The total work done will be computed and valued in USD and paid at the end of each working week. All the implementing partners will submit to FAO weekly/ bi-weekly progress reports including updates on the emergency situation on the ground regarding pasture/ water availability, livestock situations, migratory patterns, livestock market and security situations.FAO will contract external evaluators to assess the impact of the project, as well as utilize post project household surveys to evaluate the success of the project at household' regional level.
