistence farming for their income. These livelihood activities have been interrupted by the floods and current drought thus impacting negatively on the household incomes. For a poor community whose average HH income has been less than one dollar a day, the present drought has rendered the people destitute. The prices of basic household necessities such as food have gone up for example 1Kn of rice is \$0.80.1 Kn of sugar is 1.04.20 liter ierrycan of water is \$0.50. Agrocare assessed the conditions of Agrocare constantly tracks the living conditions of the people and livestock throughout Hiiraan region in order to respond to

their most urgent needs with the help of local and international partners. The report from the situational analysis Agrocare carried out included the following conclusions,

- a) Farmers failed to make routine maintenance of canals because of lack of finance.
- b) An estimated 10,000 internally displaced people from nomadic settelments and else where have moved to Balet Weyne and surrounding villages due to droughts and conflicts.
- c) Many residents lack gainful employment opportunities.
- d) Farmers lack irrigation canals, seeds, tools and irrigation pumps.
- e) About 65% of households lack finances to purchase water and food

Since Agrocare works in this region we carry out baseline surveys on food production and other aspects of livelihood. These baseline surveys will be used to determine the increase in food production after the intervention. Agrocare also carries out population movement tracking and this will be used to asses the the project's impact on migration. Community elders will participate in identifying participants. The beneficiaries will be selected from among the very poor along gender lines to ensure equity with priority being given to the vulnerable households such as child-headed households and those headed by people with disabilities. Adult members of the community will be selected according to Somali culture to represent and work on behalf of the child-headed households in cases where such households lack a patron. Weekly meetings by the project team chaired by an Agrocare staff will be carried out to establish the progress of the project and intervene where necessary. Community members with experience and skills in canal rehabilitation and road construction will be assigned supervisory oles to ensure the work is done to required standards. Informal interviews and discussions will be used to determine the progress and impact of the project. The supervisors will report to Agrocare staff on the ground who will write reports and end them to Agrocare headquarters.The program officer will make bi-weekly field visits during the implementation process
